

School's Trustees Hire Firm To Collect Delinquent Taxes

Trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District have hired a firm to begin collection of delinquent taxes.

Board members approved hiring the firm of Mays, Hart & Co., lawyers of Greenville to begin steps toward collecting back taxes owed Cross Plains Schools as "soon as possible."

The company has served

many school, city and other taxing districts over the state during the past 18 years, and is presently serving about 65 taxing units.

Approximately \$90,000 is owed Cross Plains Schools in delinquent taxes, and most of that has accrued in the past few years.

Persons who owe school taxes

are being asked to voluntarily come to the tax office and pay those back assessments to avoid additional penalty and interest charged by the collection firm.

All tax suits involving Cross Plains schools have been settled or dropped. Cases filed in Eastland County were dropped when property owners paid the assessments some time ago, and a recent judgment issued by 42nd District Court at Baird concerning two cases in Callahan County cleared that docket. Those taxes have also been paid by the property owners.

It was noted that persons who pay past due taxes early will not appear on delinquent tax rolls turned over to the collection agency.

Public Meeting Set Here Next Tuesday

Citizens of the City of Cross Plains are reminded that a public meeting has been called for Tuesday, June 5, in compliance with requirements in securing a \$1.5 million Department of Housing and Urban Development Small Cities Grant.

The session to which all residents of Cross Plains are invited, is to be held at the Cross Plains City Hall starting at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson stated that all interested citizens are urged to attend.

Cross Plains recently received word that a pre-application for \$1.5 million grant had been approved, and that funds would be forthcoming over a three-year period pending submission of a full application and its approval.

Another public meeting will be held at a later date.

Weather Threat To Bumper Grain Crop

Spring thunderstorms carrying hail threatened what looms as a bumper small grain crop in the Cross Plains area Monday afternoon.

Showers late Monday afternoon and early evening roamed this area dumping heavy rains and some hail.

It is believed that the best prospective small grain crop this area has seen in the past several years sustained only minimal damage. Hail up to golf ball size fell in grain producing areas Monday.

Most wheat farmers expect that harvesting is 10 days to two weeks away. Most hope for dry warm weather to speed ripening and no more hail or high winds.

Peanut farmers in the area also need dry weather to plant.

Lightning struck an oil storage tank on the J. M. Greenwood place about five miles south of Cross Plains Monday. Some oil was ignited in a 200-barrel tank which was knocked 190 feet by the explosion. Some grass in the area was burned. Pipe and gauges at the tank battery were destroyed or damaged, and another tank and separator were scorched. Cross Plains firemen were alerted, but the fire burned itself out or was doused by accompanying rain.

R. T. Watson reported hail up to the size of golf balls fell at his place 7 miles southwest of Cross Plains, near Burkett. The large hailstones were exceptions, but about marble size balls almost covered the ground. He said some damage was done to his wheat. He measured 1.10 inches of rain.

Light damage was also thought to have been inflicted in some grain fields west of here, where some hail fell, reported by Joe McWilliams.

Alton Hornsby at Rowden measured 1.20 inches of rain. Greenwood reported 1.50 inches of rain, and Ron Bagley, also at Cross Plains, gauged 1.70 inches in a heavy rain. Both reported some hail, but no damage.

Gauges in Cross Plains varied from .80 to 1.00 with very light hail.

Mrs. Alice Champion reported .80 of an inch with some marble size hail, but little damage.

To the north and east moisture was lighter and extremely light or no hail. Joe Fleming gauged .70 of an inch and Pioneer Co-Op had .60. At Sakano Edwin Erwin reported .40 of an inch, and Nathan Foster at Atwell got .30 of an inch.

Clouds had formed in the west Tuesday as the Review hurried to press.

