## Grasshoppers Infest County, Do Damage

A grasshopper infestation in the county is causing considerable damage to home gardens, fruit trees and other crops, according to Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent at Baird.

Numerous small grasshoppers observed over most parts of the county this past week indicate that the population will be more severe in coming weeks, he opines.

Two insecticides are labeled for use for grasshopper control are Sevin and Malathion. There is also a Toxaphene bait available for use along the edge of fields. This formulation is intended as a barrier treatment to reduce migration into fields. A formula for mixing this bait is available from the County Extension Office in the courthouse at Baird, the agent advises.

## Postal Service Offers Film Mailing Tips

A little extra care when mailing film for processing could mean the difference in preserving the memories of your summer vacation, Postmaster Joe E. Hanke, Jr. advises.

"Thousands of film packages end up in dead letter offices throughout the country each year," Postmaster Hanke said, "just because the film package was wrapped and addressed carelessly."

He offered the following tips for mailing film:

— Put the film in a sturdy envelope, and when possible use envelopes supplied by a film processing company.

— Write the film processor's mailing address, return address and Zip Code legibly on the outside of the envelope.

— Tape your name and address to the film roll or cartridge before putting it in the envelope, and put your name and address on the back of any photographs being sent for copying, re-touching or other purposes.

Peggy Dickson, Cross Plains School District tax assessor-collector, reminds that deadline for applying for homestead and elderly or disabled exceptions on 1979 school taxes is Monday, July 16.

She also advises that it was announced at a tax seminar at Abilene on Monday, presented by the School Tax Practices Assessment Board, definition of homestead has changed.

Rural homestead is defined as improvements and land (usually one or two acres) used as a residence. Old definition included improvements on land of up to 200 acres. Definition of urban homestead remains the house and lots on which it stands.

School district taxpayers are also reminded that the Board of Equalization will be sitting at the Tax Office on Main Street from 2 to 5 and 7 to 10 p.m. Tuesday or until all business is heard, on all real and personal property in the district other than oil or utilities.

Did you know that well-meant assistance given to an accident victim by an unqualified person could injure the victim even more than the accident? Proper initial care could prevent paralysis or even death in a spinal injury. Would you like to be qualified to give such emergency care?

Classes in Emergency Care Attendance (E.C.A.) will be taught in Cross Plains if enough interest is shown. You can be a qualified E.C.A. and could save a life. **Coleman Writer Reflects On Past At Cottonwood**

Editor's Note: Following article is re-printed from Coleman Democrat-Voice, written by Bill Laws.

The little community of Cottonwood in Callahan County is about 35 miles north of Coleman. I spent some time there in the '30s. It was quiet and a peaceful place with a few farms that produced peanuts and cotton. I worked some in the peanut harvest, shaking the dirt off the peanuts after they had been plowed up.

Now a guy who shakes peanuts may not be stupid but he does stoop pretty low and is in about the same category as a cotton picker. Chances are he does not drive a Cadillac and does not belong to the Chamber of Commerce. It was customary and understood that the field hands would not be paid until the farmer sold his peanuts.

The peanuts were piled up in "shocks" and let dry a week or so. Then the community thrasher came around and separated the peanuts from the vines. The vines were baled for they make excellent hay. The nuts were graded, the big ones separated from the little ones. They were sacked and usually stored in the barn until the price was right. Some farmers sprayed them with water just before he sold them to gain a little weight. A certain amount of moisture was legal or acceptable. Some even dampened their hay before taking it to market.

While working there I was always intrigued by the two tall peaks in that area. I think they are called Caddo peaks, or maybe one is called Coyote peak. While working in a field near one of them I remarked that Indians probably used them for a lookout post. An old guy by the name of Sawyer said "My

grandfather was killed by Indians over there near that Caddo peak." I asked when it happened and he said "Long time ago, during the War Between the States."

He said his grandpa, John Huff, was an Indian guard. I suppose he was referring to the militia or home guards. It seems John Huff and a man by the name of Cumby were patrolling that area and came upon five Indians at Cottonwood Springs, new Cottonwood, but they decided there were too many Indians for them to take on. The two men tried to slip away but the Indians saw them and gave chase.

