## Rainfall For This Area Over Normal In '79

Thanks to late rains in December which measured about four inches, the rainfall total received in the Cross Plains area in 1979 was just above normal.

According to records maintained by Mrs. M. F. Dill 25.50 inches of moisture fell in Cross Plains during the past year. Measurements were taken from what Mr. and Mrs. Dill call the "government" gauge, a rainfall measuring device believed to be more accurate than general "give-away" rain gauges.

The Texas Almanac states that annual rainfall for Callahan County is 24.92 inches. The 25.50 inches received here in 1979 surpassed the normal for this area by .58 of an inch.

It was also explained that totals could vary widely in different sections of this locality, due to the "hit and miss" nature of many of the showers which roamed over this section during the past year.

# '80 Important Year In Political Activity

Whatever else 1980 may offer, it will feature an active political scene. Offices from the presidency to precinct level will be at stake.

Although a president will be elected later in the year, political races and financial decisions will be made or decided by ballot during the year.

In addition to the annual City of Cross Plains election, where a mayor and two aldermen are to be elected, and Cross Plains Independent School District balloting, where three trustees are up for election, bond elections loom as real possibilities in Callahan County and the school district. Three county offices will be voted upon this year also. They are sheriff, county attorney and tax assessor-collector. Various other offices at precinct level, include Constable of Precinct 6, Commissioner of Precincts 1 and 3, and numerous district, regional and state officers are to be elected.

Terms of Mayor O. B. Edmondson and Aldermen W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy and Ray Purvis are expiring on the Cross Plains City Council.

Three-year tenures of Cross Plains Board of Education trustees Roberta Conlee, Randy Foster and John D. Montgomery are expiring. Those two votes are held in April.

A bond issue looms in Cross Plains Independent School District concerning the high

school building. State Fire Marshal's Office and Texas Education Agency have both advised that steps to improve or replace the structure must be taken soon. The TEA has placed Cross Plains Schools on advised accreditation status because of the condition of the structure. Preliminary steps to study the situation have already been taken. An architectural firm has been hired and is making a feasibility study on cost comparison of remodeling or building anew.

Callahan County faces somewhat the same situation with the county jail. A state agency

has failed the county jail at Baird citing many deficiencies, and ruling the lock-up in the county's office in Cross Plains as sub-standard. It is expected that when commissioners are advised of costs and alternatives, a bond election for that project may be called.

In the county terms of Sheriff Bill Skinner, County Attorney Don Wilson and County Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell are expiring.

This year, 1980, will prove to be politically active from the national level to city, school and precinct districts.

## Officer Reminds Of School Tax Deadlines Approaching

Peggy Dickson, tax assessor-collector for Cross Plains Independent School District, has reminded taxpayers of several deadlines.

First date to be remembered by taxpayers is January 31, 1980. "That is the last day for paying 1979 taxes, before penalty and interest is added beginning on Feb. 1, 1980," she explained. The tax official continued that taxes become delinquent on Feb. 1, 1980.

She also cautioned that rendition forms, homestead exemption and agricultural use exemption applications need to be in by April 1. It was explained that in order to continue freeze on taxes of homestead for the elderly 65 or over and the disabled, and to take advantage of the agricultural use exemptions, applications must be made annually by the taxpayer.

It was once again explained that Cross Plains Independent School District will go to 100 per cent tax ratio in 1980. For the past two tax periods, the tax ratio has been at 50 per cent for this school district. She also explained that it does not mean that taxes are going up.

"It simply means that taxes will be derived from the full assessed value of property instead of one-half of the assessed worth."

## Cong. Stenholm Reveals Plans To Ask Re-Election

Citing mounting tension in the middle east as a prime example of the need for increased United States preparedness as the top priority in the 1980s, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced his plans at Stamford Tuesday to run for his second term of office.

Stenholm told a large group of supporters of his firm commitment to a stronger defense position that could "leave no doubt in any nation's mind of America's resolve to defend our hard won freedoms."

"That is one of my primary goals during the next session of Congress," he said. "One of the reasons I am asking for a renewal of my contract to serve the people of the 17th District."

"Cindy and I wanted to make this announcement here at home where it all began," Stenholm told the group "We could not have won in 1978 without your help. We shall continue to work hard to merit your confidence and pledge to every citizen in the district our commitment to listen to their views."

**Criminals To Pay For Violent Crime Aid?**

The following article appeared in a state capitol news release compiled by the Texas Press Association and offered to members of that organization.

"Starting Jan. 1, the state will provide cash to victims of violent crimes whose injuries caused financial hardship. The new law is one passed by the 66th Legislature, and convicted criminals, not taxpayers, provide the funds.

"Criminals will contribute in various amounts to the new Crime Victims Compensation Fund, and victims or their survivors can apply to the Texas Industrial Accident Board for help."

**Easier To Qualify For SSI Benefits**

New rules now in effect should make it easier for people to qualify for supplemental security income (SSI) payments than in the past, Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene said recently.

SSI makes payments to people 65 and over, or disabled, or blind, with limited income and resources.

The new rules:

- Increase the allowed value of a car.
- Change the way the value of resources is figured to take account of any money owed.
- Permit more household goods to be owned.

Before, a car valued at \$1,200 or less did not count as a resource. Now, a car valued at \$4,500 or less will not count at all. Any excess value counts as a resource.

In the past, all resources were figured at their fair market value and any money owed was not taken into account. Now, money owed on a resource will be deducted when the value is figured, except for a car.

Before, household goods and personal property valued at \$1,500 or less did not count. Now, the limit has been raised to \$2,000. Any excess value counts as a resource.

The new rules did not change the basic requirements for SSI payments, Hammons said. As before, an individual can get SSI only if he or she has resources that count valued at \$1,500 or less. The limit for a couple is \$2,250.
