

## United Fund Directors Adopt Budget, Set Drive

Four officers and four other directors of the Cross Plains area United Fund met Tuesday afternoon of last week adopting a \$4,000 budget and set the annual fund drive for Friday, Oct. 5.

Mrs. Hadden Payne, secretary for the area UF, advises that the same budget as was approved for this year was okayed. That called for a \$4,000 total with six national, state or area charities receiving an aggregate of \$2,700 and local Christmas and relief, local and transient, sharing \$900. Another \$400 is not being allocated, allowing for shortages in local programs.

Again this year, as for the past several years, Mrs. Raymond (Veda) DeBusk and Mrs. Frank (Vera) Ferrell have been named co-chairmen of the door-to-door campaign which has been set for Friday, Oct. 5. That canvass collects the bulk of the budget each year.

## City Dads Up Exemptions And Ask October 1 Signup

City of Cross Plains has given the elder and disabled an extra tax relief by adding \$2,000 to already granted \$3,000 exemptions if the individual taxpayers want it.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson stated first of the week that the City Council met in emergency session at noon Thursday and passed a resolution increasing elderly disability exemptions on ad valorem taxes levied by the city to \$5,000. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

The Cross Plains City Council has also advised that any taxpayer who is 65 or older or who is disabled and wishes to receive the \$5,000 exemption on property taxes must sign appropriate application papers in the City Office by October 1.

Cross Plains recently had property within the bounds of the city reappraised. Several local residents met with representatives of the appraisal firm, McMorries & Associates last Thursday concerning values placed on real or personal property after being advised of new higher values. Some city taxpayers also met with the city's Board of Equalization that night seeking adjustments of values on some properties.

City councilmen originally set a rate of 60 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation for 1979 taxes, but reduced that to 40 cents per \$100 assessed valuation later.

# Bisons Open Grid Season At Jim Ned

Buffaloes of Cross Plains High School will begin regular season gridiron competition Friday by traveling to Tuscola to take on the Jim Ned Indians of District 8-A in a non-conference contest.

Kickoff time for the contest will be 8 p.m. Most Texas high schools began the 1979 campaign last

week end, but Bisons drew the open date in scheduling the initial week of the season.

The football season will actually begin for local gridders Thursday when the junior high school Mighty Mites and Buffalo junior varsity units will host counterparts from Jim Ned. Action in the junior high school contest will begin at 6 p.m. with the JV tilt following.

Admission for the game here Thursday will be \$1 for adults and 75 cents for students. Tickets for the varsity contest at Jim Ned Friday will sell for \$2.50 for adults and \$1 for students.

Coaches Mickey Huffman and Mack McConal look forward to the contests. Athletic Director Huffman stated first of the week that Jim Ned has a good team in spite of dropping a 30-12 opening verdict to Class AA Wylie, but believes Cross Plains has a better team. We're (coaches and players) anxious to get started," he said. He added that as long as the Buffs, who are few in number, stay healthy we feel confident the team will do alright.

McConal reported about the same situation with the Mites, but added that his charges do have some size this year and possibly a little more depth. "If a coach can be optimistic, I guess I'm optimistic," he stated.

McConal reported 27 gridders, sixth through eighth grades, vying for places on the Mite roster. Huffman listed 37 players on the Buffalo team, 15 of which are presently tagged as varsity personnel.

McConal stated there will be some seventh graders starting in the season opener Thursday. Huffman's roster listed pass receivers Robby Bailey, Marty

Callaway and Tan Flippin; interior linemen Richard Allen, Glenn Champion, Bill Davis, Joe Neeb and Daryl Robinson; backs Mike Clark, Duane Hutchins, David Illingworth and Eddie Jackson; defensive specialists Dennis Dickson, Alex Rasberry and Gary Robinson.

Pre-season polls had Jim Ned ranked third in tough District 8-A, three notches above Albany which the Buffs nipped 2-1 in a scrimmage. Bisons were rated last in the eight-team 10-A loop. Cross Plains upset the Indians 14-6 last season. It is reported 15 letter-earning Indians returned to the Tribe from its 7-3 outfit of the 1978 campaign. Some favored Jim Ned to win the conference crown in early polls.
