

City Dads Adopt \$187,932 Budget In Recent Parley

Cross Plains City Council approved a proposed budget of \$187,932 for operation of the city in a budget hearing Tuesday night of last week.

Major items of the budget were listed as \$60,000 for salaries, \$20,607 for repairs and maintenance, depreciation \$16,325 and disaster relief \$15,000.

It was noted that the proposed budget was dictated by operational expenses during the past year. One councilman said,

"We looked at costs last year and tried to estimate the cost increase for the coming 12 months on similar services or goods, and estimated those costs."

Mayor O. B. Edmondson released the following full budget as presented in the hearing Tuesday night of last week. It read: salaries \$60,000; City Council expense \$3,000; professional services \$12,000; ambulance \$1,500; trash hauling \$7,600; utilities \$7,500; street lights \$4,500; police department \$1,500; telephone \$3,000; postage, office expense \$6,000; work clothes expense \$700; insurance \$10,000; gasoline and oil \$4,000; repairs and maintenance \$20,607; employee benefits, FICA taxes \$3,500; sanitary landfill \$3,000; water wells, lease, \$1,200; library expense \$600; interest on revenue bond, \$500; fines, crime control \$2,500; sanitation (fire) department \$4,000; disaster relief \$15,000, and depreciation \$16,325.

There were no members of the community in attendance at the budget hearing. Only persons present were those associated with the city in some manner.

It was explained that if and when funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development are received on a requested Community Block Grant totaling \$1.5 million, they will be kept separated from normal city business and in different accounts.

Bisons Win Stat Battle Lose 10-A Opener 24-6

Cross Plains Buffaloes won the statistical battle but lost the game 24-6 in opening District 10-A warfare with host Dublin last Friday night.

The loss dropped the Herd's season record to 1-3, and the league mark was opened a 0-1. Dublin is yet unbeaten this season, claiming four wins thus far, and stands 1-0 in loop play.

Buffaloes trailed for the entire game following a first quarter score by the host Lions, figured to play a prominent role in finding a champion of the district. Lion Robbie Duncan tallied with just under four minutes left in the first quarter to put Dublin on top. Bill Boy Bryant kicked the point.

Sixteen points were rung up by the two teams in the last 2:34 of the first half. Buffaloes tallied first, as Duane Hutchins crossed the double stripe from seven yards out. The two-point bonus attempt failed, and the Herd trailed 7-6.

Just over a minute late Dublin's Gary King scored on a 10-yard loss from Bryant. Again the Lion signal caller split the uprights to up Dublin's lead to 14-6, and on the last play of the first half Bryant booted a 30-yard field goal, increasing the Lion lead to 17-6.

About a quarter of the way into the last canto, Duncan scored on a 57-yard run, and the Bryant toe tipped the final score to 24-6.

Cross Plains cranked up an 80-yard drive from its own one-yard line before the march bogged down.

Athletic Director Mickey Huffman credited the entire Buffalo team with a job well done.

Area United Fund Drive Hits \$3,298

Cross Plains Area United Fund has reached just over 82 per cent of its goal of \$4,000 since beginning the campaign with a door-to-door canvass last Friday.

Kenny Bates Is Killed In Fall From Oil Rig

A fall of about 80 feet from an oil drilling rig was fatal to Kenneth Lynn (Kenny) Bates, 20, of Cross Plains.

The accident occurred about 7:30 a.m. Saturday about 12 miles northwest of Comanche in the Stag Creek Community.

Bates, who had been working for Big M Drilling Company of Cross Plains for about a year, was pronounced dead at the scene at 8:30 a.m. by Jus-

lice of the Peace Billie Jo Elliott. Comanche County Sheriff W. G. Garmon helped investigate the mishap, and no apparent reason was given for the accident.

Bates was working with a crew of four on the rig, and his fatal fall was witnessed by Bill Strickland of Burkett, driller on the rig. He was taken to a hospital at Comanche suffering shock. Word was received here Tuesday that Strickland returned to his home at Burkett on Monday, and reported to be much improved.

Funeral service for Mr. Bates was held at 3 p.m. Monday at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel in Cross Plains.

Officiating the final rites were Audie Moore, former local minister of the N. Main Street Church of Christ, who now lives in the Cook-Romney area, and David Collier, present minister of the N. Main Street Church of Christ.

Burial was in the Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of this city.

Born Jan. 3, 1959, in Rising Star, he had been a resident of Cross Plains for 14 years. He married Yolonda Bailey March 31, 1978, in Cross Plains.
