## DEEP OIL TEST IS SPUDED SATURDAY ON McDERMITT LAND

### Standard Oil Company Begins Ellenberg Exploration 7 Miles Southwest Of Town.

Standard Oil Company of Kansas which last week completed Callahan county's first Hickory sand test spudded another deep oil test Saturday on the McDermitt ranch, seven miles southwest of here. The well known as the Kate Womack number one is located 2,640 feet from the west and 330 feet from the south line of the George Eubanks survey 185.

## Gas Well West Of Town Flowing Oil From Ellenberg

Contract calls for drilling to a depth of 4,300 feet with rotary equipment, and there is a possibility that if the test fails to encounter a commercial well in the Ellenberg line that it will be deepened to the Hickory sand.

It is believed in Cross Plains that two more wells in the vicinity of this field, which is producing from the Ellenberg line, will be started in the near future. Unconfirmed reports say that one of the fields has been "turned" out by Ferguson and Ingelwright and will be located north of the discovery well. The report also has it that Ferguson and Ingelwright will drill their next well, the third, on the East-Township, South-Cross, East of the discovery well.

### County Agent Column

Twenty-three farmers gathered at the Frank Browning orchard last Friday afternoon to hear Paul Gregg, Extension Entomologist from A. & M. College, give the latest control measures to eradicate the codling moth from apple orchards.

In order to produce fruit free from worms a spraying schedule is important in any orchard, and for the codling moth in particular, said Gregg. After a discussion of the habits of the codling moth worm, Mr. Gregg recommended the following spraying schedule for Callahan County apple growers to control the codling moth worms.

**First Spray**—When most petals have fallen to control worms and scale use: 6 lbs. wettable sulphur, 3 lbs. lead arsenate, 100 gallons of water (and if aphids are a problem add 1 pint of black leaf 40 and 4 lbs. of lime to spray.) **Second Spray**—10 days after first spray to control worms and scale: Same as first spray and do not add the aphid control part. **Third Spray**—14 days after second spray for worms and scale: 6 lbs. wettable sulphur, 3 lbs. of 50% wettable DDT per 100 gallons of water. **Fourth Spray**—14 days after third spray for worms and scale: 6 lbs.

of wettable sulphur, 2 lbs. of 50% wettable DDT per 100 gallons of water. **Fifth Spray**—10 to 14 days after fourth spray to prevent rot in shipping or storage, 4 lbs. of copper sulphate, 6 lbs. lime to 50 gallons of water.

Spraying equipment was discussed and the group observed Mr. Browning's new spraying equipment, and before leaving the group observed the first stand of vetch and 1 1/2 in the orchard which Mr. Browning says can't be beat for soil building.

#### DDT vs Flies

A nation wide drive is underway to kill out millions of pests that have hampered health since Adam and Eve. Flies are the pests and DDT is the weapon.

The people of Texas and Callahan County, rural and urban have never had the chance they have this spring to make war on flies. DDT has proved itself a fly killer.

Most recent research has shown that the worst of the disease carrying flies can be killed by spraying DDT around the places where flies feed. Farmers should use DDT around the milking sheds, barns, pig pens, and lots and in the towns in the county, city officials should urge the spraying of garbage cans

and trash cans in the rear of stores, and in the home, 2 1/2 to 5% DDT is very effective against houseflies.

The more people that get in the fight against flies early, the less bother we'll have with flies this summer.

#### A New Treatment For Screwworms In Livestock

A new treatment for screwworm-infested livestock has been developed at the Menard, Texas laboratory. Although not superior to smear 62, which was developed at the same laboratory a few years ago and since that time has been the recommended treatment, it is nevertheless a satisfactory substitute and should be used if satisfactory materials are not available to make smear 62. Turkey red oil, one of the ingredients of smear 62, has been scarce in recent years, and many of the supplies obtained have been off grade.

The new remedy, which is called EQ smear 82, is composed of the following ingredients:

Ingredients	Parts by weight
Diphenylamine	35
Benzene	32
Triton X-300 (sodium salt of an alkylated aryl polyether sulfate)	2
n-Butyl alcohol	10
Lampblack	21

The smear should be applied to the screwworm infested wound with a 1-inch brush, care being taken to push the material well down into the pockets made by the mag-

got. The area around the wound where blood and wound exudate have made the animal attractive to flies and susceptible to infestation should be thoroughly painted.

