

New Postal Building Due To Be Completed Friday

The new building to house the United States Post Office in Cross Plains is scheduled to be completed on Friday. That is the word from George Dawson, foreman on the project since its beginning.

The structure, located on northwest corner of East 8th Street and Avenue D, is being built by B. D. Click Co. of Abilene. It is to be leased to the U. S. Postal Service.

Joe E. Hanke, Jr., Cross Plains postmaster, said that it was not yet known when the post office would be moved to the new quarters. "There is much to be done before a move order is issued," he explained. He said that upon completion of the facility, the postal service must inspect and approve the building before it can be occupied.

Dawson stated Tuesday that his schedule called for completion of the structure on Friday.

Bisons Blank Wildcats 12-0 For First Grid Win

Cross Plains Buffaloes used a hard-hitting ground attack and improving defense to defeat arch rival Rising Star Wildcats 12-0 Saturday night. It was the Herd's first victory of the 1980 campaign against two losses.

Cross Plains held the upper hand in most statistical categories as well as the scoreboard. Bisons earned 18 first downs to 6 for the hosts. Buffs gained 280 yards rushing and another 71 yards passing. The stout Cross Plains defense limited Rising Star to 71 yards total offense.

Eddie Jackson was the Herd's leading rusher with 138 yards. Randy Huffman took 68 steps forward. Dennis Koenig ran for 62 yards, and Bobby Phillips gained 12 yards. Huffman, operating as quarterback, completed four of eight aeriels for 71 yards. Richard Clark was the leading receiver with two catches for 98 yards.

Head Coach Mickey Huffman said, "The offensive line did a great job blocking, and the fumbles on the snap were eliminated which hurt in the first two games." He added Tommy Conlee is off the injured list and did a fine job on defense, allowing others who play both ways some rest. "Everyone on defense played super," Huffman stated, "we bent a few times but didn't break."

He added that this win will definitely be a boost for us, and I feel we will improve from here out. "The team really noticed the great following we had at Rising Star and we really appreciate the town getting behind us," the coach stated.

Buffaloes scored their first touchdown with 3:41 left in the second quarter when Huffman scored on a quarterback sneak

the last yard. Jackson was stopped short on a two-point bonus try leaving the score 6-0. It remained that way at intermission.

Bisons counted their second touchdown of the season with 1:56 left in the final quarter. Koenig got the tally on a sixyard run over his left side on the first play of the fourth period. Jackson was again cut down short of the goal on the two-point bonus play, leaving the score favoring the Herd 12-0.

Cross Plains took the opening kick and mounted a sustained march which carried to the Wildcat 9 before a fumble stopped the drive. It was hampered by a couple of major penalties, but also aided by a pass interference call at the Wildcat 9. The drive consumed 7 minutes and 15 seconds of the first quarter. Buffaloes controlled the ball during the first half, but the hosts showed signs of rebound in the second half.

On the final play of the game Cross Plains believed they had another score when Huffman passed to Koenig, but officials ruled the catch was made outside the end zone.

Buffaloes travel to Robert Lee Friday to take on the Steers of District 3-A. It is believed the Friday night contest, slated to start at 8 p.m., will be first meeting ever between the two schools. Robert Lee is a team which was moved out of 7-A to make room for Cross Plains. The Steers won the West Zone of the conference last year and return four starters from the 7-4 team last year. Friday's hosts have lost to Bronte 20-6 this year, but opened with a win over Sands and last week beat Forsan 20-6.

Buff's will be seeking to even non-conference record at 2-2.

Transaction Is Completed For New City Water Field

Transactions were completed Monday whereby City of Cross Plains purchased 126.7 acres a mile east of Cottonwood to be

developed into a water field. It is known as the former V. I. Spivey place.

The land was bought at a

cost of \$1,000 per acre from the Rodman, Ferrell and Fortune Corporation, according to city sources. The funds, \$126,700, were provided as a part of the \$1.5 million grant secured about a year ago from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. City officials, its engineers, Yeatts & Decker of Abilene, and other consultants who worked on the transaction, readying documents, had been working for the past several weeks on the purchase.

Present plans call for laying of a pipeline from the city 4.8

miles to the new water field as soon as engineers can get bids. "We hope to begin right away," said Billy Dillard, city utilities superintendent. "We will have it all hooked up before next summer," Dillard said.

Mayor O. B. Edmondson stated that he was happy to make the purchase, and said that Cross Plains water source problems are solved now, at least for the near future. "We are also happy with the way the engineers and other consultants carried out the paperwork in the purchase," the Mayor stated.

