A brief history of the Cross The paper, bearing a Coman-Plains Higginbotham's store was published in the "Retailer." It follows.

"In June, 1914, R. W. Higginbotham purchased the property on which the store in Cross Plains is now located. The six lots were bought from four different owners for a total consideration of \$1,722.40. A building was built and the business operated under the name of Higginbotham Trading Co. 