"Verily I say unto you, this generation shall not pass, 'til all these things be fulfilled." (Matt. 24:34) What would make us believe that NOW is "this generation"? Look at the newspapers! We can see Bible Prophecy coming to pass with such accuracy and swiftness that it is pure folly to ignore the signs of the time. The Lord tells us in His Word that no man knows the exact hour of his coming, but he did tell how to know the time of the end. (Matt. 24)

In the study of prophecy we find that God, through His holy prophets, has foretold conditions as they exist today. The prophet Nahum foretold the modern automobiles racing and jostling one another in the streets. (Nahum 2:3, 4) There are descriptions of what we know today to be airplanes, and of what could be the effects of nuclear warfare. The Prophet Ezekiel foretold of Israel being scattered over the world and then re-gathered in the last days to become a Nation, which took place in 1948. Throughout God's Word we are told of the progressive worsening of wars, earthquakes, pestilence and famines; about the evils, immoralities, drugs, lawlessness and general moral decay. Many great nations have fallen in the past and followed the same pattern of events; moral decay being one of the main causes. We should be alarmed and concerned at the condition of our own great nation. America has been blessed, but whenever a nation turns her back on God and refuses to repent, then judgment is sure to follow. In Luke 17:26-30, we see a comparison of conditions of today with the days of Noah and of Sodom & Gemarah. II Tim. 3:1-5 describes the wickedness of men in the last days. Check it out and see if it isn't an accurate description of this generation. If we are aware of the warnings given us, we will not be caught sleeping. We are warned to be careful of false religions and teachers (I Tim. 4:1-3) (II Peter 2:1-9). The Apostle Peter also tells of the ones who will not believe the last days are upon them regardless of the signs.

If any person has perceived in his heart to plead ignorance, forget it! God did away with this excuse when He made His Word available to all. We in America are especially without excuse. In Hos. 4:6, God says, "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge . . ." and goes on to say that they have willfully rejected this knowledge, and He in turn will reject them and forget their children. In Eph. 4:18 we read of those having their understanding darkened, being alienated from God through ignorance because of the blindness of their hearts. God assures us that He will wink at ignorance no longer, but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent. (Eph. 17:30) God has warned people repeatedly of the coming judgments and leaves all without excuse. He said in Amos 3:7, 8, "Surely the Lord will do nothing but he revealeth His secret unto His servants the prophets." After He speaks, they in fear will prophesy.

I would like to urge whosoever will to let their hearts be stirred and begin to read and study their Bible. The Lord has promised a special blessing for those "who read and keep those things which are written therein: for the time is at hand." (Rev. 1:3) We need to "hide the word in our hearts" because the days is coming when there will be a famine in the land for the word of God. (Amos 8:11, 12)

We can be encouraged at the words in II Chron. 15:2, 4, which say that God will be found of those who seek him. Further on in the 12th chapter, verses 6, 7, 12, He promised mercy to those who repented. So each American should take to heart both as individuals and as a nation the words of God in II Chron. 7:14: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and heal their land."

Cattle Grub Control Advised, Says Agent

Each year between May and September, Texas livestock producers can control costly cattle grubs by applying systemic insecticides, says Greg Gergron, Calahan County Agent at Baird, with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

During late fall and winter, the cattle grub appears on the backs of animals. It's too late to begin control measures then, since most of the damage has already been done.

However, applying a systemic insecticide—one which is absorbed into the animal's bloodstream—can control grubs effectively between May and September.

In addition to controlling cattle grubs, the insecticide will also provide contact control of horn flies for two to three weeks. Gergron says this makes the overall cost of treatment favorable.

The cattle grub is the larval stage of the heel fly. The fly has no mouth parts, so it causes no pain to the cattle. However, it frightens cattle, making them difficult to manage. Animals often seek relief by standing in shade or deep water.

The life cycle begins when the heel fly lays its eggs on an animal. The eggs, glued to hairs, hatch within a few days, and larvae (worms) enter the skin at hair follicles. The worms then migrate through the animal's body for six to eight months and reappear in the animal's back in the fall and winter, forming knot-like marbles or cysts.

Cattle grubs cause greater losses than any other cattle pests, Gergron stated. Besides damaging meat and hides by their burrowing, they lower beef cattle gains and production throughout the year. Profit losses are estimated in the millions of dollars each year.