Huff and Cumby raced toward the Caddo peak as arrows whistled over their heads and knocked up dust around them. The white men were well mounted and managed to out-ride the Indians, all except one. This Indian mounted on a speedy sorrel would ride close, jump off, draw carefully, aim and release the arrow in regular English bowman style. The arrows always came dangerously close. One near miss cut the strap which held Huff's powder horn and he rode on without it.

As they neared the peak the Indian was close behind them but had stopped shooting, apparently out of arrows. The two men jumped off and ran up the side of the peak hoping to get behind the rocks at the top. Halfway up the peak Cumby looked back and saw the Indian let fly with his last arrow. There was a loud "plop" and Cumby saw dust fly from Huff's back and the stricken man fell forward on his face, the feathered end of an arrow right where his suspenders crossed.

Cumby made it to the top of the peak, and from behind the rimrock aimed his musket at the Indian who was lying flat on his horse and attempting to ride up the steel slope. Cumby aimed at the bright colored feathers on the Indian's waist, bonnet, lowered just a fraction and fired. The warrior tumbled off and rolled down the rocky slope. The sorrel horse stopped, turned his head and looked back at the blood and brains splattered on his back and hips, then trotted back down to the dying Indian.

Cumby could see the other Indians coming on at a fast gallop. He knew Huff was beyond all human help so he ran down and mounted the Indian's fast horse and took off through the brush. He eventually arrived at the fort and reported the incident. A detachment of troops was sent to the scene of the fight. They found the scalped body of Huff but the body of the Indian had been carried away. The arrow in Huff's back, was of the type used by the Shawnee tribe. One of the troops remarked, "Yeah, it's those dam arrow shootin' Shawnees." Then "What they doin' way down here?" Huff was buried somewhere in the Cottonwood area with just a wooden cross for a marker. Forty years later a powder horn was found in that area with the name J. H. Huff on it. One of his relatives still has the horn.

The Shawnee Indians were well known for their skill in archery and the quality of their equipment. They sometimes made a quick journey down into Texas to cut dogwood limbs which make the best arrows. Their bows, which had about a 70 lb. draw were made from hickory or beau-d'arc wood. I once visited the scene of the aforementioned battle. Just for the heck of it, I took my bow and arrows to the top of the peak and shot at a target way down below. That was the first and only time my old 55 lb. Shakespeare bow ever sent an arrow 300 yards. No, I did not hit the target.

**When The Blind Lead The Blind**  
(Matt. 15:14)

Continued from last week . . .

May I suggest that you read again last week's article under this heading before reading this one?

Jesus Christ, the blessed Son of God and Saviour of all who believe, accept and obey His plain and simple gospel plan of salvation, said: "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me," (John 14:6). Please observe the singularity of the Lord's statement. He didn't say, "I am the way's, did He? Yet, the blind guides; deceiver's of way's, stream and yell; "you are narrow and shallow to say that the Bible consistently and harmoniously teaches that there is only one way to Heaven: God's way. Have they not read, Matt. 7:13, 14? Which states, "Enter ye in at the strait gate; for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way, (SINGULAR) which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." Yes they have read it; but because they know it is light that exposes the darkness of Satan's doctrines; doctrines that flagrantly contradict God's perfect plan of salvation, they will use it only when they can miss apply it, or, rationalize it away, as they consistently do with all key scriptures. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God" (Romans 10:23).

Think about that statement this week, and next week I shall endeavor to show how the ignorance Paul speaks of is working in the lives of people today. Many people seem to think the word ignorant is a derogatory term belittling or showing an unfavorable opinion of people, the fact is however, all of us are ignorant of many things, including the most learned and educated among us. The only real remedy for the ignorance that Paul speaks of, is to do like Luke said the Bereans did: "Search the scriptures daily" (Acts 17:10, 11); and as Jesus said: "Search the scriptures; for in them you think you have eternal life: and they are they which testify of Me". (John 5:39).

