



Virtue Vindicated, The Earth Is Round!



(Matt. 15:14)

The Holy scriptures are replete with thought provoking statements which, are intended to serve among other things as stop signs. They in effect say; danger, stop and examine closely the way you are going. For one of those such scriptures look closely at the grammatical structure of Proverbs 14:12: "There is a way (singular) that seemeth right unto a man (singular), but the end thereof (singular) are the ways (plural) of death." Grammatically incorrect perhaps, truth however, that cannot be stated better. In the same book chapter 9:21, the author again points to the same danger, he states: "There are many devices in a man's heart; nevertheless the counsel of the Lord, that shall stand.'

A very strong allegation right Look againat God's revealed message to man: "O LORD, I know that the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." Judging from the hundreds of human devised religions and the millions who accept and follow them, I would say not many believe that Jeremiah knew what he was talking about (Jer. 10:23).

Let's try another one: Isaiah 55:6-9. "Seek ye the Lord while He may be found, call ye upon Him while He is near: let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon.

For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways My ways, saith the Lord. For as the Heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways, and My thoughts than your thoughts."

Truth is a unity and never changes, that which is perfect cannot be improved upon, God is not pragmatic and neither is His gospel plan of salvation.
