

More CPHS Building Reports

In an attempt to appraise the community of problems with the high school building, the Cross Plains Board of Education has requested that the following information be published.

On April 19, 1976, a report was received from Mr. C. Lyman Ellis, Jr., a Texas Education Agency Architect, which made the following statements concerning the high school building.

"This building, erected in 1927, was a good building and one of community pride when it was built. However, it has deteriorated and developed structural faults in such numbers that it is not suitable for remodeling. In my opinion, plans should be made to remove this building as soon as possible. I am not implying that it is unsafe for occupancy but rather that it is economically unwise to use it any longer than is necessary."

A report was also received from Mr. Robert C. Harrison of the Texas Department of Health Resources on May 7, 1976, and contained the following.

"During the inspection it was observed that both restrooms in the high school building were small and facilities were crowded, especially the water closet stalls in the girls' restroom. Facilities for heating, cooling or ventilation are not provided, allowing a concentration of odors

to occur. Only one lavatory is provided in each restroom. Restroom facilities should be enlarged or additional facilities should be provided so that proper fixture/student ratios can be met."

Mr. Wayne Smith, Deputy State Fire Marshal, reported on May 19, 1976, that "continued use of the second floor of the high school building as an occupied area shall be prohibited."

A report dated August 4, 1976, from Mr. James H. Wheeler, Jr., of Boone and Pope Architects-Engineers offered the following information.

"During a visual inspection of the existing High School Building on Wednesday, July 28, 1976, the following observations were made:

1. Toilets inadequate
2. Poor lighting
3. No exit lights
4. No panic devices on exterior doors
5. Wood framing at second floor and roof unprotected from fire
6. Roofing in need of repair
7. Exterior walls deteriorating, causing some structural failure and moisture penetration
8. Wood stairs open and unprotected
9. Fire escape from second floor inadequate

"Partial removal of metal ceiling mold at the north wall of the Library indicated that there had been a delamination of plaster from the second floor above. This probably occurred during the recent installation of cabinet work in the second floor classroom. Moisture penetration through the exterior walls has caused the plaster to fall. Without removing the ceiling in this area, a complete evaluation is not possible; however, it is the opinion of this office that a structural failure of this wall has not occurred. Removal of remaining metal ceiling mold will allow the additional plaster, dust and trash to fall through to the first floor.

"Under present Life Safety Codes, open stairways, particularly of wood, are not permitted. This appears to be the most pressing problem and will prohibit the use of the second floor. Removal and replacement of the existing stairs while maintaining the structural integrity of the surrounding second floor could prove to be an expensive undertaking as well as the loss of space for required landings when the stairs are enclosed.

"This building, constructed in 1927, has had minor structural damage through the years caused possibly by settlement, penetration of water into the exterior walls, or a combination of both. The repointing and waterproofing and diversion of ground water from the foundations of the existing exterior walls could be accomplished, and assuming that the waterproofing is maintained, further deterioration can be delayed.

"Renovation work, other than normal maintenance, will require that the building, including the toilet rooms, be made usable by the handicapped as established by Senate Bill No. 111, Article 678g, Chapter 34. The enforcement of this statute will require that your toilet rooms be completely renovated and in all probability require more space.

"In conclusion, although the existing building can be renovated and its life prolonged for a limited number of years, the structure is nearing fifty years old and expenditures of any magnitude would not be good economics. Attempts to evaluate your space requirements versus the curriculum and TEA requirements are not included in this report."

"On July 12, 1977, R. M. Patterson of the Texas Education Agency School Plant Section reported the following concerning

Possibly the most controversial of the three propositions is the amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

Many Getting V.A. Benefits Due Income Report Nov. 1

On November 1, 1979, a large number of people receiving Veterans Administration benefit payments will receive an annual income report, which must be completed. According to I. G. Mobley, Veterans Officer for Callahan County, persons receiving the card must complete it and return it to the VA before January 1, 1980, or have their benefit payments terminated.

Those receiving the income questionnaire card will be veterans, widows and children who are receiving nonservice-connected disability or death pension under the new pension law, which went into effect January 1, 1979. Also receiving the card will be veterans and widows who are receiving pension under the laws which were in effect prior to January 1, 1979, and dependent parents of veterans whose deaths were caused by military service.

Veterans, widows and children being paid under the new pension law, as well as parents re-

ceiving dependency and indemnity compensation, should remember that their countable income may be reduced by any unusual family medical expenses they pay out in 1979. It is therefore important that the medical expenses be shown in the proper space on the income card. Upon receipt of the card showing medical expenses for 1979, the VA will recompute entitlement and, if necessary, increase benefit payments retroactively to January 1, 1979. All VA claimants should report all of their income for 1979, and their anticipated income for 1980. Based upon the information shown on the card, a determination will be made as to whether VA benefits will continue in 1980.