**Stenholm Nixes Oil Windfall Profit Tax**

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm indicated that he voted against the Crude Oil Windfall Profits Tax Act of 1979, because it was unfair to the royalty owner and the independent producer. The bill creates a complicated new tax law that will require additional accounting each month. In most cases, the land owner is the royalty owner, of which there are approximately 28,000 in the 17th District. The royalty owners will pay their share of the windfall profits tax. To tax one specific group of people in this manner is inconsistent with any basic principle of fairness.

The independent producer drills 90 per cent of the wildcat wells and finds 75 per cent of the new fields. Thus, accounting for more than half of all the oil and gas reserves discovered. During the last five years, they have re-invested more than 100 per cent of their wellhead revenues in exploration. These funds come from outside private investors and borrowed capital. No outside investor would put money in a wildcat well, knowing that if a discovery was made, part of the revenue would be taxed-away. The whole idea of crude oil price decontrol is to stimulate new production incentives. However, the windfall profits tax, counteract these incentives with respect to the independent producer. Congress recently voted to use taxpayers' money for synthetic fuel development. When, under the guise of a windfall profits tax, are we attempting to take revenues from the independent producer, who presently is investing more than 100 per cent of their wellhead revenues in search of new reservoirs.

Congressman Stenholm further states that the bill will now go to the Senate Finance Committee.

**New Testament Pentecostal Believers**

There are three factors that stand foremost in the message of salvation, as the New Testament Church presented it.

An examination of a few scriptures will show what those three factors are.

Acts 2:38, "Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

Acts 10:44-48, note verse 44, "While Peter yet spake those words, the Holy Ghost fell on all them which heard the word. . . on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Ghost. For they heard them speak with tongues, and magnify God. And he commanded them to be baptized in the name of the Lord. . ."

Acts 19:1-6 "He (Paul) said unto them (twelve disciples of John the Baptist) have you received the Holy Ghost since ye believed? When they heard this, they were baptized (re-baptized) in the name of the Lord Jesus.

"Paul laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came on them and they spake with tongues and prophesied." Now compare each scripture to find the three common elements.

First each instance Repentance was evident prior to that time, or took place at their conversion. Next we could not help but notice, that when the spirit come into their lives, they spoke in tongues — a language not familiar to them.

The third factor that is so evident is the fact that all converts of each preacher was baptized in the name of Jesus Christ as opposed to titles, "Father, Son and Holy Ghost".

No wonder Jesus told Nicodemus, "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God". St. John Chapter 3.

For many years religious leaders informed those seeking information about speaking in tongues that it was no longer available in this modern age. People accepted this answer from those they trusted, and the issue was kept down as hoped. "That is" until the past few years and hungry people around the world began to receive this experience.

Many of the ministers themselves received this experience, after having told others, it was not for them. Again people are asking, "Why is it that the Bible examples of baptism were all in Jesus' name, yet they were not baptized that way? Once again, they are being told it is not so important! But a revival of people being Re-baptized, Acts 19, is taking place.

This time as the Bible teaches in Jesus' name. We would like to ask you, along all the apostles, have you been baptized in Jesus' name?

It may be more important than you think. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Mark 16:16.

"One Lord, one faith, one baptism." Eph. 4:5. Have you received the Holy Ghost since you believed? Acts 19.

Acts 4:10 "Be it known unto you all, and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom ye crucified, whom God raised from the dead, even by him doth this man stand here before you whole."

Acts 4:11 "This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders, which is become the head of the corner."

Acts 4:12 "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."

1 John 5:7 "For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these three are one."

Col. 2:6 "As ye have therefore received Christ Jesus the Lord so walk ye in him:"

Col. 2:7 "Rooted and built up in him, and established in the faith, as ye have been taught, abounding therein with thanksgiving."

Col. 2:8 "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ."

Col. 2:9 "For in him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily."

Col. 2:10 "And ye are complete in him, which is the head of all principality and power."

