Tent Revival Host Shares Pulpit With Local Pastors

A tent meeting is being held in Cross Plains, a trial venture by Cross Plains Ministerial Fellowship through the cooperation of Bro. Alvin Ward of Stanton. Services begin at 8 p.m.

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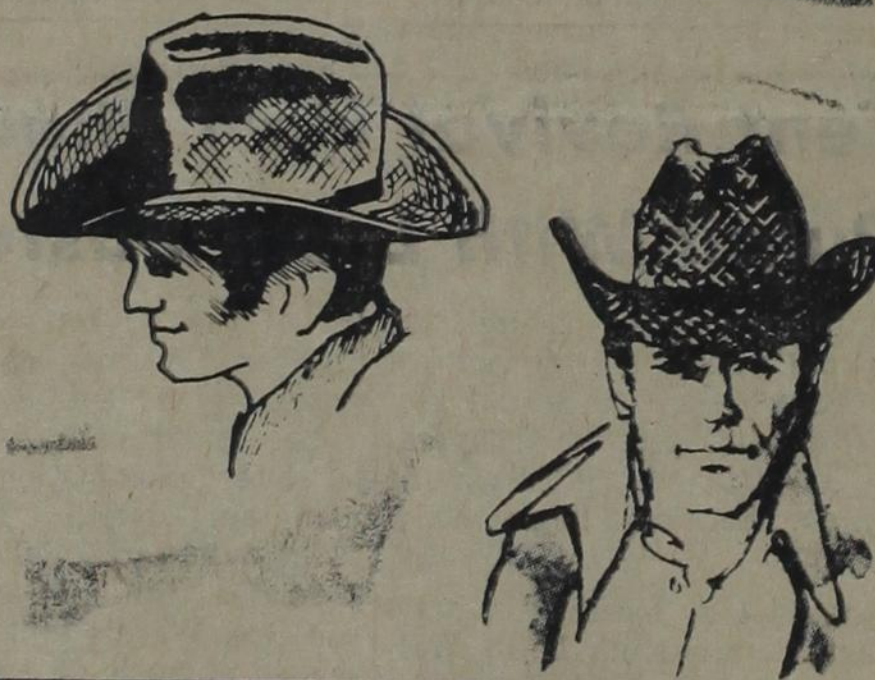
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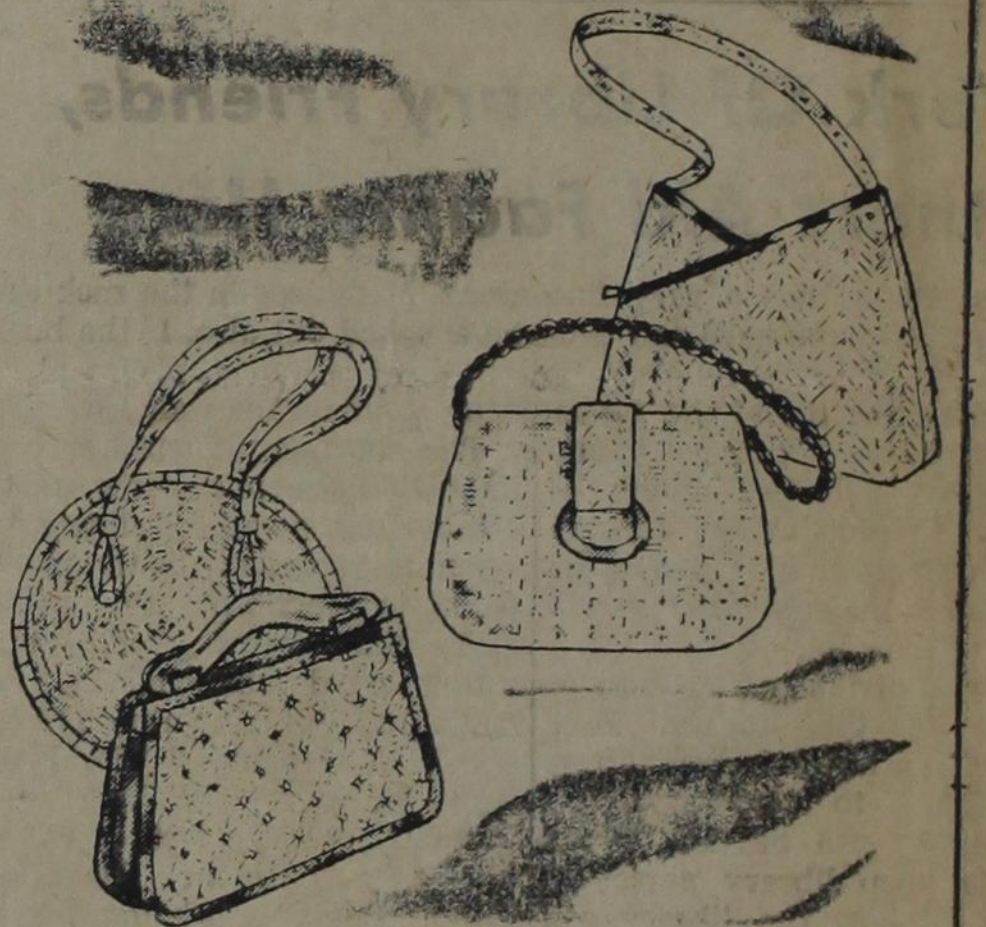

