## COMMISSIONERS TO DECIDE ON COUNTY HOSPITALS FATE

BAIRD — Callahan County Commissioners and hospital board members met Tuesday, October 29, to decide if the Callahan County Hospital shall be leased to the Texas Medical Assistance Service.

Callahan County Judge A. E. Dyer Jr., who attended the meeting in the County Court House explained, that the group is leasing or is otherwise connected with several other small hospitals in the surrounding area, including the Santa Anna Hospital, and other small Texas cities, and staffing them with Filipino Doctors. He said an offer had been received from the organization to lease the Callahan County Hospital. No decision had been made as of Tuesday afternoon, as to what would happen to the Hospital, if it was not leased to this organization.

Because the Hospital has no Baird

Doctor, it has been a growing concern to County Officials, because the Hospital has been increasingly expensive to operate.

Baird has not had a home town Doctor for approximately two years and Doctor J. E. Mikeska, Jr. of Clyde has been caring for the Baird Patients.

Callahan County Commissioners are Jiggs Shackelford of Putnam, Irvin Corn of Baird-Clyde, Lowell Johnson of Oplin and Duke Mitchell of Cross Plains.

This is where the Commissioners are as of now; but after Nov. 5, when the county re-districting is finalized they will be in charge of different precincts.

Hospital Board members are I. G. Mobley, of Putnam, Sterling Odom of Cross Plains, I. E. Warren of Baird and George Yantis of Clyde.

## Bears Nail Down Yellowhammers

BAIRD--The Bears nailed the Rotan Yellowhammers 12-0 here Friday night in the Bears' Den. Baird balanced their average at 2-2, and this was the first loss in three district 8-A games for Rotan.

Tight End David Williams started the scoring, in the second quarter, catching a 35 yard TD pass from tailbacker Mike Doty. Williams also caught a pass for 33 yards and one for 24 yards with both making big first downs.

Fullback Rudy Rodriguez, plunged over from the two for the second score in the third period. Rodriguez also moved the ball 58 yards in 14 carries and intercepted one pass while doing a great job from his linebacker position.

Tailbacker, Mike Doty moved the ball 119 yards in 27 carries, and played a very good game from his position.

The Bears played a good defensive game and never let the Yellowhammers get closer to the goal line than the Bears 25 yard line, thanks to the efforts of Joe Henley, Randy Fleming and the Bears' front 7.

The Bear's secondary also stopped most of Rotan's passing allowing the Yellowhammers to complete only four of 28 passes, totaling to 54 yards.

The Bears only allowed the Yellowhammers 170 yards total offense and eight first downs while the Bears came up with 183 yards on the ground and 109 in the air for a total of 292 yards.

This next Friday is an open night for the Bears, but Coach Bearden says it will give them time for plenty of practice, and they will be ready to meet the Merkel Badgers head on on Nov. 8 in Merkel. Sick 'em Bears!!!

## Education Co-op To Test Four Year Olds

COUNTY--Part of the 1974-75 objectives of the Taylor-Callahan Education Cooperative is to locate four year old children who may possibly have a learning handicap. They are conducting a survey through the various cooperating school communities.

The Putnam, Clyde, Baird, and Eula School Districts are conducting a survey to locate four year old children who may have a learning disability. There will be a clinic held at the Putnam School in Putnam from 8:30 a.m. until noon, on November 4; at the First Baptist Church in Clyde from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on November 6; at the Baird First Baptist Church from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on November 7; and at the Eula Methodist Church from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on November 4.

An educational diagnostician, a speech therapist, a nurse and an instructional aide will conduct the clinic. Parents with children who were four years old on or before September 1, 1974, who would like to have their child evaluated at this clinic may make an appointment for an evaluation through the office of the officials listed below in their community:

Superintendent, R.W. Reynolds, Putnam; Principal, Mrs. Sonja Clayton, Clyde; Principal, Weldon Moore, Baird; and Principal, Pete Johnson, Eula.

Parents will be informed of the results of the evaluation. Children found to have a learning handicap will be eligible to receive special help from school resources either at home or in school if the parent wishes.

Parents of any pre-school age child who suspect their child may have a hearing, vision or physical handicap may receive aid by calling the elementary principal of their school district.

W.C. Neill Drilling Co. of Abilene has recompleted four regular field projects seven miles northwest of Putnam. All are on the Fred T. Hart lease.

No. 5 Hart is located 1,185 feet from the north and 725 feet from the west lines of Section 7, D&DAL Survey.

Daily potential was two barrels of 33.8 gravity oil, plus six barrels of water. It is pumping from an open hole with the 5 and three-eighths inch casing set at 505 feet.

No. 6 Hart spots 1,185 feet from the north and 250 feet from the west lines of Section 7.

Daily pumping potential was two barrels of 33.8 gravity oil, plus seven barrels of water from an open hole at 498 to 517 feet.