To protect uninfested wounds, such as those caused by shear cuts, castration, dehorning, docking, and wire cuts, it is sufficient to cover the raw tissue and surrounding area thoroughly with a coating of the smear.

This remedy kills screwworms quickly, and after its application large numbers of them drop out of the wound, carrying a considerable amount of the protective chemical with them. For this reason it is a good practice to make a second application from 24 to 48 hours after the first to insure proper coating of the wound. Thereafter, under average conditions, regular treatments twice each week should be given until the wound is healed.

Prepare the remedy well away from open flames and do not have lighted cigarettes or cigars around during the process.

The benzene in the smear is highly volatile and will evaporate quickly if left in an open container. It is therefore advisable that the smear be kept tightly covered in a cool place when not in use.



### MAY CONTRACT PART OF HIWAY 80 IN JUNE

According to Judge J. L. Farmer, the commissioners court plans to have the seven mile stretch of road between Baird and Clyde clear of houses in early June so that the Texas Highway Commission may proceed with contracting and improving this portion of the road.

Commissioners at a meeting last week reported all right of way between Baird and Clyde had been secured except for four pieces of property which the right of eminent domain will have to be used in order to secure the right of way.

The court expects to secure all right of way between Baird and Clyde before beginning west of Clyde. After the Clyde - Abilene stretch has been secured then the work will begin on securing right of way from Baird to the Eastland county line through Putnam.

Commissioner I. G. Mobley stated the court would like to see actual work begin between Baird and Clyde in June. The county is required to clear all buildings and fences from the right of way.



### SWEETER THAN SACCHARINE

A substance called L-N-propoxy-2-amino-1-nitrobenzene soon may be satisfying the sweet tooth of the United States in a colossal way.

It's 1,000 times as sweet as cane sugar and so potent that a tiny pinch on the tongue can be tasted for half an hour.

Prof. Pieter Eduard Verkaede of Delf Technical University, Holland, said in an address to the Chicago section of the American Chemical Society that the substance was being manufactured in The Netherlands and that application for an American patent has been filed.

The newly discovered substance, a benzene derivative, is by far the sweetest known to man, he said. By comparison, saccharine, a coal tar derivative, is 200 to 700 times as sweet as cane sugar, and dulcine, only 70 to 250 times as sweet.

Recent reports from Austin indicate that traffic deaths in towns of less than 2,500 population increased up to 76 percent during 1946 and three out of every four traffic deaths in Texas during the year, occurred in small towns, on highways, or in unincorporated rural districts.

Incidentally, while our radio columnist was in Crockett recently, citizens pointed out the tree under which the famous hunter camped while on his way to San Antonio where he died gloriously in the Alamo. Davy moved into a new country in Tennessee when he was a young man. All he had to do on moving day was pour water on the fire whistle up the dogs. He was made justice of the peace and as he said, "I got along pretty well. I can wade the Mississippi, jump the Ohio, ride a streak o' lightning and slide down a honey-loast without a scratch. I can whip my weight in wildcats and if any gentlesnake pleases, for a \$10-bill, he can throw in a natcher. I can lug a bear too close for comfort and I can lick any man that's against Andrew Jackson."

SWEETER THAN SACCHARINE

A substance called I-N-propoxy-2-amino-1-nitrobenzene soon may be satisfying the sweet tooth of the United States in a colossal way.

It's 4,000 times as sweet as cane sugar and so potent that a tiny pinch on the tongue can be tasted for half an hour.

Prof. Pieter Eduard Verkade of Delf Technical University, Holland, said in an address to the Chicago section of the American Chemical Society that the substance was being manufactured in The Netherlands and that application for an American patent has been filed.

The newly discovered substance, a benzene derivative, is by far the sweetest known to man, he said. By comparison, saccharine, a coal tar derivative, is 200 to 700 times as sweet as cane sugar, and dulcine, only 70 to 250 times as sweet.
