**One More Time** 

It's time to fall back -- on the clock, that is, If you were not one of the millions of persons who turned their clock back an hour before retiring on Saturday night, you got up an hour too early this morning.

At 2 a.m. today (Sunday) Daylight Savings Time reversed for its fall and winter schedule. From now until the last Sunday in April 1970, all clocks will be on their usual time schedule, that is, their usual time schedule before the days of Daylight Saving Time.

With the advent of Central Standard Time again, football teams take to the fields 30 minutes earlier, with gametime scheduled for 7:30 p.m. instead of 8 p.m.; television stations have rescheduled their programs and airlines and major transportation companies have also had to reschedule their times.







Some men who have lost their hands in a farm At machine can learn to do many things. But, they could do these things much easier when they had two hands.

Every fall, says B.G. Reeves, Extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, many farmers lose a hand or an arm in a harvesting machine. Such complex machines as combines, corn pickers and cotton strippers afford many opportunities for the careless operator to suffer serious accidents. These According to the report, machines have many moving parts -- drives, belts, con-veyors, sickles, etc. These had been received by the workmoving parts are conducive to damaged fingers, hands or arms -- sometimes lives, reminds the engineer.

A few simple rules, carefully used, can help to prevent these costly accidents. Here are a few.

Keep protective shields in place. When they must be removed to work on drives, belts. pulleys, and chains, be sure to replace them before starting the machine. Many, very serious accidents have been caused by clothing being wrapped around a drive shaft.

Be very sure a machine is not in operation when it is being worked on. Every year








