School Cornerstone Reveals Numerous Interesting Items

Before the old Cross Plains High School building was demolished, the cornerstone, installed by the local Masonic Lodge was removed, it held many interesting items, most of which are listed here.

The articles, which were placed there 53 years ago, prior to beginning of school September 5, 1927, were wrapped in a copy of the blueprint of the high school building.

Masonic items included were a Masonic apron, two letters, one listing membership of the

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Two copies of the Cross Plains Review were included, one dated Aug. 16, 1912, consisting of four pages, and the other, dated Aug. 26, 1927.

Three checks were found, all blank, one each from First State Bank, The Farmers National Bank and one which would be honored by The Bank of Cross Plains (unincorporated).

In remarkably good shape was the "1927 City Pocket Directory of the Business Men of Cross Plains, Texas." City officials were listed as F. M. Gwin, mayor; Chas. F. Hemphill, city secretary; Martin Neeb, street commissioner; J. W. Westerman, water commissioner; R. A. Autry, finance commissioner; A. C. Dodson, police and fire commissioner; J. E. Henkel, city judge, and O. T. Laws, water superintendent.

Also included was a brief resume entitled "Cross Plains Today." It follows.

"Cross Plains is in Callahan County, Texas. Only a few months back a thriving little city of a thousand population (1920 census 700) is today not only the trading center of one of the richest agricultural sections of the state, but the hub of a great oil field.

"Cross Plains has many advantages. No city anywhere near its size in Texas has brighter prospects. Here every factor necessary for conservative, prosperous growth will be found. With the agricultural development in this section, along with the discovery of an apparently inexhaustible supply of oil. Cross Plains offers opportunity to men engaged in every line of endeavor.

"The story about Cross Plains is a long one. To home seekers, who are anxious to get ahead, to you who like genuine neigh-

bors and large yields from small investments in lands, in industry, in business—COME TO CROSS PLAINS.

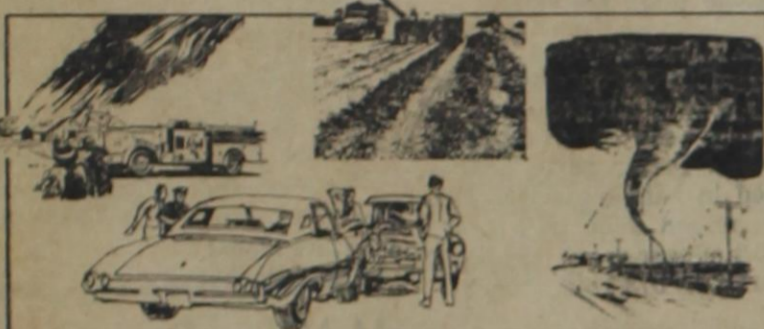

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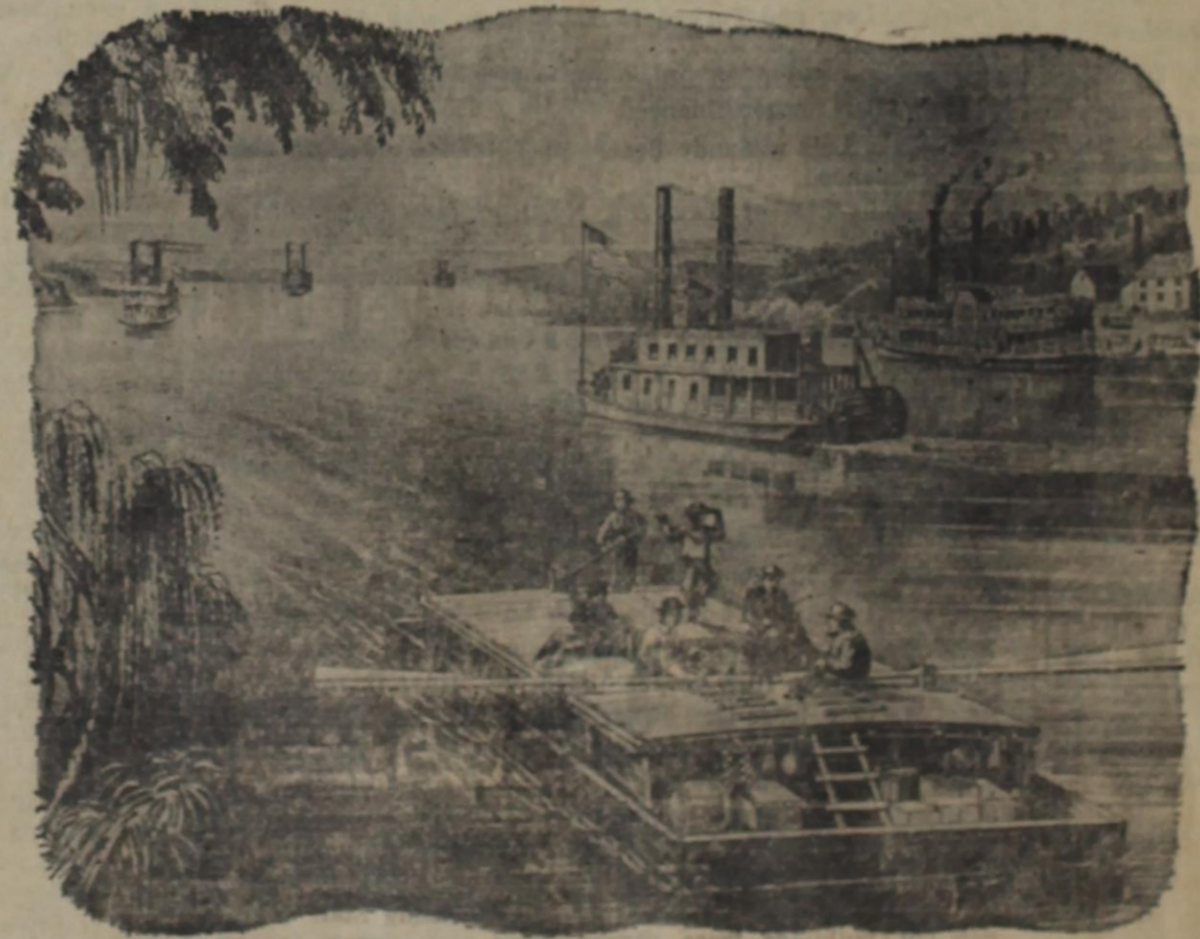

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate un-manned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence.

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

**PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT**  
House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.  
The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."