Virtue Vindicated, The Earth Is Round!

Perhaps many have wondered why there was no brilliant, convincing offering of wit and learning in last week's Cross Plains Review. Had that great brain weakened with advancing years? Had that magnificent physique been weakened by the backhanded stabs and underhanded innuendos of lesser minds, even, perhaps minds capable of strategic misrepresentations and of terminological inexactitude? No, I finished the typing begun at 5 a.m. after a restful night's slumber of two hours, at 9:30 a.m. After a bath and a 16 ounce cup of English Breakfast, it was 10:35 a.m. when I got to the office of the Review, and the paper was made up. So, it appears separately but conjunctively, this week.

I decided, in fairness to all concerned, that the president of the bank, should be informed by research and conclusions at once. I had reproductions of the article made, the one appearing in this week's Review, and gave the two sheets to Mr. Lunnell. Summarized, his comments were that he gave neither guidance nor direction to the Mayor or Council; that he had not been aware that all projects shall be monitored by HUD to insure that low- and moderate-income persons are principally benefitted by the program. This shows the poorest staff work by the City Council and the Mayor since the Little Bighorn. With one and a half million dollars involved surely it is not asking too much to have someone familiar enough with the way the money is directed to be spent to advise the President of the ONLY bank of how and why the projects were developed as they were. This, primarily to insure the bank president were kept above criticism. Particularly when the major project might be criticized as possibly having been prepared as a very simply accomplished project utilizing almost entirely unskilled labor and one which has neither the detailed specifications nor the critical inspection requirement essential to Government work.

This type of project, when found by a Contractor fortunate enough to run across it, is called a big fat pig. Working as Senior Engineer at the Wilmington Refinery of Union Oil, I designed one, unintentionally. The project involved several thousand feet of 4" welded piping within the explosive area of the refinery. Upon opening the bids I found one contractor had bid three-fourths of my estimate. As all the contractors were friendly with each other and with me, I asked if I had their permission to let one of the contractors withdraw his bid. The H & W super spoke up to say he thought that would be his bid and if so he wanted to let it stand. I read off the other bids and his and awarded the contract to H & W.

Naturally I watched with interest and chargin when he brought in his first material. It conformed in every respect to the API specifications and the contract requirements. He had managed to dig up the only available 40 foot lengths of

butt welding pipe. As the other requirements were the same, regardless of pipe length, he had about half the welding to do and pocketed for his owner 25% extra. I suggested he give Union Oil some of that 25%, and he suggested I go to a warmer climate.

There seems to be an underlying consistency in the improper nomenclature and misleading terminology which would lead one to believe that it is intended to mislead and/or deliberately distract to prevent careful analysis.

seem to be the work of a very junior engineer or one completely unable to visualize the project.

