She suggests these Halloween costume safety features:

(1) Consider using make-up to decorate the face rather than wearing a mask which may block to be 80 persons or more, atvision. Apply cold cream before putting on make-up for easy removal

(2) Sew or glue reflective tape to both front and back of the costume. Be creative and ner, music, singing and preachincorporate the tape into the ing throughout the day," said costume design.