An existing well tested 150 gallons per minute in tests some time ago, and six other wells drilled on the property tested from 50 to 100 gallons per minute, officials stated.

Quality of the water has been checked by State Health Department and the Taylor County-Abilene Health Department. In both instances it was approved for human consumption.

Dillard stated that in addition to the water field and the supply pipeline, additional fire plugs and some water main improvements as well as sewer facility improvements are scheduled in the HUD grant.

Edmondson said that it appears that the new engineers will take the project along as rapidly as HUD requirements will allow.

In addition to those improvements already listed and housing aid, some of which has already been completed, a recreation center for senior citizens is included. "That is in the third year of the project," Mayor Edmondson stated, "and first objective of that will be site purchase." He continued, "most of that is about a year away."

Bill Reed, pastor of the church, stated that the van will be used primarily to transport people to the church for Sunday School and worship services. "Also it will be used for trips for senior citizens of the community," he continued. Rev. Origin of the blaze was yet undetermined Tuesday, although it apparently started toward the rear of the Main Street business. "We don't know what the exact cause of the fire was," Mrs. Aiken stated.

The structure, a tile building with sheet-iron-covered frame roof was well involved upon arrival of local fire fighting equipment. Little damage was done to buildings on either side, both not used at present, due to efficient and prompt action of fire-

men. Some fire fighters stayed on the scene until 3 a.m. making sure the blaze was tapped out.

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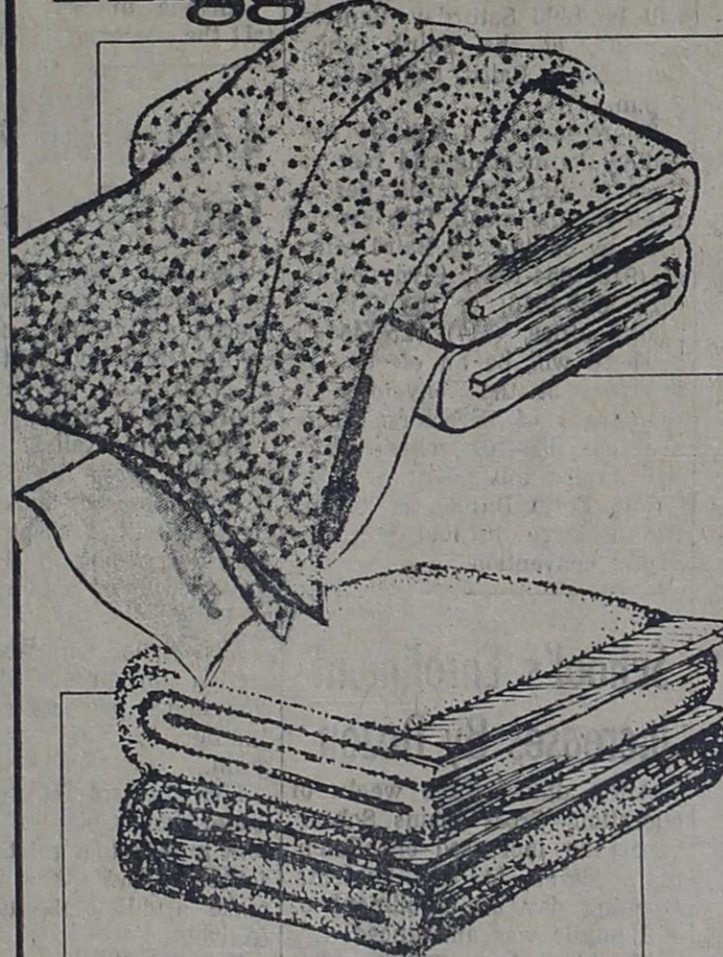