The designation of what may be a very large dry well, "R. O. W." to be finished as "Greenbelt Park". This is correctly a greenbelt, without quotes, from the Green Belt encircling London, England, not Ontario. Despite my experience, I can not conceive how a 650' long dry well can become a belt encircling Cross Plains.

Under "Project Key" is what is customarily designated Legend. One item is designated "Occupied houses without sewerage". Neglecting the crudity in making the singular plural I have never seen, heard of or read of a house or houses having sewerage. As the criteria states, "Need will be measured by the percent of units which lack plumbing . . ." It is believed this false and misleading usage is intended to imply that the houses so designated are without plumbing when in fact they have plumbing connected to septic tanks.

My familiarity with Sewerage Systems extends from the Cloaca Maxima to the Base Arienne Leon-Couvron to the twin 10 foot units running through 23rd Street and dumping into the East River at Bellevue; the number of barrel state sewers running under the piers along the North or Hudson River, the sewers in the bluestone of Southwest Dallas, the sewerage system on the six square miles of the Cactus Ordnance Works at Elter, Texas, and the sewerage systems at Sidi Slimane AFB in Morocco.

An indication is given that Architectural Barriers are to be removed from between the Dairy Queen and Lawrence Farm and Ranch. Like many others I have observed the area since the beginning of both and I can recall nothing calling for action under 570.201 (k) "Special projects directed to the removal of material and architectural barriers which restrict the mobility and accessibility of elderly or handicapped persons to publicly owned and privately owned buildings, facilities, and improvements." The most obvious Architectural Barriers in Cross Plains are those at the Bank, at Higginbothams and at the Post Office. At the meeting when and where I was the only Public Member present, the one at which Mr. O'Neal said I took up two hours of the time, I reminded the Mayor Pro Tem and the Council Members of the Architectural Barrier at the Post Office

and of the elderly Citizen I had told, "I shall not insult you by offering help," and of his reply. By this reference I am reminding Mr. O'Neal that if he had done his homework and presented a proper, intelligent Grant Application in conformance with the mandatory requirements of 570.200 (g) Consultant Activities I would not have had to take two hours or the twenty minutes at the last meeting. In this connection reference is made to the appalling lack of conformance with 570.304 (d) (1) (2) (3) (4) (5). This non-conformance is so consistent, so deceiving, so misleading that it is difficult to not impossible to believe it can be unintentional. Because of this, above; his remark at the Public Meeting that the Mayor had asked him to work with me and he had refused, a remark susceptible of only one interpretation and as the Canons of Ethics For Engineers provides that when an Engineer has proof another Engineer has been "unethical, illegal or unfair in his practice he should so advise the proper authority." In the present case this will be done by asking The Texas State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers to hold an Ad Hoc Hearing on my charges.

I am particularly disturbed by the failure of the Grant Application to deal with the elimination of the slum and blighted area in conformance with 570.302 (b) (1). The area to be considered is bounded on the North by 6th Street, on the East by D Street, on the South by 1st Street and on the West by Chestnut Street. The area is easily identified by the garbage strewn lots, the trash littered vacant lots, the abandoned houses and the empty, weed covered and debris littered areas that only a short time ago were well kept homes and lots. This slum and blighted area has been repeatedly discussed with the Bank President, the Mayor, Councilman Franke and has been inspected by the Texas Board of Health. It has been seen and commented on by a Department of Justice visitor and by numerous other witnesses. It is a valid project and can only have been omitted intentionally.

Finally, I am extremely disturbed by Mr. O'Neal's statement that applicants for housing rehabilitation would be required to line up and apply for it. There is no such requirement in the Criteria, quite the contrary. The rehabilitation standards are to be set by Neighborhood Committees and are to be for the entire area.

It is recommended the Criteria be followed, that a committee be formed composed entirely of people from the slum and blighted area delineated above.

I am very hurt that the deputation to HUD in Dallas on last Thursday did not ask me to participate. I would not have accepted, but as the trip was directly caused by my advice and suggestions, I feel I should have been honored by being recognized.

