Rest room facilities are a disgrace to health education . the school district should decide if they want an educational program for their children. If the local decision is in favor of the program, then steps must he taken to house the educational program. I would like to suggest you demolish the present high school and build a new facility. Under normal conditions, a school district must have a long-range plan. The Cross Plains School District is in dire need of a short-range plan immediately.