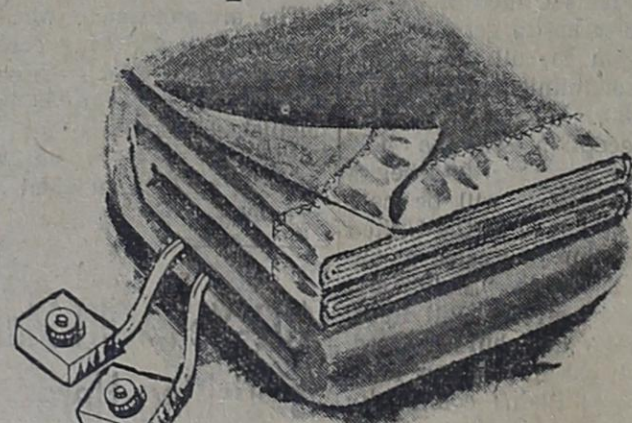

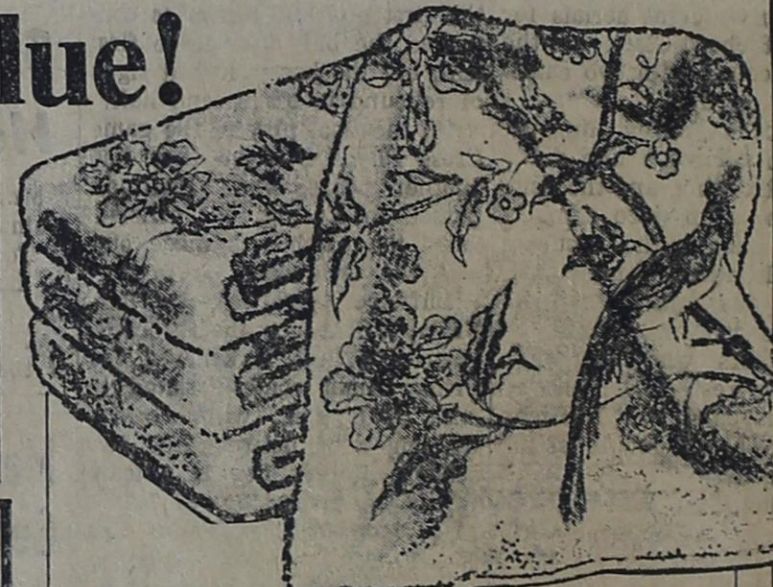

SS Toll-Free Phone Saves Time, Energy

There is a new toll-free telephone number for most residents of this area to call when they have social security questions, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager, Abilene.

Residents of Callahan, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Nolan, Shackelford, Stephens and Stonewall counties may simply dial direct 1-800-392-1603 and reach personnel who are specially trained to accept reports and answer social security questions by telephone. Social Security representatives from the Abilene office will continue to visit your area, but not quite as frequently as in the past.

Even with less frequent visits, service will be better because most social security questions and reports can be handled by telephone, any weekday, at the caller's convenience, by dialing the toll-free number.

A few examples are questions about Medicare, requests for retirement benefit estimates, address changes from social security beneficiaries to insure prompt delivery of their monthly checks, beneficiaries' reports of earnings, questions about the disability provisions of the law, and inquiries about supplemental security income. The agency refers to this type of service as "Teleservice."

Teleservice is available from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

FmHA Offers Low-Interest Loans To Aid Qualifying Home Owners

Callahan County Farmers Home Administration supervisor Jack Phillips stated today that rural home owners whose houses need fixing up to make them safe and sanitary may be eligible for a repair loan from Farmers Home Administration at a 1 per cent interest rate.

Income is the key to the type of assistance for which a person may be eligible.

Loan funds may be used for paying the cost of repairs and improvements, including, but not limited to:

- 1. Repairing roofs.
- 2. Installing screens, storm windows and doors, insulation, and needed heating systems including wood stoves.
- 3. Providing sanitary water and or waste disposal systems.
- 4. Providing other similar repairs or improvements.

Loan funds may not be used to improve the appearance of a dwelling or make facilities in the dwelling more convenient unless such changes are directly associated with removing hazards to health or safety.

Low income families may borrow up to a maximum of \$7,500. Loans are repayable within 19 to 20 years depending on the amount borrowed and the repayment ability of the family.

Families living in a home on a farm, in the open country, or in towns of up to 10,000 population may qualify if they cannot

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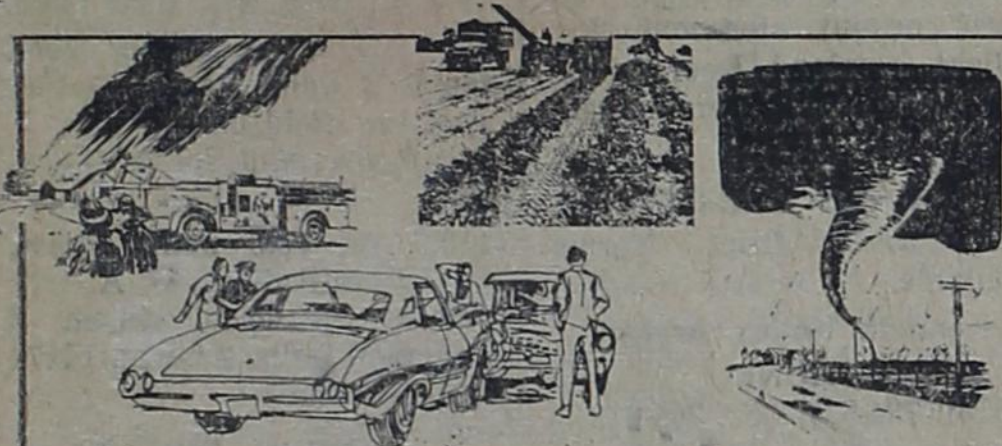