ENGINEERING ETHICS OR NEVER DISCUSS FEE SPLITTING IN PUBLIC.

I imagine I was the most upset of all those at the meeting at the City Hall June Nineteenth, last. I received the Criteria at three that afternoon and when I saw the Mayor at Seven-thirty I thanked him for the implied compliment, that I could make anything out of it in four hours — I had to take thirty minutes to eat. I don't feel bad about it as it became very obvious during the evening that no one had read it.

In preparing any program it is first necessary to have a project. Then it is described so the project writer can understand it; what it will do if provided; where it will go and what it will do and what it will cause; its effect on other property, people and things; it is justified, the reason for it, savings it will make in space, manpower, utilities or in increased production.

Finally, the horrible things that will happen if the project is not approved, funded, designed and constructed and accepted as either an useful piece of plant equipment or redesigned so some use can be made of it.

That is in private industry. In government projects the work is much simpler. Acceptable projects are spelled out, the limitations and the criteria are supplied and the only thing the programmer has to be able to do is read and understand the criteria. It is, of course, helpful to have some general knowledge of the project subject.

For example, if a project has anything to do with sewerage disposal it is important to know that the material is disposed of and purified by oxidation and aerobic bacterial action, possibly followed by chlorination. Septic tank anaerobic bacterial action causes the decomposition and initial purification. This difference is why the presence of oxygen is essential in a sewage treatment plant and the necessity of its absence in a septic tank requires the "blanket", the mat on top of the septic tank contents must not have its integrity broken. If it is the tank will not operate until it is restored. Overloading of a sewage disposal plant can "poison" it, meaning that the material is covered with a foul, black, evil smelling slime the oxygen can not penetrate. Then all sewage must be removed and disposed of — generally by burying. The entire plant is then washed down to remove all traces of slime and started up again. As solids are a definite sign of overloading — the retention time is too short to complete the oxidation and aerobic action and as it is understood that solids are constantly present in the effluent from our disposal plant it would be a most serious mistake to overload and "poison" our plant. The resultant shutdown of the plant and closing all business having a requirement for a sewerage system would not only seriously harm Cross Plains but might permanently abort its prospects. It must be considered that that the required Ecological Certificates were either deliberately or inadvertently misleading.

It may have been noticed that Mr. O'Neal's fervid support of the sewer project exceeded that of the cool, impassionate computer of mathematical balances. To impute that this was affected by Paragraph (g) of section 570.200 might be an injustice. The pertinent sentences are quoted. Parenthetically, all quotations from the Criteria are enclosed in parentheses, (.....) with emphasis neither added nor subtracted. (Therefore, there is no alternative to the GS-18 limitation on compensa-

tion of consultants which is required by statute. The current rate of compensation under Federal law for a GS-18 is \$47,500 per year, with a daily rate calculated to be \$182.68.) A GS-18 has an equivalent or assimilated rank of full General or Admiral.

I can find nothing in the Criteria calling in any manner for the wiping out of septic tanks or even, my personal bete noire, cess pools. Texas law does govern their construction and location as does the law of all States, to the best of my knowledge. Such intemperate postulations have no place in engineering discussions which should be coldly factual.

(All programs, whether entitled to the presumption or not, shall be subject to monitoring by HUD to ensure that low — and moderate — income persons are principally benefited by the program as a whole.)

(The Act also requires the applicant to certify that its community development program has been developed so as to give maximum feasible priority to activities which will benefit low — and moderate — income families, or aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight.)

(b) General Requirements. (1) All projects and activities must either principally benefit low — and moderate — income persons, or aid in the prevention or elimination of slums and blight, or meet other community development needs having a particular urgency.)

(The requirement that the need be of recent origin is consistent with current policy, which has proved workable. If a need is not of recent origin, and a community has not acted to address it, the urgency of the need becomes questionable.)

(A condition will generally be considered to be of recent origin if it developed or became critical within 18 months preceding the application for funds)

(The reasons are that there is no evidence that there is a significant pattern of neglect of low-income persons in favor of moderate-income persons who are defined as members of households whose income does not exceed 80 percent of the SMSA or state non-metropolitan median ... This section provides a clear basis for dealing with abuses and HUD intends to enforce it.)

