

3 Local Steers Finish High At Giant Houston Exhibit

Three Cross Plains steers finished high in the standings at the huge Houston Livestock Show in competition last week.

Conda Odom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Odom of Cross Plains, had the Reserve Champion of the Maine-Anjou Division, with his

1,290 pound entry. The 4-H Club exhibitor's animal finished second to the eventual overall grand champion of the show in the heavyweight classification of the breed. The animal, bred by Peyton Smith of Rising Star, sold for \$11 per pound, a total of \$14,190.

Kelli Hargrove, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Hargrove of Cross Plains, showed the first place steer in the Simmental lightweight division in Houston competition. The 1,060-pound steer, which was showing under the FFA banner, was the same animal which was chosen reserve grand champion at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show held in Cross Plains February 19-20. It finished sixth in the show at Fort Worth earlier this year. The steer brought \$4 per pound or \$4,240 at auction. Breeder was Dillard and Sons of Cross Plains.

Cody Odom, Conda's 10-year-old brother, had a 10th place Simmental steer. The local fourth grader showed the 1,310-pounder to the championship of Garetson's Prospect Show at Fredericksburg last summer. It sold for \$1.50 per pound, aggregate of \$1,965 at Houston. That animal was also bred by Dillard and Sons.

Earlier in the year Conda Odom had the reserve champion of the Chianina class at San Antonio. That animal weighed 1,145 pounds and was bred by Scott of Rising Star.

Five other Cross Plains exhibitors attended the Houston show, but did not place animals, according to word from Roy Richey, local Future Farmers of America advisor who accompanied the group to Houston. They are Bobby Winfrey, Sheri Anderson, Jo Jo Koenig, Wesley Hilburn and Richard Clark.

Buff Powerlifters To Host Meet Tuesday Afternoon

Rep. Nabers Withdraws From Legislative Race

State Representative Lynn Nabers of Brownwood has announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election to the Texas Legislature in 1982.

In announcing that he would not seek re-election, Rep. Nabers stated that the determining factor in his decision to withdraw was the fact that his legislative district is being revised and Nabers said he simply did not have the time available to begin campaigning in a new legislative district. Nabers explained, "My law practice and my present legislative responsibilities leaves me very little free time to get out and do the campaigning that would be necessary."

Nabers had earlier filed for the position and explained that he and his family have spent many hours in arriving at the decision not to run. "The legislature has been a part of our lives for so many years that it is most difficult to make the break," Nabers commented. "However," he explained, "I feel that I simply will not have the time to give that I believe necessary. Because of my seniority and experience, I felt that I could best represent the interests of this district," Nabers said, "but it now has become impossible for me to devote the time to the office. It is with sincere regret that I withdraw my hat from the ring. I encourage every man or woman in the area who has expressed an interest in running for this position upon my retirement, to file for the office. The district deserves to have a number of candidates to choose from and the position is challenging enough to merit numerous candidates."

Nabers, chairman of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, stated, "I would like to thank the people of the 55th Legislative District for the opportunity to serve this area for the last fourteen years. I feel that the opportunity

to represent this district in the Texas Legislature has been one of the greatest privileges of my life."

Nabers will be ending fourteen years of service as State Representative, having run for the position immediately upon graduation from Baylor Law School. He has served as chairman of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, Chairman of the Health and Welfare Committee, vice-chairman of the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, and currently on the Financial Institutions Committee and the Calendars Committee during his lawmaking career. He has served the area longer consecutively than any other lawmaker since 1876.

He comes here from West Texas Industry at Stanton where he was a fire watchman, and formerly served as a Purolator security guard at Midland. Officials of the City of Cross Plains indicated that Boren will begin the process to become a certified Texas peace officer by enrolling in school next September.

Burglars Hit In City During Past Week

An outbreak of burglaries in Cross Plains continued Monday night or early Tuesday as the Higginbotham's store here was hit.

The latest crime was discovered upon opening the store Tuesday.

Burglars have broken into at least two other local business firms and several vehicles have been entered and guns or recording tapes taken from them in the past several days. Some residents have also reported gasoline being taken from tanks of vehicles recently.

Although no inventory had been taken in the burglary at Higginbotham's Tuesday, it was believed that eight or nine guns were taken along with several knives, watches, few articles of men's clothing and possibly other items. No dollar loss had been established as the Review went to press.

