Swift, who close the service with prayer.

Showers Last Week Net City 1.30 Inches

Rain showers which fell here last week brought the City of Cross Plains 1.30 inches of badly needed moisture.

Some rain fell in Cross Plains with the thundershower which struck here last Thursday evening about 7 o'clock. Damage was minimal, although some tender plants or budding fruit trees might have sustained some damage from the brief flurry of ice which fell for a few seconds. The stones ranged up to marble size or larger.

A thundershower brought about .50 of an inch of moisture to Cross Plains early Thursday morning, and the hail preceded rain which measured .65 of an inch. The latter shower fell quickly and some of it ran off.

Again early Saturday morning another brief shower yielded .15 of an inch of moisture.

Some measurements around this area indicated about two inches in the Rowden and Pioneer areas, 1.50 in the Sabanno sector and 1.00 in the Cottonwood community.

The life-giving rainfall boosted young gardens and small grain crops considerably. The water also eased the threat of fire for a time. Stockmen and ranchers also need more rainfall in the near future to boost ranges and put water in earthen stock tanks, many of which are reported to be getting low.

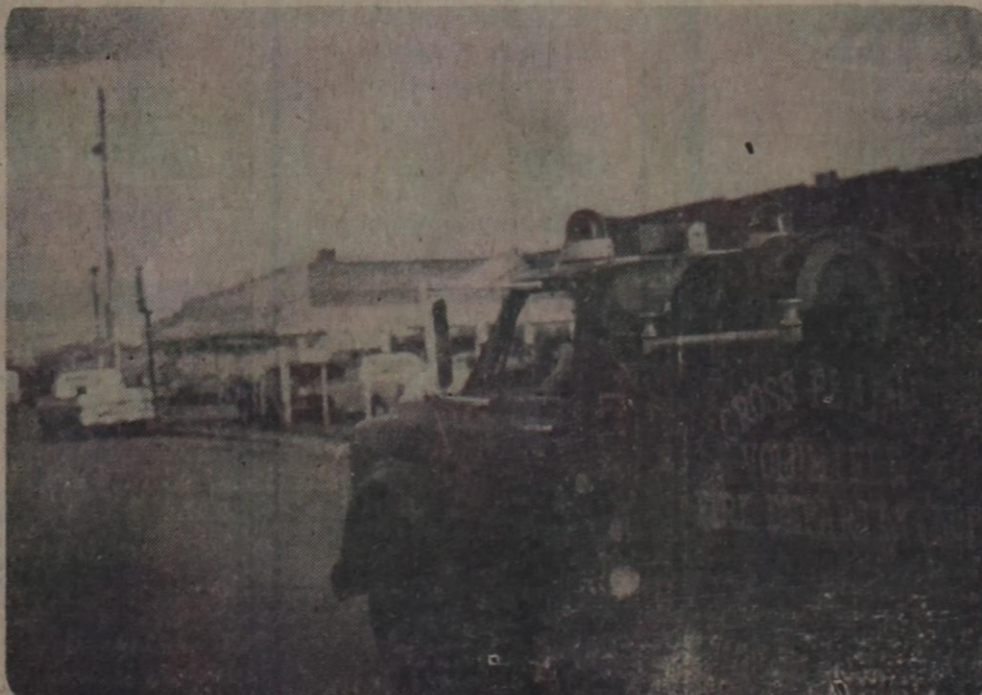

To the Voters of the Cross Plains Independent School District

I am asking your support for my second 3-year term on the C.P.I.S.D. Board of Trustees. I feel we have a good school board, although young in years of service, we have matured rapidly. One member has seven years service, 3 more with 3 years service and 2 with 2 years service. When I was elected 3 years ago, we were in a bad financial position — within 4 months we had to borrow about \$20,000 to complete the school year. Last year we operated in the black the first time since I was elected and now we are in good financial condition. This could not be accomplished by 1, 2 or 3 members—it took all members working together to do this. It takes 4 or more members to pass or defeat a proposal that is presented to us. I take no more than one-seventh of the credit for this or any other changes we have made — they are made by all of us working together. This has been done with a slight decrease in total assessed taxes from 1978 to 1979. This has been done without cutting any of the curriculum.

The most pressing item facing the new school board is the high school. Three years ago we worked on the 5-year plan that is a mandate for all schools in the state. Because of finances we put off doing anything with the high school as long as possible (5 years). The state approved a \$50,000 remodel job on the high school the 5th year of the 5-year plan, but they have come back and asked us to do it sooner. Hopefully the Citizens Committee working on this problem, and the school board can come up with a proposal to present to you, the voters, in a bond issue to solve this problem. You, the voters, will have the final say as to what and how much is done by a bond issue. There are a few that wanted to do nothing and a few that want to build a million dollar high school that would take care of twice the high school students we have now. I am not for either of these extreme proposals, but I am for doing what is necessary to keep our high school. Whatever is done there will be no federal or state money to help with it. It will all come from local taxes and whatever is proposed, you will be informed how much your taxes will increase if a certain bond issue is passed.

