NEEB ELECTED MAYOR—4 ALDERMEN ELECTED—TAX MEASURE DEFEATED

One of the largest votes in City Elections ever polled here was recorded Tuesday when a Mayor and four Aldermen were elected. There were three in the Mayors race and eleven on the ticket for Aldermen, 264 votes were polled. Martin Neeb was elected Mayor and Chas Hemphill, Russel McGowen, Dee Anderson and Ross Wagner were elected Aldermen.

The issue for the adoption of the Board of City Development and the levying of the tax of the 2 1-2 mills was defeated nearly 2 to 1. Many did not understand just what the tax would be used for and how it would be handled, as there was little said about it previous to the election. Instead of a tax, a fund has always been subscribed for this purpose by forty or fifty business men, but they don't propose to keep it up, feeling that the burden should be prorated among property tax payers. Tuesday action will retard the program of development temporarily, but will be eventually adjusted, it is thought.

They plan to drill deeper with hopes of increasing production considerably. This well is a mile from nearest production, and opens up new territory. They have made location for well No. 2.

The P. O. & G. found 2 1-2 million feet of gas in the N. G. Wood well at Cross Cut Sand, and will make commercial gasser, it is stated.

Tom Bryant has rig up for his deep test on T. N. Pinkston tract 4 miles north east and plans to start drilling the first of the week. The progress of his well will be followed with much interest. Other operations not reported this week.

Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. P. B. FITZWATER, D.D., Dean Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

Lesson for April 8 THE RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST (EASTER LESSON)

LESSON TEXT—Mark 16:1-20. GOLDEN TEXT—Because I live ye shall live also. PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus Comes to Life Again. JUNIOR TOPIC—Christ Rises from the Grave.

I. The Ministry of Love (vv. 1-4). 1. By whom (v. 1). Mary Magdalene, the mother of James and Salome. They brought sweet spices with which to anoint Him.

II. The Angel in the Tomb (vv. 5-8). Jesus knew that these women would come to the sepulcher with perplexed and unbelieving hearts so He had an angel waiting there to announce to them the fact of His resurrection. Note the angel's message:

1. "Be not afraid" (v. 6). 2. "Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified" (v. 6). This threefold designation with marvelous clearness shows (1) His humanity—Jesus. (2) Lowly residence—Nazareth. (3) ignominious death—crucified.

III. The Appearances of the Risen Christ (vv. 9-14). These appearances had as their object the restoration of the disciples from their awful failure and discouragement and convincing them without a peradventure of a doubt of Christ's resurrection.

IV. The Commission of the Risen Lord (vv. 15-18). After the disciples were convinced of the truth of His resurrection, Christ sent them forth to preach the gospel to every creature.