Some folks think there are three in the Godhead. Others think there's two. I haven't found in the scriptures where there is three personalities, or two, neither worship three gods. I don't understand why some people don't want the name of Jesus on their church sign. Palo Petroleum Inc. of Dallas has completed No. 1-A Emma Riley in the Palso Davis (Ranger) Field a mile west of Cross Cut.

It spots 3,420 feet from the north and 2,717 feet from the east lines of Stephen Jones Survey 282, A-546.

Daily potential was 46 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil, plus 38 barrels of water. Flow was through a 24-64-inch choke with 900 pounds casing and 150 pounds tubing pressures.

The 4½-inch casing is set at 3,288 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,292 feet.



**FRUIT SQUASH BLOSSOMS**  
 1 doz. squash blossoms  
 1 cup milk  
 2/3 cup flour  
 1/2 cup cooking oil  
 Salt to taste.

Pick large squash blossoms in early morning, just before they open. Prepare as soon as possible. Thoroughly mix milk and flour. Spread blossoms in large, shallow pan and gently spoon flour mixture over to coat all sides or dip blossoms into batter as they are fried. Heat oil in heavy fry pan to 375 degrees fahrenheit with slotted spoon. Carefully put batter coated blossoms in hot oil until they turn golden brown; drain on absorbent paper, salt. Serve hot as fritters or as garnish for soup.

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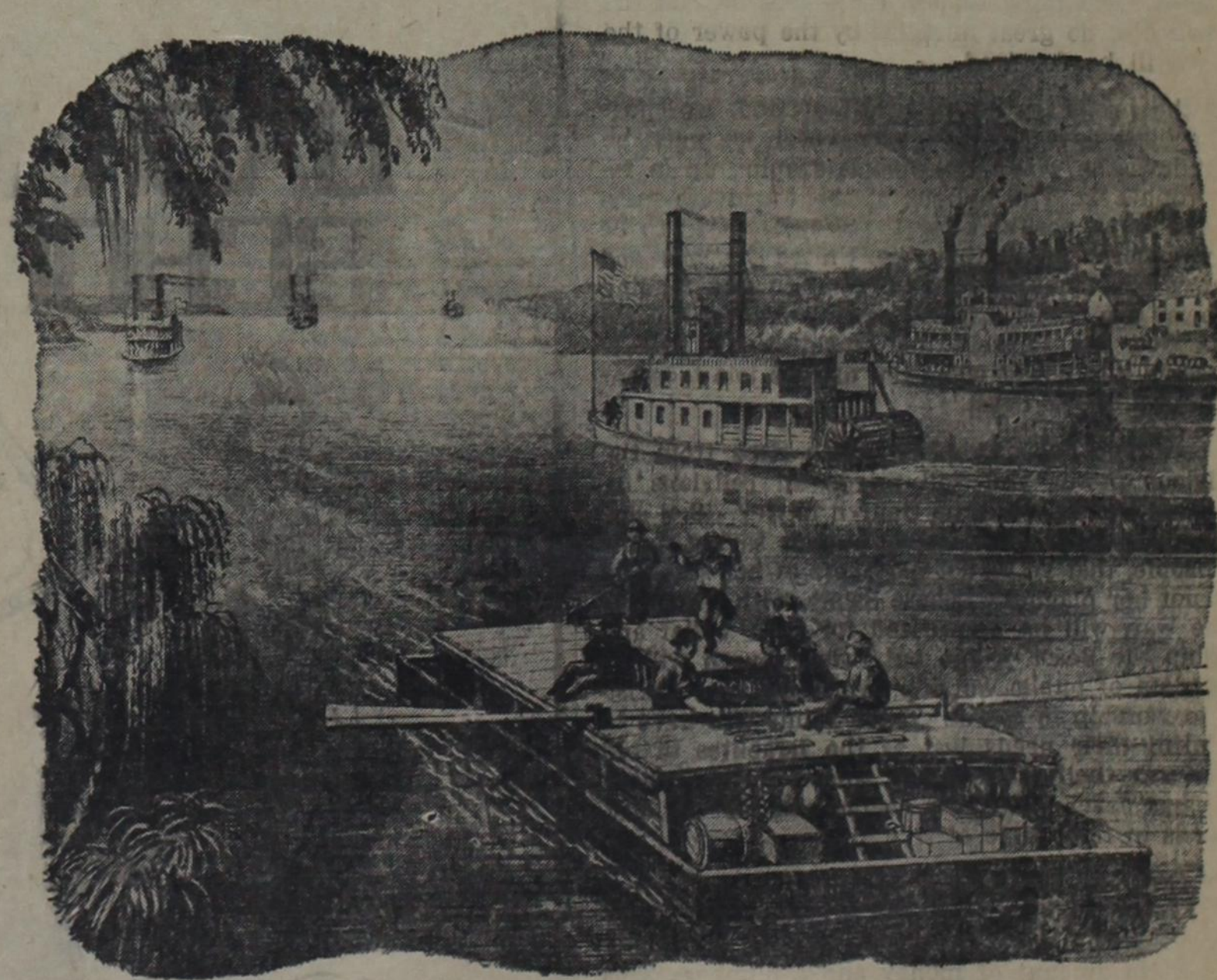

