**FLOWING 35-BARREL OILER FINALED NEAR CROSS CUT**

Prentice Petroleum Inc. of Abilene completed No. 1 Hollis Shults in the Blind Hog (Ranger) Field three miles east of Cross Cut.

Location is 467 feet from the north and east lines of Patrick Curling Survey 151.

Daily potential was 35 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 25 barrels of water.

Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke with 900 pounds casing and 400 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 2,812-47 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 10,000 gallons of fluid and 170 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2-in-h casing at 3,244 feet. Having a gas-oil ratio of 3,000-1, the well is bottomed at 3,250 feet.
