Bison-Wildcat Grid Feud Highlight Of Homecoming

A special highlight of the Cross Plains School Homecoming will be the Buffalo-Rising Star Wildcat football game. The longtime rivalry will begin at 8 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 29, in Buffalo Stadium.

The non-conference clash will be the 47th meeting of the two schools on the gridiron. During

the series Cross Plains has claimed 28 victories, and Rising Star has won 17 times. There have been three ties, all 6-6 deadlocks, in first game 1929, 1974 and 1976. Bisons won last year 52-0 following a 43-7 victory by the Wildcats a year earlier.

Buffaloes will be seeking to delight an expected large homecoming crowd with the team's first win of the season. The Herd has lost its first two outings, both to District 8-A competition, bowing 29-6 to Jim Ned and 36-24 to Baird. Rising Star has played three games, claiming victories twice. The Cats beat Class A Hawley, a District 8-A member, 20-6 last week. The only loss was in second game of the season, a 16-6 defeat by strong Class B Throckmorton.

Buffaloes are expected to be at full strength, barring practice injuries for the game Saturday night. Rising Star has been slowed by injuries, losing two talented players last week.

Last Cross Plains homecoming the two teams battled to a 6-6 draw.

Baird's Quick Start Nips Buff JV 26-14

Host Baird Junior Varsity Bears hung 20 points on the scoreboard Thursday night before Cross Plains could score and eventually beat the interning Herd 26-14.

It was reported that Cross Plains had defensive lapses plus was hampered by costly penalties in the first half which aided the Bears in gaining the 20-0 halftime advantage.

Midway of the third quarter Quarterback Randy Huffman passed 15 yards to Richard Clark for a touchdown. Huffman then picked up the two-point conversion on a keeper.

Baird took advantage of another lapse on defense by Bisons and increased the lead to 26-8.

Later, in the fourth quarter, Huffman tallied on a two-yard run cutting the deficit to 12 points, 26-14. An attempted two-point conversion try failed.

Several Bisons were hurt including Clark, Kirky Stephens, who will be out two to three weeks. Greg Robertson and Jamie Hutchins. Five regular JV players moved to the varsity team last week, cutting JV numbers.

Baird Wins Error Filled Aerial Battle Over Buffs

Visiting Baird Bears claimed an eighth consecutive triumph over Cross Plains Buffaloes in clash of the two Callahan County Class A schools last Friday night.

It was a game of numerous passes and penalties which extended the non-conference game to nearly three hours.

The loss was the Thundering Herd's second of the young 1979 season, and Head Coach Mickey Huffman stated, "We made too many mistakes in the secondary, and were not reacting properly." He continued that although the Buffaloes were down, they did not give up. "They came back and we are proud of them for that," he added.

A near score on a long pass opening the play from scrimmage was called back on a Buffalo infraction, setting the stage for the many penalties called.

Baird built a 13-0 first quarter lead as Bear Greg Austin ran 21 yards around end and Alan Bohannon kicked to the point. With 35 seconds left in the first quarter Quarterback Darryl Harris rambled 18 yards on a keeper for 13-0 tally as kick failed.

Cross tallied with Quarterback Duane Hutchins getting the last 6 yards with 8:16 showing in second quarter. An attempted placement was no good cutting the deficit to 13-6.

Baird's Davy Vestal hauled in a pass and ran the remaining portion of the 70-yard play just over a minute after the Herd had scored. Bohannon split the uprights for a 20-6 count.

Buffalo Gary Robinson stole the ball in Baird's backfield and ran about 50 yards to the Bear 5. A screen pass from Hutchins to Halfback Eddie Jackson got the last five yards with 52 seconds left in first half. A pass failed on conversion try leaving score favoring Baird 20-12.

Bear Brian Fears got a safety for Baird trapping a Buff in

the end zone and raising the count to 22-12. Six minutes and six seconds later Baird's Tight End Larry Segura took a 44-yard pass for a tally. Bohannon kicked the point with a 29-12 score with 2:26 left in the third quarter. Baird scored again in the fourth quarter after Austin had rambled about 50 yards to the Herd's 15. Three plays later Segura hauled in another scoring aerial. Bohannon kicked the point for a 36-12 count with 11:10 left in the game.

With 3:02 left on the clock Hutchins passed to Buffs' Wide Receiver Tan Flippin for 25 yards and a touchdown. Hutchins' pass on the two-point conversion to Marty Callaway was not successful. Buffaloes added six more points on last play of the game as Flippin caught a deflected pass in the end zone which covered nine yards. David Illingworth's kick was not good leaving the final count at 36-24.
