Flame Gas, Inc. filed a bankruptcy petition, and Judge John Flowers had ordered gas cut at noon July 13 if some arrangement had not been made to operate the system by some responsible party. Flame personnel supervised the system about a week after it had filed the petition. Rate of gas service has been established at \$8.50 per thousand cubic feet.
