Phone Rates Change, Some Up, Some Down

Officials of Continental Telephone Company of Texas announced recently that its rates will change as a result of its most recent petition to the Public Utility Commission for rate increases.

Company President James Miles said, "Although the Public Utility Commission granted us considerably less than we felt we needed, we are proceeding to place the new rates into effect retroactive to July 3, 1978 in accordance with the Commission's order." "Actually" Hile said, "the new rates will have only minor effects on current residential and business customers and many can expect rate reductions. Most of the additional revenue authorized us by the Commission will be received from increased rates for one-time services such as installation and wiring charges affecting mostly new subscribers, and the line services provided by the local exchanges."

Continental customers throughout the State will begin seeing the effects of the new rates starting with the August 16th billing cycle. An insert offering further explanation and a partial rate schedule for comparison purposes will be included in a complete cycle of billing beginning August 16, 1978.

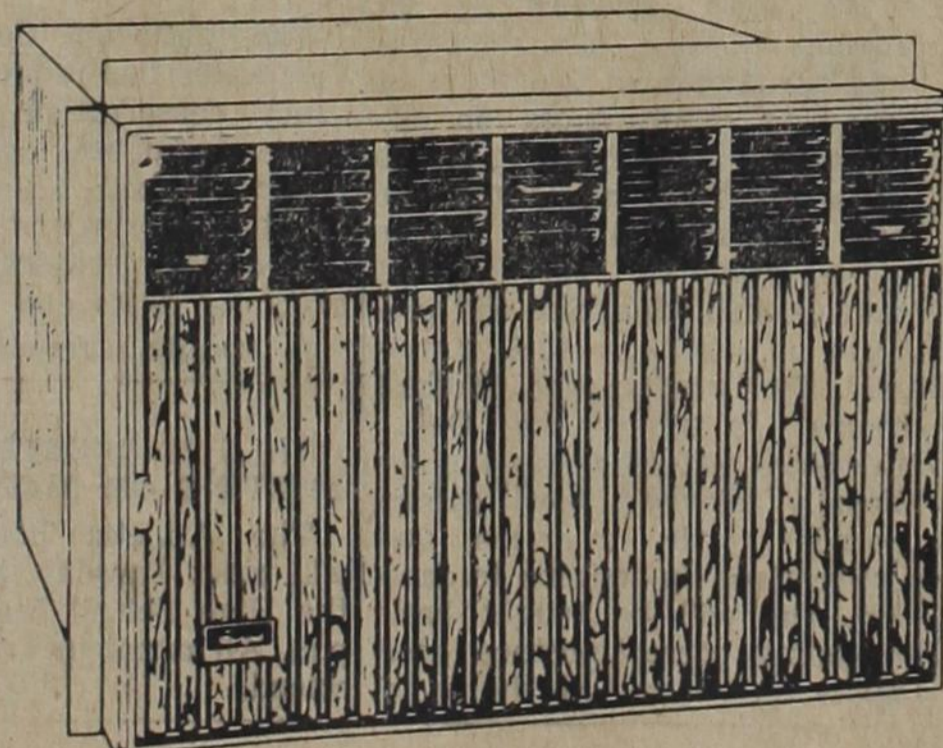

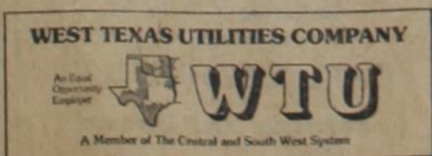