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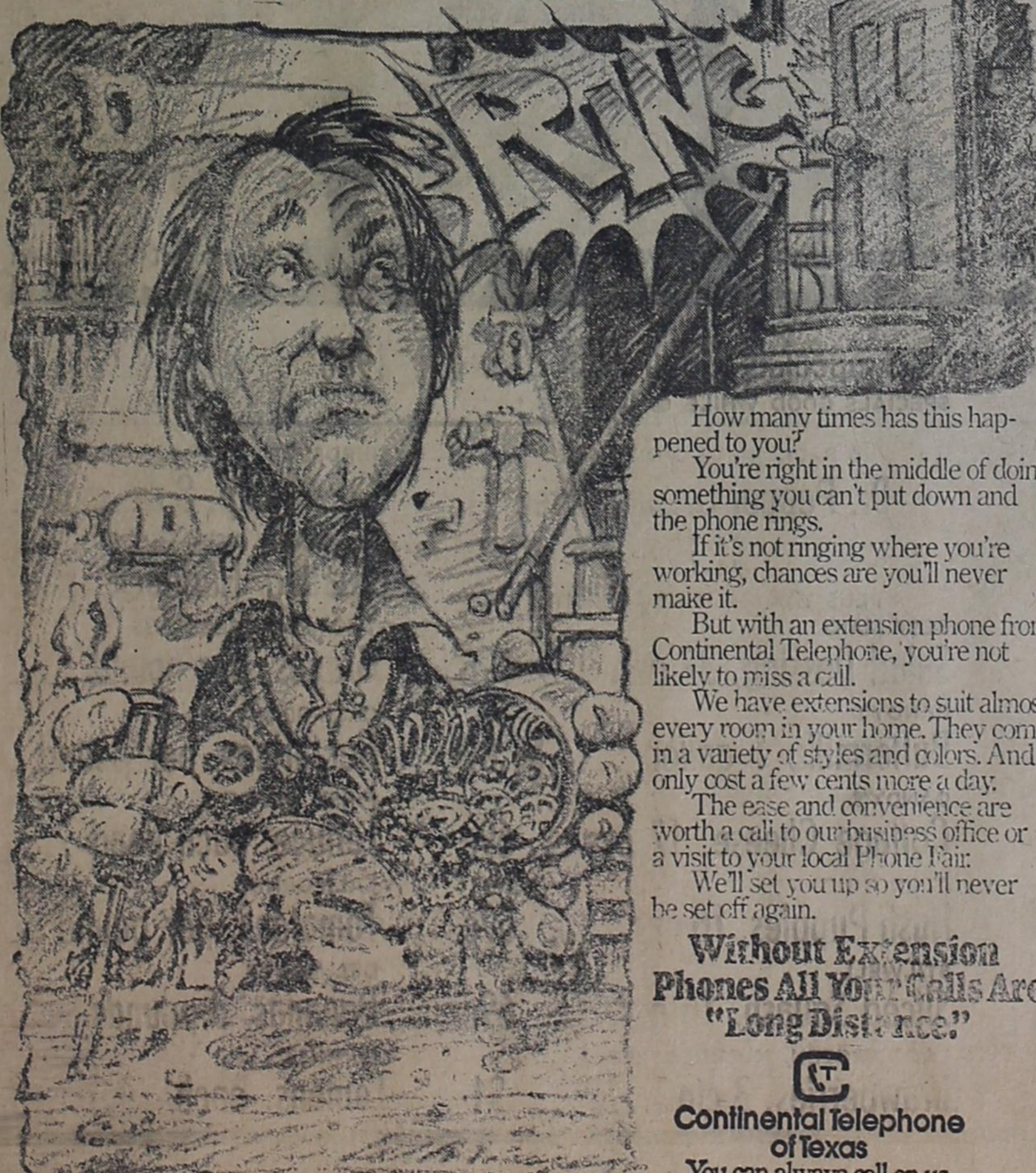
