Who is in Hospital

There's interesting speculation as to what Cross Plains' present population figures will show when the federal government's current head-counting is completed.

The greatest population the ol' home town has ever boasted was in 1930 when the figure reached 1,527. The lowest population was a flat 800 in 1920, when the township was only nine years old. Ten years ago we had 1,192. In 1960 it was 1,164 and the 1950 count was 1,301.

Ten knowledgeable persons were asked one day this week to estimate what the 1980 head-count will be. Their guesses follow: Damon D. Jones 1,300, Ray Purvis 1,240, Vernell Bishop 1,275, Vera Ferrell 1,634, Bill Hedrick 1,300, Ethel Sims 1,500, Mark Adair 1,600, Vicki Walker 1,290, J. P. McCord 1,275 and Margaret Ann McNeel 1,301.

An average of those 10 estimates would be 1,380 and that's probably very close to the final answer which is expected from Washington, D. C. the latter part of next month.

Raymond DeBusk, veteran Cross Plains cattle buyer, is a lifelong Democrat. His politics never change.

Recently the subject of the upcoming presidential election arose at the table where he was enjoying a mid-morning cup of coffee with friends. Someone inquired of him as to what he thought the outcome would be if the race turned out to be between Pres. Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan.

Raymond hesitated a few seconds and then said: "I will hope Reagan wins but I'll vote for Carter; you see I expect to face Saint Peter before too long and I don't want to have to answer for having voted Republican."

If you feel a sense of pride when your little home town is mentioned, perhaps there's reason. Notwithstanding all the talk of recession, inflation, soaring interest rates and what not, conditions in Cross Plains remain quite good.

The Citizens State Bank reports deposits nearing 13 million dollars. Already this year a beautiful, new \$200,000 Methodist Church building has been completed here, a new savings and loan association opened in impressive quarters and ground is currently being cleared for a \$175,000 post office building. A large steak house opened Monday on W. Highway 36 and lots were bought last week for a big, new dry cleaning plant to be erected across the street southeast of the Dairy Queen.

Further evidencing the sound economy of Cross Plains are the ever-increasing sums which pour into city coffers from the one per cent sales tax collected by the state. Cross Plains reaps nearly twice as much money from this source as does any other town of equal size in this part of Texas. An educated guess is that the "take" from this source will approach \$45,000 for the present fiscal year, a sum that is nearly three times what was derived from all city property taxes 10 years ago.

## It Is Not Too Late To Be Counted In Census

It's not too late to be counted in the 1980 census, the U. S. Bureau of the Census announced today.

Questionnaires were mailed to every household on March 28, and most people were instructed to mail back a completed questionnaire on Census Day, April 1. Millions did so, but the Bureau reports that a number of households have not

yet replied.

People not counted in the census will in effect be "invisible" when statistics are used to reapportion seats in the House of Representatives and to guide distribution of federal funds—their tax dollars—for programs in communities across the nation.

There is not penalty for a late return of census questionnaires, but census answers should be given as of the April 1 date regarding births, deaths, changes of address, and other facts.

To be sure everyone is counted, after April 16 census takers will contact those households that were asked to mail back a completed questionnaire but have not done so.

Walters, who played college golf at Western Texas College and Texas Tech, had a two under par 68 the final day to win by a stroke over Jeff Kern of Tucson, Ariz.

The tourney was the second of eight pro tours in the Dallas area for golfers aspiring to be on the pro golf tour. Some have lost their PGA cards and others have been unable to earn a card.

A similar tourney will start at Las Rios Country Club in Plano Thursday and Walters is entered. The Abilenean has played in mini-tours before, dating back to 1976 when he won a tournament in Orlando, Fla. This was his first pro tourney of the year.

Walters has indicated he may attend the PGA school in Gretna, La., in June where he hopes to qualify for the PGA tour.

## Cross Cut Sector Still Favorite With Drillers

Cassell Oil Company of Rising Star is drilling its No. 3 O. B. Byrd in the Palo Davis (Duffer) Field, two miles southwest of Cross Cut. The test is due for completion latter part of this week.

Three other oil and gas producers are in the process of be-

ing placed on oil and gas production on the Byrd property.

Spotted in the regular field 10 miles southeast of Cross Plains was Tinewal Oil Inc., Cross Plains No. 1 Hickman.

Site for the planned 1,150-foot venture is 1,170 feet from the north and 150 feet from the west lines of F. M. Kinsey Survey.