There are a host of other quotations that could be used, all pertinent and all making clear that a non low-income persons including project is not only not going to fly but it is never going to get a wheel off the ground.

Roughly, \$15,000 per house is proposed to be spent to provide connection to a sewerage system when, I was told by one of the Councilmen, a perfectly workable septic tank is in place. It might be cheaper to buy the houses involved and tear them down. It is true septic tanks and cess pools require cleaning but this obligation is balanced by the hundreds of dollars saved by not having had to pay over the years for a sewerage connection.

There is not time or space to go into the very interesting subject of just what Mr. O'Neal meant when he said the Mayor had asked him to work with me and he was going to refuse to do so. The Mayor, immured for thirty years in his ivory academic tower and separated from the hurly burly of the common world may not have understood.

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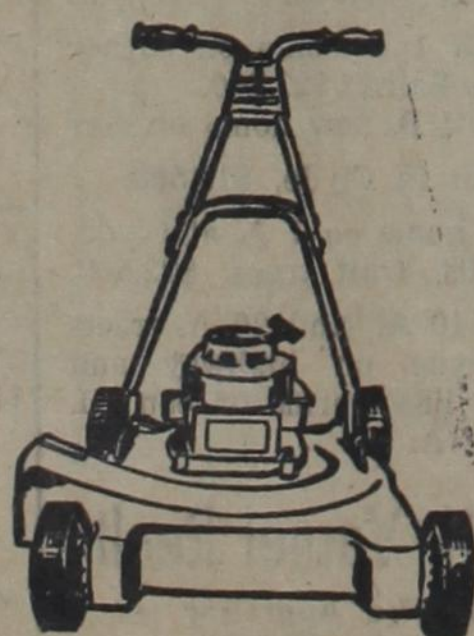

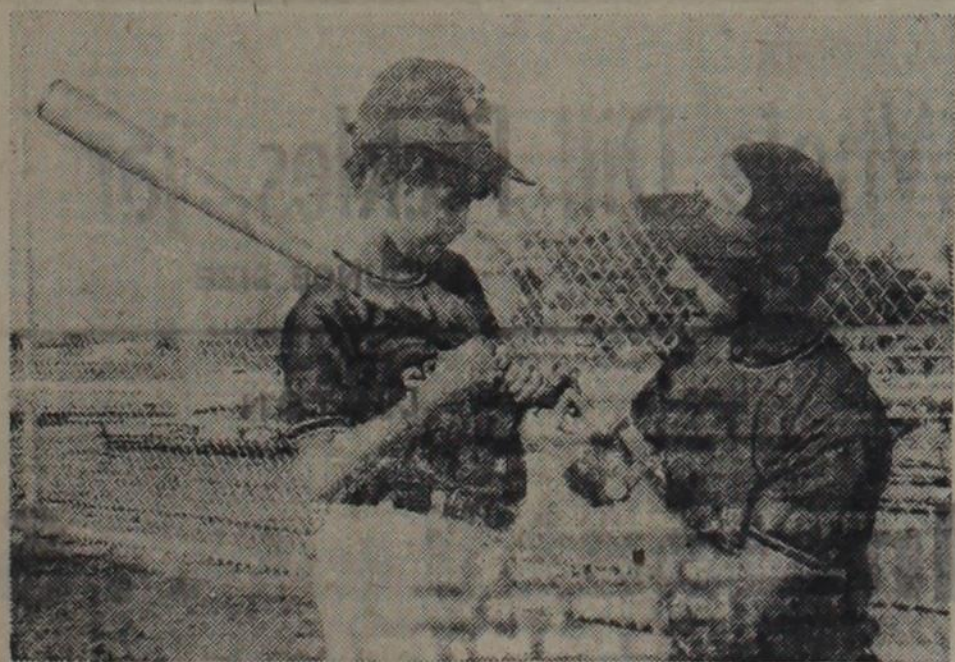