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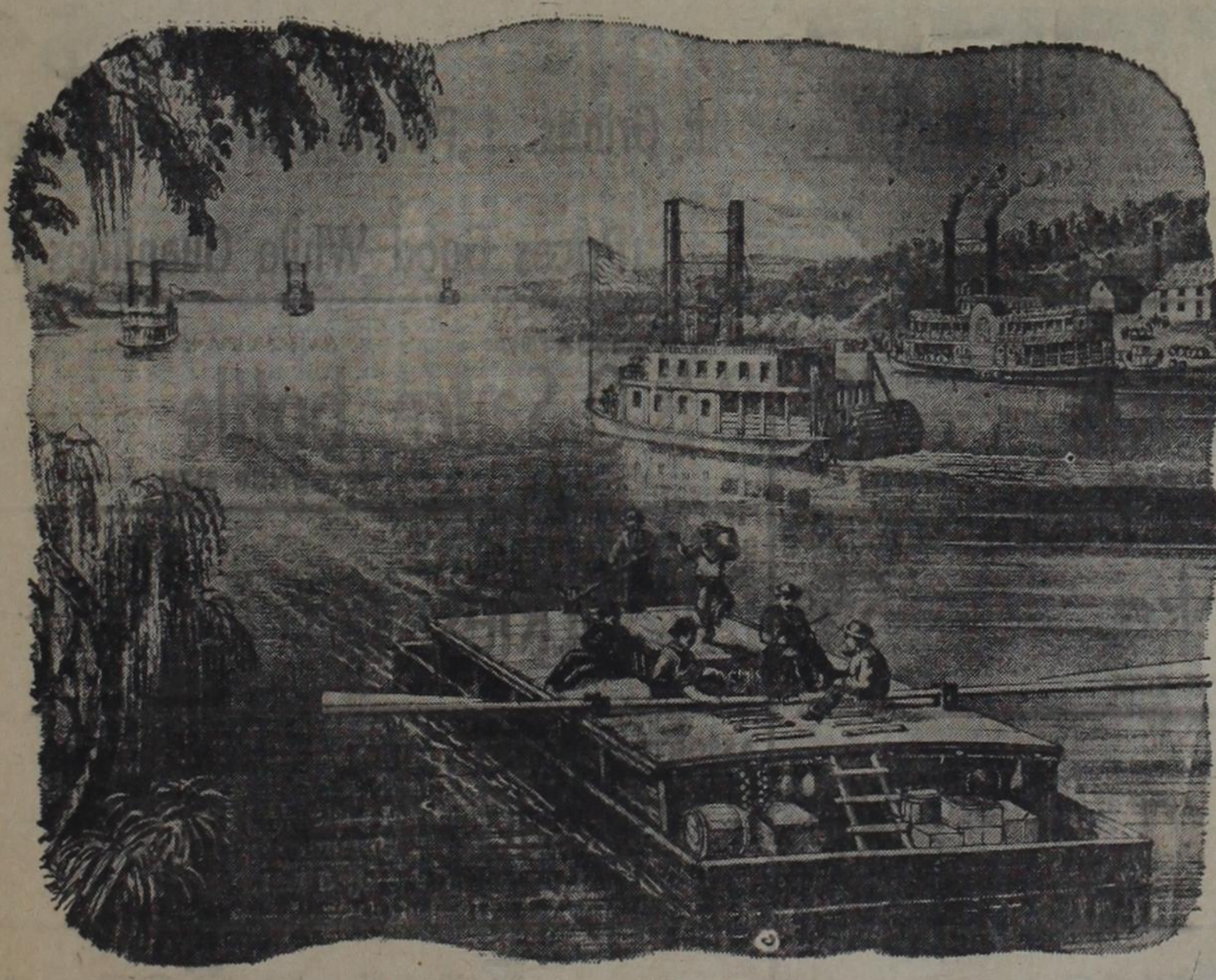
