Mitchell Atchley has signed a contract with the Cross Plains Independent School District as Athletic Director-Head Coach for the coming season.

He played football while in the service and was selected to the all-division team as defensive end and fullback. # Cemetery Needs Help As Gifts Lag, Expenses Rise

Cross Plains Cemetery Association is needing financial assistance, according to word coming out of a business meeting it held Monday night.

Recent expansion of the burial plot forced use of some reserves, and contributions have been declining in recent months, no longer meeting monthly expenses. As an example the cemetery board revealed donations during the past three months amounted to only \$540, only slightly more than half of fixed expenses for that period of time.

In May 1981 Cross Plains Cemetery Association purchased the L. E. Johnson land, approximately three acres, for \$14,000, borrowing that amount. That tract is across the street north of the cemetery.

Two blocks of land east of the present cemetery was sold by bid to Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Co. for \$4,035.50, which was applied to the note, as was another \$1,000 paid for the house on the newly purchased land. A certificate of deposit owned by the cemetery association further reduced the debt to \$2,905.00.

The cemetery association desperately needs contributions to pay off the note, which was renewed on Tuesday, plus adequate amount to begin preparing the new ground for use, such as clearing, leveling and laying out and building roadways through the property.

Cross Plains Cemetery also recently was deeded another lot which lays immediately north of the Clovis Simons home. It was formerly owned by a Pentecostal Church which no longer meets.

High humidity and the rain held harvest to a creep during the past week. Some fields are reported to be getting weedy, but wheat is still standing well in most patches. Market had improved to \$3.45 here Tuesday whereas number one wheat was bringing \$3.35 last week.

An estimated 50 per cent of the crop has been harvested.

Latest rainfall brings to 1.30 inches the moisture received in June to mid-afternoon Tuesday and the year's aggregate at that time was 14 inches.

## U. S. 283 At Baird Seal Coat Treatment

Bids to rehabilitate 24.6 miles of various highways in Callahan, Scurry, and Shackelford counties were expected to be received June 15 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Abilene District Engineer Roger Welsch said a seal coat layer of asphalt and aggregate will be applied to among others, the following highways:

Callahan County: U. S. 283, from one mile north of Loop 425 at Baird southward, 8.1 miles.

Shackelford County: U. S. 180 from Albany to 0.3 mile west and from Albany to the Stephens County line.

The completed project will protect and prolong the useful life of the existing highways in addition to improving skid resistance of slick roadways.

## State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Gov. Bill Clements has announced that he has arranged to get all of the parties in the 10-year-old Texas prison suit to the negotiating table in a final attempt to resolve the case, apparently upstaging similar efforts by Attorney General Mark White.

However, White, Clements' Democratic opponent in this year's governor's race, says Clements can't take credit for negotiations that have been going on since April.

Clements announced plans for the negotiation session after discussing the matter with William Bradford Reynolds, head of the U. S. Justice Department's civil rights division.

Parties to the meeting will include Reynolds, White, attorneys for the inmate plaintiffs, Texas prison director Jim Estelle and other officials involved in the case.

Clements also says the Justice Department has agreed not to push for single cells for inmates.

White, though, has pointed out that a federal court order by Tyler Judge William Wayne Justice requires single cells. Members of White's staff also have said attorneys in the case have been meeting periodically in attempts to settle issues in the case — meetings in which the governor's staff has not participated.

However, Clements' negotiating sessions turn out, the prison suit promises to be a highlight of the gubernatorial campaign, with Clements already contending that White's "incompetence" has dragged out the case for several months.

### Candidate Switch

The Republican Party has pulled off its second switch of the campaign season — this time in the race for state treasurer.

The GOP earlier had substituted Texas A&M University poultry expert Fred Thornberry for Waller rice farmer Donald Hebert in the agriculture commissioner's race. Now Millard Neptune has been replaced by former Clements aide Allen Clark in the treasurer's contest.

The withdrawal of the 71-year-old Neptune from the race was no surprise since the candidate had said all along he would step aside for a more qualified candidate.

Clark is a former banker and a Vietnam war veteran who lost both legs below the knees in a mortar explosion during the war.

Texas Democratic Party Chairman Bob Slagle called the switch the second fraud "perpetrated" on Republican voters.

Clark now takes on former Travis County Commissioner Ann Richards in the November general election.

### Law Student

Billy Clayton may be on his way out as speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, but he already has found another activity to keep him busy for a while — law school.

Clayton and Bryan Rep. Bill Pressnal are taking a bar review course in preparation to take the state bar examination to become lawyers.

The two lawmakers would be allowed to take the bar exam under a state law that allows legislators to take the test without completing law school.

That's the same law under which unsuccessful attorney general candidate John Hannah got his law license.

Clayton says the course is "kind of challenging" but adds he has no intention to go into practice.

But who knows? Maybe Clayton will run for attorney general himself in four years.

### Bid Rigging

The state highway commission has voted to suspend 17 highway contractors accused of bid rigging from competing for future state highway projects, but at least one of those contractors has won the

first round of court battles against that suspension.

U. S. District Judge James Nowlin has issued a temporary injunction to prevent the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission from enforcing its suspension order against Stafford Construction Co. of Lubbock.

Stafford, which pleaded no contest to bid rigging charges several weeks ago, sought the injunction saying the highway commission ignored the fact that the company has cooperated in the bid rigging investigation when it approved the suspension.

Nowlin ruled that the commission was wrong in barring Stafford from bidding on projects because the no contest plea was not evidence of wrong doing.

Several other companies affected by the suspension order have also said they might file suit. The companies, many of which have pleaded guilty to bid rigging charges, say the order could put them out of business.