Site for No. 7 Hart is 1,185 feet from the north and 280 feet from the east lines of Section 7.

Daily pumping potential was three barrels of 33.8 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. It is producing from an open hold at 496 to 504 feet.

Location for No. 8 Hart is 875 feet from the north and 475 feet from the east lines of Section 7.

Daily pumping potential was two barrels of 33.8 gravity oil, plus six barrels of water, from an open hole at 490 to 517 feet.

Take a few minutes and check the following items to make sure your home will be winterized:

- 1 Insulation is most important... and can pay for itself in energy consumption savings. The usual recommendation is 6 inches of insulation for the attic and 4 inches for outside walls. Check FHA requirements for further information.
- 2 Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
- 3 Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
- 4 Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
- 5 Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. in heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F.

- 6 Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- 7 Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
- 8 Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.
- 9 Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
- 10 Keep the opening and closing of doors to a minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.

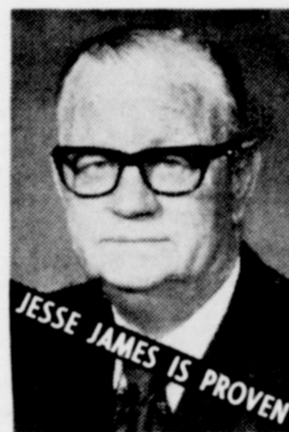

# Sodium Cyanide Used For Predator Control

**Kennel Yearbook On Sale Nov. 1st**

BAIRD-Cooler weather in the area has prompted many ranchers to the purchase and using the M-44 sodium cyanide ejectors for predator control. Only qualified applicators who received a training certificate last spring or this summer from the Texas Department of Agriculture may purchase the devices and capsules.

Callahan County Farmers Co-Op at Baird is the distributor for ejectors and cyanide capsules in Callahan County. Reports must be made on a

monthly basis as to number of devices in use and number of predators controlled.

These report forms are available from the County Extension office and it is the applicators responsibility to fill out the report on a monthly basis and return to the County Extension office by the 10th of the month.

The program has a cut off date of June 1, 1975. All capsules and devices must be turned in at that time. If you have any questions concerning the use of the M-44 device, please call the County Extension Office in Baird.

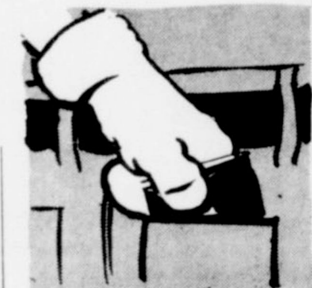

## Mittens for Pickpocket

Not long ago a man found guilty of picking pockets was granted probation on the condition that he wear mittens whenever he went out in public during the following five years.

This order suggests the wide range of possibilities that may occur to a sentencing judge when he allows a convicted person to go free on probation. The idea, of course, is to keep the culprit from getting into trouble again.



As a matter of law, the judge has considerable leeway in setting conditions. Besides the usual requirements, such as avoiding association with criminals and keeping in touch with a probation officer, special limitations have also been held lawful.

- Examples:
- 1) that a bookie should not have a telephone in his home;
  - 2) that an assaulter should not go near a certain woman; and
  - 3) that a labor "goon" should not be eligible for union office.

On the other hand, the law is leery of conditions that are too freakish (because they are hard to enforce) or too severe (because they are hard to live up to).

Also, there are constitutional limits that must not be transgressed.

In one case, a court granted a man probation on condition that he donate blood to the Red Cross. But this condition was thrown out on appeal because it called for "invading the physical person in an unwarranted manner."

Equally invalid was a condition in another case that the felon, who was a promising athlete, not play any college or professional basketball. The appellate court said that such a restriction, rather than keep him out of trouble, was more likely to get him back in.

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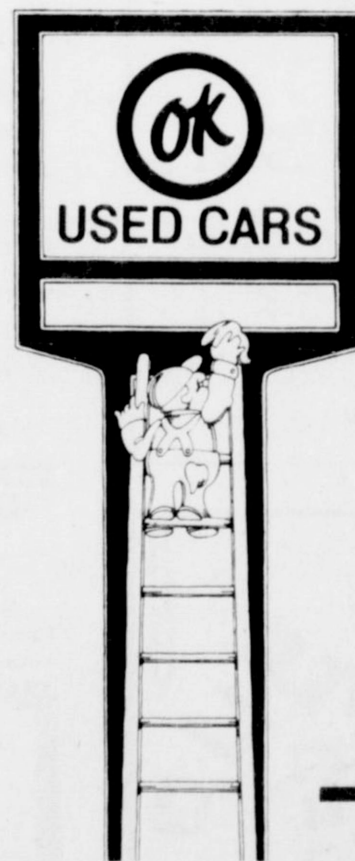
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