## Public Notice

On July 2, 1979, the invited full application for 1979 Community Development Block Grant funds was delivered to the HUD area office, 2001 Bryan Tower, Dallas, Texas. Prior to the delivery date, two public meetings were conducted to solicit citizen participation in accordance with the regulations governing this program.

The application was simultaneously submitted to the West Central Texas Council of Governments and the Governor's Office of Planning Coordination for reviews.

The application is on file at the city office and is available to interested citizens for their review during the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

For persons wishing to make complaints with regard to this application the following verbatim excerpt from 570.303, paragraph 4, subsection (f) of the Federal Register, dated March 1, 1978 is included for their guidance.

(1) Consideration of objections to applications. Persons wishing to object to approval of an application by HUD may make such objection known to the HUD Area Office, 2001 Bryan Tower, Dallas, Texas 75201. HUD will consider objections

made only on the following grounds. The applicant's description of needs and objectives is plainly inconsistent with available facts and data; or the activities to be undertaken are plainly inappropriate to meeting the needs and objectives identified by the applicant; or the application does not comply with the requirements of this Part or other applicable law; or the application proposes activities which are otherwise ineligible under this Part.

Such objections should include both an identification of the requirements not met and, in the case of objections made on the grounds that the description of needs and objectives is plainly inconsistent with significant, generally available facts and data, the data upon which the persons rely. Although HUD will consider objections submitted at any time, such objections should be submitted within 30 days of the publication of the notice that the application has been submitted to HUD, as described in paragraph (1) (3) below. In order to ensure that objections submitted will be considered during the review process, HUD will not approve an application until at least 45 days after receipt of an application.

## The One World Church System

Just as the Bible teaches us that there will be a one world government, it also tells us there will be a one church system. This should come to focus about the same time of the Mark of the Beast. The nations of the world are moving into their end-time positions for the Word of God to be fulfilled. Many experts agree that the United Nations and the Ecumenical World Council of Churches are fast leading the world into a one world government and a one-world church system. God has foretold the World Ruler, namely the Beast, will come into power when ten nations join together and give their power to the Beast.

The second beast, or False Prophet, which rises from the earth, has religious power and will merge all religions together. God has spoken to His True Church in Rev. 18:4, saying, "And I heard another voice from heaven saying, come out of her my people, that ye be not partakers of her sins, and that ye receive not her plagues." These Saints, with which the Beast will make war, will be persecuted for their belief and refusal to worship the Beast. None but False Church will be allowed the freedom of public worship; while the true Christians will have to worship in secret. These saints will have to trust God to fulfill their needs just as the Israelites of old did. They will wash their robes white with prayers, fasting and tears. God has never failed His people and He will supply all their needs in their time of trouble.

Plans are worked out to dissolve the UNO to make way for a "World Tribunal" which will seize all possessions, and all savings and bank deposits. Every man, woman and child will receive a certain amount of money and a number. This money is already available and deposited in a bank and waiting for distribution. Everyone with a number will be employed either in the administrative, the commerce, the industrial, or the agricultural branch.