### Speaker's Race

Fort Worth Rep. Gib Lewis has been the heir apparent to House Speaker Clayton since before the 1981 Legislative session, but now Lewis is beginning to flaunt his position.

Lewis, a Democrat, says he has more than 100 House members pledged to support him. Only 76 are needed for election.

The only way he could lose the race, Lewis says, is "getting run over by a truck."

**3 Wells Completed On Puckett Lands**

Harvest Operating Co. Inc. of Cisco, has completed No. 2 Ramon Puckett as a Mississippian oil discovery nine miles north of Cross Plains in Callahan County.

Wellsite is 330 feet from the south and 951 feet from the west lines of Section 46, D&DAL Survey.

Daily potential was 24 barrels of 551 gravity oil, flowing through a 14-64-inch choke. Production is from perforations at 4,140-58 feet, treated with 2,250 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,183 feet, one foot off bottom of the hole.

Gas-oil ratio was 21,666-1. Completed as a Mississippian confirmation was the firm's No. 4 Ramon Puckett, located 2,310 feet from the south and west lines of Section 46.

Daily potential was 28 barrels of 38 gravity oil from perforations at 4,138-52 feet. The pay was treated with 2,000 gallons of acid.

The 4½-inch casing is set at 4,177 feet, one foot off bottom. The well had a gas-oil ratio of 2,000-1.

Harvest Operating No. 3 Ramon Puckett was completed in the conglomerate pay and prorated in the regular field.

Wellsite is 933 feet from the south and 1,377 feet from the west lines of Section 46.

Completed on a pump, it had a daily potential of 35 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus five barrels of water. Production is from perforations at 3,793-96 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 10 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,140 feet, one off bottom of the hole.

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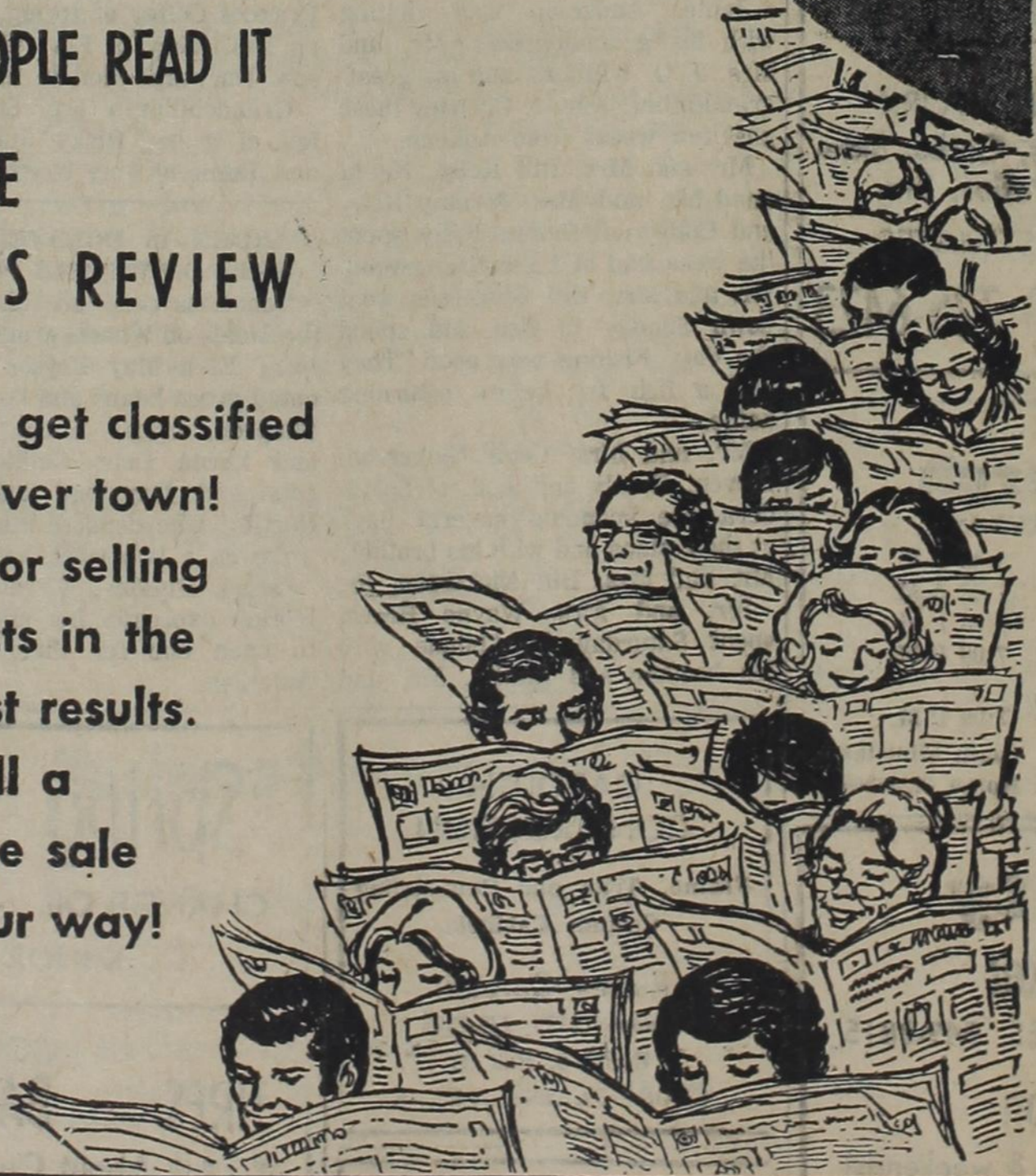
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