I would be less than honest with you if I told you your taxes would be lowered or even remain the same. No matter who is elected your taxes will be increased (unless they are frozen). Even if there was no bond issue the County-wide Tax Appraisal District will place a substantial increase in not only school taxes, but also city and county taxes. This is also mandated by the legislature and the entire state will be affected by this. How much they are raised depends on the amount of the bond issue, if passed, and how much the school board watches the operation and maintenance of the school. I believe in getting a dollar's good out of each tax dollar spent.

I am a conservative candidate but not to the extent of sacrificing a desirable education and learning environment for the students.

Your vote and influence in the April 5th election will be appreciated.

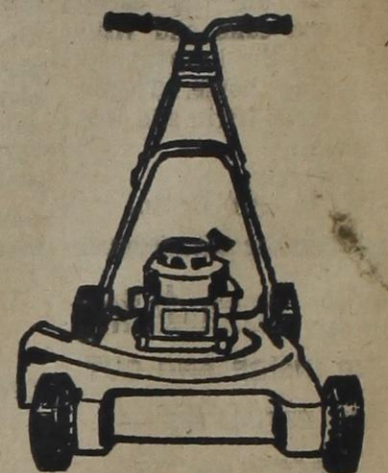

Not What Can You Do For Me But What Will I Do For You

When you vote for me to become your Number One Servant, your Mayor, you are not doing either of us a favor. I will be getting a disagreeable job well within my capability; to restore Cross Plains to the place it held twelve years ago. You will be getting a Public Servant who will insist in obedience to the Law and to the Morality and Ethics that once made Cross Plains such a pleasant place to live in.

Over eleven years ago I thought I had been asked to take the job of Fire Marshal. The City Council asked me one of the most stupid questions ever put to me and I have had some dillies. They wanted to know why I wanted the job of Fire Marshal. All I could tell them was that I saw it as an opportunity to do something for the community I had chosen to die in. I did not know then that Cross Plains did not want a Fire Marshal but a Patsy. Not someone who could determine the cause and origin of a fire but a Patsy who would ignore the obvious and gloss over arson.

I discussed the matter with the Texas Deputy Fire Marshal who told me he would come in on my verbal request and if one half of my findings of fire hazards in the High School were factual he would close the High School. I pointed out I had lived in Cross Plains less than a year and that while the honor of being ridden out of town on a rail was great I would prefer it be done for some other reason than because I was the cause of the High School being closed. When the Mayor and Council flatly refused to pass the enabling act necessary to authorize the Fire Marshal to administer an oath to witnesses I realized I had never been given anything in writing making me the Fire Marshal and never would be.

The most damning indictment of Public Officials I have ever known was that by Texas Education Agency — "... the State Fire Marshal's Office, The Texas Department of Health Resources ... the Texas Education Agency, and others have pointed out the facility's numerous deficiencies, it is questionable that renovation and repair is feasible. ... Even in the interest of the health and safety of its children the district does not appear to sense the potential hazard of the continuous use of the high school facility." Emphasis added.

Your Mayor not only has the right but also the duty and obligation to inspect, find out and have corrected any defect or deficiency in any building, structure or place accessible to or frequented by the public and most particularly and especially where such access or frequenting is by the young, the elderly, the infirm or the ill. One of my first acts as your Servant, your Mayor, will be to secure a qualified and competent Fire Marshal, qualified and competent Electrical and Plumbing Inspectors. I shall make the initial inspections of schools, facilities for the elderly, ill and infirm and of buildings intended for the use of the public and/or for public gatherings in company with the Texas State Fire Marshal or his deputy and a designated Texas Department of Health official. The findings made as a result of such inspections will be published in the Cross Plains Review as soon as possible. My personal findings and recommendations will be published within two weeks of the inspection.

Obvious misuse of public funds will cease whether such misuse is inadvertent, malicious or felonious. In particular housing rehabilitation will be initiated for the most needy and deserving. Under your present Mayor one of the first, if not the first, to be rehabilitated was bought as a speculation from a widow who could not afford the extensive repairs necessary. The buyer owns another property. Although the Public Notice concerning this rehabilitation states: "The applicant shall promise to occupy the dwelling, health permitting, for a period of 36 months after completion of the work"; there have been two separate real estate organizations inspecting the housing and grounds.

