

## Hospital Lease Decision Delayed Until Monday

Decision on who gets the hospital at Baird for the next five years is now scheduled to be made by Callahan County Commissioners Monday, June 30.

In a session last Friday Callahan County Commissioners heard two proposals from parties interested in leasing the medical facility formerly known as the Callahan County Hospital. One came from Jim Henson, head of United Hospitals Corp. of Memphis, Tenn., and the other was by James Paul Shanks, Baird attorney representing Dr. Laurence Gayao who holds the lease presently and wishes to renew it.

Another party American Medical Management Corp. of Dallas had expressed interest in leasing the hospital earlier, but did not present a proposal last Friday. County Judge Mack Kniffen said a representative of the company said a proposal would be mailed to county commissioners. It had not arrived Friday.

The Tennessee corporation offered \$1,000 per month to the county for the hospital, advising commissioners to hold \$300 of that monthly payment to purchase major medical equipment with. He continued that minor purchases, \$300 or less would be made by this company, Henson said, and opined changes in decor costs would be paid by his firm. He continued that management costs of the hospital would be paid by Medicare and would cost the county nothing. Gayao, through Shanks, proposes to pay the county \$200 monthly, and pointed to the improvement in the hospital during the past five years.

Henson reported that no indigent patient would be turned down by the hospital because of inability to pay, and said rates would be comparable to those of other area hospitals when asked if rates would go up.

Shanks said the higher lease offered by Henson would be paid by patients through higher charges.

Monday's meeting at Baird is scheduled to start at 9:30 a.m.

The ash was from the second eruption of the mountain, and the Tragers stayed inside of their home for two days due to the ash in the air.

# Light To Heavy Showers Hinder Harvest Of Grain

Rain coming in showers ranging from turbulent to gentle fell across the Cross Plains area almost daily beginning late Thursday night through Sunday morning.

Although the moisture slowed harvest of small grain and delayed peanut planting, very few were unhappy with the rain.

Little damage was done to the grain crops by Thursday's blustery winds and vivid lightning display. High winds did seem menacing for a while late

Thursday night and blew limbs from trees in Cross Plains and other surrounding communities. Mrs. Les Byrd said that three trees were blown down at their place in Cross Cut community. Mrs. N. V. Gibbs said some roofs were damaged in the Rowden vicinity by the high winds.

Moisture aggregates ranged from about 1.00 inch in the Rowden sector to 4.30 inches at the Roy Tatom place at Atwell. Up to 5.00 inches was reported in that community. Gauges in the Pioneer area measured from 2.75 to 3.00 inches, and G. T. Dawkins at Sabanno recorded 2.75 inches. A reading of 1.90 inches was reported at Roger Watson holdings between here and Burkett.

Measurements in Cross Plains ranged from 1.60 to 1.85 inches. Cross Cut got 1.50 inches, and Mrs. Calvin Champion recorded 1.20 inches at her place near Cottonwood.

The moisture slowed grain harvest, but that is believed to be 75 per cent or more com-

pleted. Although not a bumper crop year as 1979 was, most area producers are being pleasantly surprised by yields. Grades are also high.

One observer said that the harvest overall is better than it was first thought. Most fields which were estimated to cut 10 to 15 bushels per acre are producing 15 to 25 bushels. One of

the area's best reports was a 32 bushels per acre yield.

It is believed that the grain harvest will be completed in the next week with good weather.

Number one wheat was bringing \$3.60 per bushel Tuesday, and has ranged from \$3.50 to \$3.65 through the harvest. Prices were considerably higher last year.

## 'Make-Up' Tilts To Decide Local Little League Champ

Games not completed were scheduled to decide championship of Cross Plains Little League when regular season ended last Thursday without a clear-cut winner.

Following the pattern of the prior week, the four squads each recorded a victory and absorbed a loss, leaving the top spot unsettled. Two games involving all three of the teams challenging for first place were not completed early in the season when lighting was not possible at the field. Buffs and Beadels were scheduled to play Tuesday night, and on Thursday Cats and Beadels are to tangle.

Little League All-Stars are to be announced following the game on Thursday.

Angels captured the championship of the Pee Wee League with a 6-2 season record. Although the Angels were loop winners, the Cubs defeated the champions 12-11 in the season finale last Thursday. On Tuesday the Giants won their first game of the season by beating the Cubs 6-5.

Buffs bumped the Beadels 15-10 in the first game Tuesday of last week. The winner tallied 14 of the runs in the first two frames on just five hits and numerous walks. Beadels countered with single runs in the second and third innings before rallying for eight in the last of the fourth on one hit and nine free passes.

In the nightcap the Cats eventually won a scoring duel 23-22 over the Kilowatts. The West

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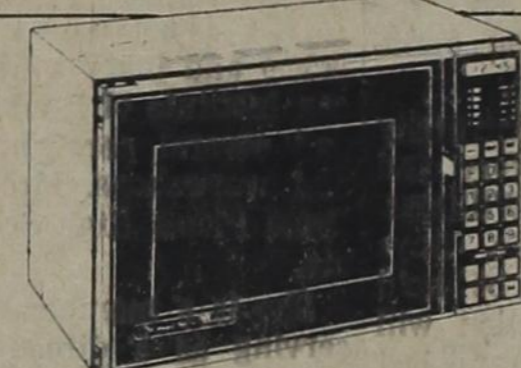

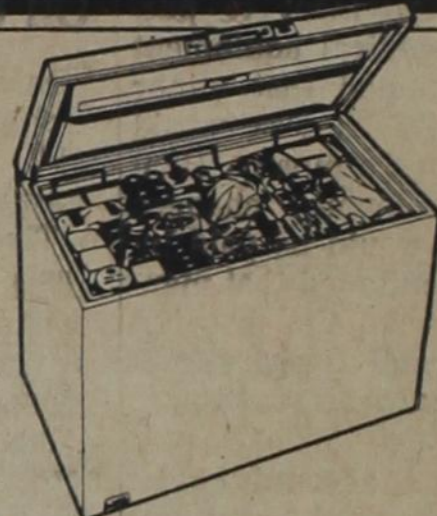

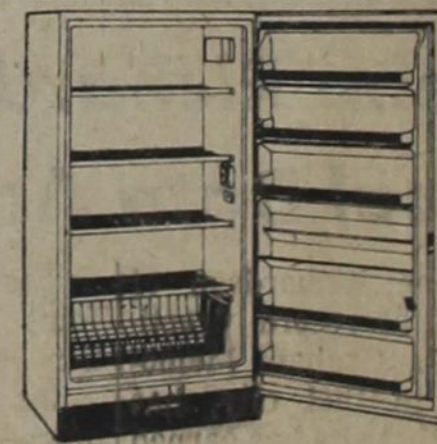

## Medicare Premiums To Increase In July

Effective July, 1980, the basic monthly premium for Medical Insurance (Part B of Medicare) will increase from \$3.70 to \$9.60 per month. The increase in premium is due to an increase in physician fees, an increase in services provided, and an increase in the use and cost of outpatient hospital services. The premium paid by Medicare beneficiaries is less than one-third of the cost. The federal government pays over two-thirds of the total premium cost for medical insurance.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, outpatient hospital services not covered by Medicare Hospital Insurance (Part A).

There was also an increase effective January 1, 1980 in the Medicare Hospital Insurance deductible from \$160 to \$180 for the first 60 days of a hospital stay. This increase was also due to an increase in hospital costs. The deductible of \$180 is about the average cost of one day in the hospital.

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
