

PENNIES COUNT

The Washington News recently ran this thoughful little editorial: "Some of the greatest fortunes ever accumulated in this country were built on nickel and dime articles even penny items. Yet, in most cases, the profit margin on each item was exceedingly small, a tiny fraction of the selling price. The secret was in volume.

'The U. S. government is the biggest business in the world so there is no lack of volume. Pennies saved in volume will knock out deficits just as effectively as penny profits in volume will build up fortunes.'

Mass distribution, which was pioneered by the chains and successfully taken up by other stores of all kinds, is as important to our living standards as its partner, mass production. And much of mass distribution's success has resulted from an unremitting war against waste and unnecessary overhead costs. The savings are passed on to the consumer, in the form of lower prices or better goods.

As the News implied, applying this idea to our incredibly costly government is necessary if the budget is to be balanced and eventual tax reduction made possible. Waste can ruin a family or a business - and a government as well.

Did you ever wonder how the famous old law of supply and demand works? You saw a good example of the operation of that law this summer, just as you do every summer, in the trend of pork prices.

More than half of all pigs are born in the spring, and it takes six months for them to reach marketable size. Thus, less pork is available during the summer months. 



Every dwelling must be well-built to resist the blasting wintery winds. Usually the houses are half-buried, the timbers deeply anchored and a coating of earth placed over the top. Because Northern Alaska is treeless, driftwood is used both for building houses and for fuel. The houses have no windows, oil lamps are used to light the inside and the families are crowded together. During the long winter months, when the sun hardly peeks above the southern horizon ,the Eskimos eat when they are hungry and when the baby sleeps, everybody sleeps. Built into every home is a natural deep-freeze, where whale and reindeer steaks are stored and kept fresh. Furs serve as bankets, and nearly everything in the house has been made by the Eskimos themselves. Only occasionally are goods purchased at the trading post with either furs or poker chip money.

Game Harvest **Dates Shaped**

Dates for some of the major game harvest seasons not set by state law were shaped by the Game and Fish Commission, meeting in Houston in regular quarterly session.

The Commission recommended that the United States Fish and Wildlife Service divide Texas into north and south zones for the 1953 waterfowl season. It asked for a north zone shooting period beginning October 30 and a south zone season beginning November 13. If zoning is rejected, the Commission seeks November 6 for a state-wide season opener.

> The Panhandle's first antelope season was set for two periods-October 20-24 and October 27-31, with the eligible counties to designated later. These birds have migrated to Texas from Kansas and Oklahoma and it was held scientifically sound to harvest a portion since Texas lacks proper habitat and only so many of them can survive.

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

Red Cross Seeking Personnel For Staff

It's not so far from Baird to the Far East and other interesting places if you have a few qualifications the National Red Cross is seeking, according to Leslie This, Director of Personnel, Red Cross Midwestern Area Office. The Red Cross, in a nationwide search for qualified paid personnel to serve with its staff at military installations all over try for eligible persons.

In its traditional responsibility of service to the armed forces, the Red Cross has been charged with the task of supplementing the Army's special services program with a club and clubmobile program of its own to provide leisure-time activities for able-

Ever present with the armed forces in the emergency of war, the Red Cross remains with American troops in peacetime, maintaining vital, morale-building recreational facilities for GI's, wherever they are stationed. The cessation of hostilities in Korea has created an urgent need for prompt expansion of these facilities.

To be eligible, women must be between 23 and 40 years of age, with college training or special aptitude in recreation, education, music, dramatics, speech, and art. The salary scale will be determined according to background and experience. In ad dition, the Red Cross pays maintenance and travel for all of its overseas personnel.

Women selected will receive two weeks orientation at Red Cross headquarters in Washington, D.C., and then go overseas. They will also be entitled to a short training period in Japan, after which they will be given their Far Eastern assignment.

Openings are also available for young men, preferably veterans who are college graduates between 25 and 35 years of age as assistant Red Cross field directors for service with troops. Two important qualifications for this position are world-wide mobility and physical fitness.

Men who qualify will serve for a year in a domestic station as counselors to servicemen, advising them and lending assistance on such personal problems as emergency leaves, dependency discharges, medical reports, and emergency financial assistance. Then they will receive two-year assignments abroad, either in the

Far East or Europe. Married men are entitled to bring their families overseas. Red Cross pays travel and maintenance for its personnel, and will pay transportation and maintenance enroute for dependents joining employes overseas.