Cox Oil & Gas, Brownwood, will drill No. 1 Jack W. Cox in the regular field seven miles south of Cross Cut.

Having a proposed depth of 2,500 feet, it spots 235 feet from the north and 335 feet from the west lines of Section 1.

The Cross Cut sector which has been producing commercial oil nearly 60 years continues to hold favor with aggressive Texas drillers.

## County Commissioners Hear Hospital Options

Representatives of a hospital management firm in Dallas met with Callahan County Commissioners Monday to discuss operation of the county hospital, but their trip may have been wasted.

Dr. Laurence Gayao presently leases the hospital and has the option to extend his lease five years beginning May 15.

Gayao said Monday that he probably will continue to lease the hospital. He said he plans to submit a letter to county commissioners stating that he wants to continue operating the hospital another five years. Although the lease expires May 15, commissioners already have granted Gayao an extension until June 30.

Gayao's present five-year lease went into effect May 15, 1975. Originally, the terms of the lease were that Gayao would pay the county \$500 a month. However, commissioners later agreed to drop the \$500 a month payment.

Before Gayao took over the hospital, it was costing the county money to keep it going. Under the present arrangement the county isn't receiving any lease money, but it isn't paying to keep the hospital in business.

Representatives of the American Medical Management Corp. of Dallas told commissioners Monday morning that under their management, the hospital would produce revenue for the county.

Doug Kenner, vice president of the corporation, said the county would have two alternatives if it signed an agreement. The county could lease the hospital to AMMC for a specified amount each month. The corporation would then be allowed to keep all profits. Or the county could sign a management contract with the corporation in which the county would pay AMMC a management fee and the county would keep the profits produced by the hospital.

# Law Tightening Up To Slow Speeders

Speeders who have relied on Citizens Band radios and blinking headlights of other motorists to warn them of highway patrolmen in the area are losing their advantage over lawmen.

The State of Texas, faced with rigid enforcement of the nationwide 55-mile per hour speed limit or losing \$8,000,000 in federal highway grants, has instructed local patrolmen to "get tough" and advises that unmarked vehicles are moving into Callahan and adjacent counties.

Local patrolmen, who have hitherto been instructed not to hide and utilize other similar tactics are now being ordered to stop speeding in every way they can find. Federal vehicles are monitoring compliance on Texas highways and making regular reports to state and district headquarters of the Department of Public Safety.

During 1979 Texas was found deficient by two per cent in compliance with the 55 MPH regulation. The criterion for 1980 is a minimum of 40 per cent of vehicles monitored by federal personnel to be found driving below the speed limit. The standard will be progressively raised to 83 per cent compliance by 1984.

Troopers Larry Melson and Don Gosnell, stationed in Cross Plains, yesterday expressed hope that local people will cooperate in every way available

to bring their area of responsibility into immediate obedience of the 55-mile statute. Unmarked cars began patrolling the highways in the Abilene district this week.

In addition to unmarked cars, patrolmen from other districts are being instructed to "flip flop" into other areas in order that speeders may not gain an advantage by knowing the presence of local patrolmen.

Working schedules and customary routines of highway patrolmen are likewise being altered to destroy any uniform pattern which may have hitherto existed in their activities.

The 55 mile-per hour speed limit has been given high priority by President Jimmy Carter as one of the most effective ways to conserve America's dwindling supply of gasoline and other fuels.

## Jim Barr, 88, Beloved Pioneer, Laid To Rest

Jim Barr, 88, last surviving original member of one of the Cross Plains area's prominent early-day families, died Thursday morning at 10 in Rising Star Nursing Center. Funeral was held Saturday at 2 p.m.

at Higginbotham Chapel in Cross Plains, with Dr. Russell Dennis of Brownwood officiating.

Burial was in the family plot at Cross Plains Cemetery.

Born Aug. 9, 1891, North of Cross Plains on the homestead of his parents and land, which has remained in the family nearly a century, he married Mae Cade Oct. 29, 1911. She died in 1935. Later he married Beckie Harwell of Tuxedo in Jones County in August of 1964, who with 13 nieces, eight nephews and five step-children survive.

Mr. Barr was a member of the Presbyterian Church since early childhood and served

many years as deacon and ruling elder. Members of the local Presbyterian congregation recall that he attended church regularly until failing health prevented. "He was a faithful Christian, respected leader and will be sorely missed," said a spokesman for the group.