From the Abilene paper I believe it is a HUD requirement that a standard placard showing that the rehabilitation is being done with HUD Federal funds is to be placed on or in front of the property before work is begun and to remain thirty days after the work has been completed this has not been done at any of the sites. I can understand Mayor Edmondson's wish to have his friends embarrassment but he should not break the law, especially Federal Law, without having in writing from HUD a waiver of the requirement. It would make enforcement of Law most difficult for a new Mayor.

Our Tax Assessor should keep in mind that the addition of five thousand dollars in repairs should be reflected in the assessed value of the property. From the beginning of my tenure the tax rolls will be open and readily accessible to the public. There should be no secrecy about the tax records. An unremitting effort will be made to correct the enormous increase in assessments on the property of the elderly. This is not totally effective now but will almost prohibit the sale of the property to another or upon decease.

I cannot promise results in days but quickly the weeds, debris, rubbish and garbage strewn along the sides of streets and avenues will be cleaned up and a program of weed eradication and prevention begun. I believe by next fall the last of the "barrow ditches" will have been graded and the storm waters confined and directed on a proper course. Of course this problem, like most Cross Plains problems is confined to the less affluent areas. So with the littered streets, the engulment with rats and mice, the destruction of grass and trees. I shall never forget the subservient cringing of Mr. Antonio Alvarez, a Community Development Representative from the Dallas Area Office of HUD as he stood in the ditch; made by Mayor Edmondson during the destruction of my grass; and looked up fawningly at Mayor Edmondson standing on the walk leading to my porch. His liquid brown eyes were aglow with adoration as he asked, "Do you allow the people in this barrio to have sidewalks?"

"He permits them, as long as they are inside the property line," I interjected.

Mayor Edmondson disagreed. "I permit them as long as they are kept behind the gas meter," he said.

At this width, behind the gas meter to the property line may be as little as six inches and seldom more than a foot it will be noted Mayor Edmondson's dictum is still: "Behind the property line."

I may have stupidly given the impression that I believe that Mayor Edmondson dislikes or wishes deliberately to injure or harm the elderly. I believe it is more that he is annoyed with them and wishes they would dry up and blow away like tumbleweeds.

This is a common result where anyone who for most of his life has not had power to go with authority. A school teacher has authority in his class room but he does not have power to say, "build this road, tear out that grassy shoulder, open there a bar room, tear down those homes and let a real estate office rise, rip out those mesquite trees and make a buffalo wallow in their place."

All First Sergeants correct this with young Second Lieutenants, flush with authority of a gold bar and brimming over with power over men for the first time. Correct it but not until after an exercise during which the Lieutenant contradicts the advice of his First Man takes his squad into a gully without reconnoitering and has the Empire declare them wiped out.

I am afraid I am Mayor Edmondson's First Sergeant, more knowledgeable, more technically proficient, more professionally correct and obviously more intelligent. Better equipped but not one hundredth as lovable. I made all my mistakes early on, when it was relatively unimportant and very inexpensive. And I learned how not to make mistakes.

Figure it out to the most minute detail and then let it sit for a while. Go over it and correct all the mistakes you can find. Do it over. If possible have someone check it, or check it yourself. Let it cool off as long as possible so it's new to you when you check it and find all those mistakes you can't believe you could have made. Build it and if it works the biggest mistakes must have been found.

If it doesn't work try to find some work for which you are better fitted.

Long Distance 'Phone Rate Increase Asked

AT&T, parent company of the Bell System, is asking for a 10.5 per cent increase in rates for all out-of-state long distance calls. It is their first request for a general rate increase in over four years. The announcement was made locally by Continental Telephone.

AT&T is asking the Federal Communications Commission for an across-the-board increase of 10.5 per cent. The company has asked that this take place in two steps. If approved, the first increase would raise rates by 5.65 per cent and become effective June 1, 1980. On October 1, 1980, an additional increase would become effective, thus raising current rates by a total of 10.5 per cent.

According to Alan Armstrong of Baird, customer service manager for Continental, all phone companies concur in AT&T charges for long distance services so that rates are uniform. Therefore, any changes in long distance rates approved for

Charles Sheeler, Bob Anguish, Turner Simpson, Larry Smith and Butch Bolter.

AT&T would affect all telephone users in the nation regardless of which company provides the service.

The Continental spokesman explained that each non-Bell company remits long distance revenue generated by their customers to AT&T. Through an elaborate settlement process, they are then reimbursed for their costs in helping to provide the service.

As an example of the proposed rates applicable for long distance calls, the full weekday direct dialed rate for a one minute call from most Texas points to New York City would go from the current 52c to 55c in June, and up to 57c in October. That same call dialed at night after 11 p.m. would go from 21c to 22c, and finally to 23c.

The increase would apply to all out-of-state long distance calls made in the U. S. (except calls to and from Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands); calls involving Mexico, Canada, and all foreign businesses for providing interstate toll free "800 service."