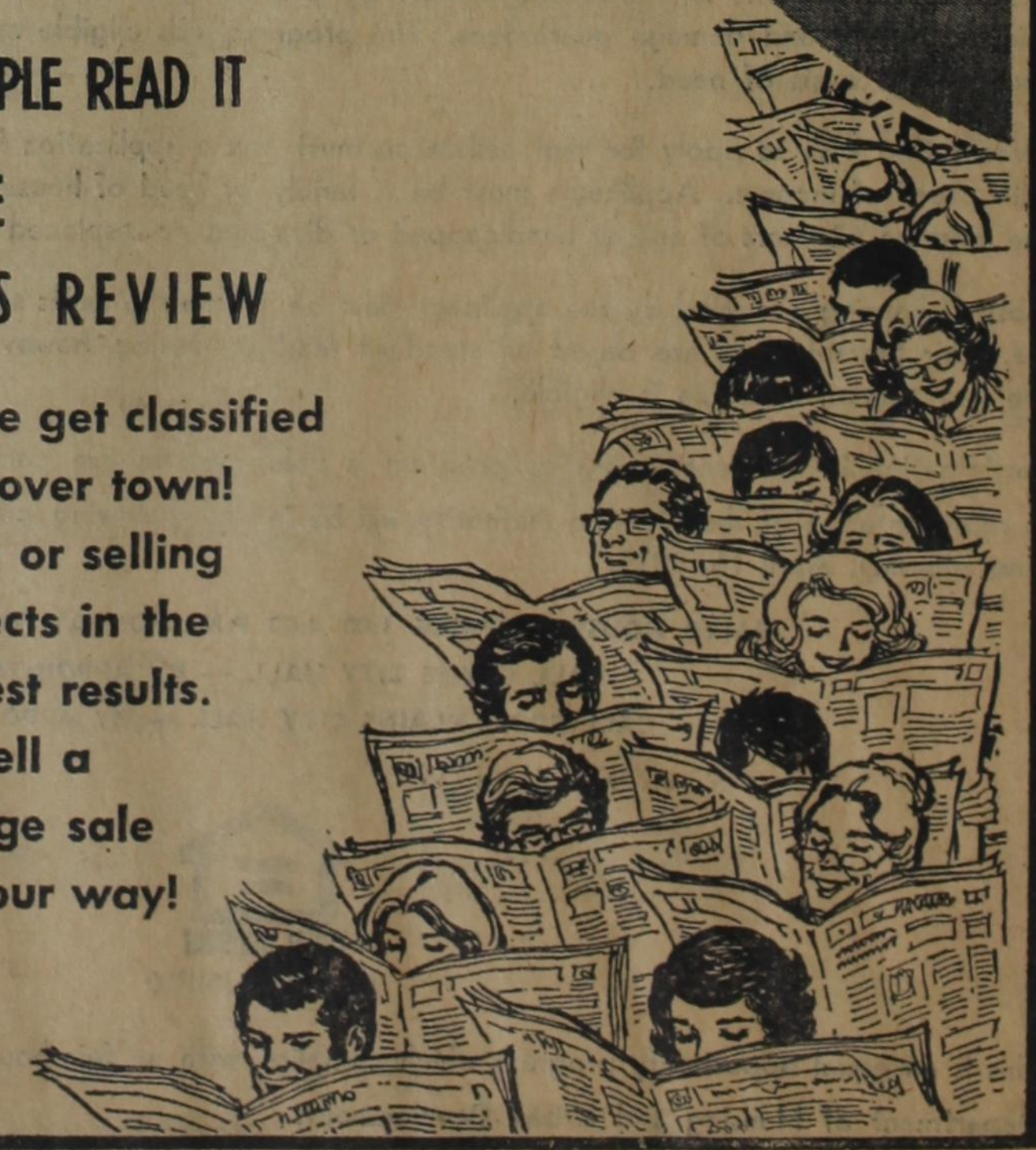

Pioneer News Items

By Mrs. A. C. Halsell

To continue my story of the Possum Kingdom Area, Palo Pinto Co., could take one of many directions. There is the Costello saga, four brothers and a sister who had lived all their lives on ranches extending for miles along the banks of the Brazos River; how they were forced to sell land and houses and make their exodus as best they could. There was the social, religious and educational change, the story of the filling of the lake in 24 hours, when, officially it should require 10 years; the protests, and lawsuits versus the government, made by landowners of the area; and the story of two killings in the little town of Pickwick, these and many others, about incidents which happened before the dam was built.

One E. P. Costello, whose ranch and ranch home was across the river from his brother's ranches. His ranch home was built atop a mountain, where he had lived with his wife and three daughters for many years. His persistence in holding his home reached the point where they became residents of a small island, when the lake water surrounded the mountain. The island was reverted to the district, but it was agreed that Costello could live there on the island until the condemnation suit was settled. Court procedure started in 1940 in Palo Pinto District Court. Costello was awarded \$35 per acre in the suit. The case was sent to the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, then to the Supreme Court in Austin. The Supreme Court affirmed the verdict of the lower courts.

Living on the island was inconvenient in many ways. The Costellos were unable to have

a telephone as a line could not be strung across the lake. Twice he was taken across the lake at night due to illness. From the island to the Pickwick store, where he kept his car stored, was two and one-half miles. He kept two motors to use, on his boat or his barge to be sure to have one in condition at all times.

After Mr. Costello received his money from the Brazos River Conservation District, he purchased 700 acres from Mr. A. Dalton, who owned ranch lands in the area but not included in the lake district. He was more fortunate than many other people who had to move. Moving into a modern ranch home not far from the ranch country where he had lived since a boy, and only eight miles west of Graford, their nearest shopping center, all contributed to healing the inconveniences they had known, in leaving a long time family home. The interior is in such poor condition that it would be impossible to create a learning atmosphere. Rest room facilities are a disgrace to health education . . . the school district should decide if they want an educational program for their children. If the local decision is in favor of the program, then steps must be taken to house the educational program. I would like to suggest you demolish the present high school and build a new facility. Under normal conditions, a school district must have a long-range plan. The Cross Plains School District is in dire need of a short-range plan immediately."