It was not immediately known how the burglars got into the store, as no sign of forced entry was found. Exit was made through large doors in the back of the store, according to J. C. (Doc) Claborn, store manager.

Burglary was reported Saturday morning of the Grider Gulf Station on West Highway 36 and Cross Plains Discount Center. Entry was believed made early Saturday morning in each instance.

At the station, entry was gained by going through a window of the

business. Only about \$5.00 in change was reported taken.

All that was reported missing was four Timex watches at the Cross Plains Discount Center. Entry there was gained by breaking out a boarded window where an air-conditioner had been installed, according to Deputy Sheriff Frank Thumsuden of Cross Plains who is investigating the break-ins along with Tim Boren, Cross Plains City Marshal.

National Group Cautions On Additional Peanuts

After surveying the current export market outlook for U. S. produced peanuts the National Peanut Growers Group Steering Committee has advised growers to make decisions on the planting of additional peanuts in a cautious and deliberate manner.

Ross Wilson, Texas representative on the national organiza-

tion, said that a delegation of U. S. peanut producers recently visiting European users of U. S. peanuts found marketing opportunities to be in a depressed state. Factors contributing to the poor market outlook include inflation, lack of strength in the dollar and a surplus of peanuts world wide.

Wilson said that prices for shelled goods presently being quoted by foreign users of U. S. peanuts convert to prices on farmers stock substantially below the cost of production. He said therefore, the National Peanut Growers Group has recommended that growers not plant additional peanuts in 1982 unless a contract has been secured that will assure a satisfactory net return to the producer. Wilson stated that growers should remember that additional peanuts not contracted must be placed in the area association pool and that pool dividends depend on both domestic and export edible demand. He said that there currently exists a considerable inventory of 1981 crop segregation 1 peanuts held by handlers and by the three area grower associations under the loan program. "We can only conclude at this point, Wilson said, that any production of 1982 crop additional peanuts without contracts will only add to the oversupply situation and further deteriorate markets.

Also, such peanuts going into Association loan pools will have even poorer potential of returning to growers anything over the loan rate for additional peanuts."

The grower spokesman said that in spite of the present dim market outlook for the short range in 1982, the grower team studying the export situation believes there remains a bright future for American peanuts in the European market. He cited as partial reason for his long range optimism the 13 per cent increase in peanut butter sales in Europe last year, but the broad development of that market is in its infancy, he said.

For now, Wilson said European buyers are enjoying the prospect of acquiring cheap peanuts, a condition that is being nurtured by the current oversupplied world market.

Official word from Cross Plains School Tuesday morning stated that no vote on personnel was taken by members of the school board in meeting Monday night.

Superintendent M. Lee Thompson said Tuesday, "The board did go into executive session and all personnel were discussed and evaluated, but no vote was taken."

Information the Review got early Tuesday was that several members of the current faculty were dismissed Monday night by trustees, Supt. Thompson said, "No official action was taken at Monday night's session."

He continued that official board action is expected to be taken at the March 18 regular meeting.

Only board action taken on personnel thus far this year has been contracts awarded to Supt. Thompson and Richard Purvis and Ray Womack, high school and elementary principals respectively.

Sleet Falls In City Briefly On Friday

Spring is still 10 days away, according to the calendar, and many fruit trees are threatening to bloom or blooming.

Some of the early blooming trees may have been frozen by temperatures in or below the 20's early Saturday. Some plum and apricot and a few peach trees had blooms when the norther struck last week.

About noon in Cross Plains lightning and thunder preceded a brief shower of large sleet or small hail stones mixed with rain. The ice lingered a short time on cars and other objects off the ground. Moisture received was minimal.

Fire Prevention Program Presented For Schools

Anything will burn and nothing is fireproof. This fact was brought out by Ben Bullard, assistant safety director for the Texas Farm Bureau at Waco, in a graphic animated fire prevention demonstration held March 1 at Cross Plains High School.

The three things needed to start a fire, air, fuel and heat, brightly illuminated as Ben plugged in the parts of his fire triangle board, causing the flashing "F - I - R - E" sign. He defined fire control as he removed, one at a time, the three parts.

As part of a discussion on fire control and the classes of fire (A-B-C-D), Bullard demonstrated taking away air by smothering the flame of a candle; smothering the flame of a kitchen fire (pot of burning grease — class B) and taking away the air or oxygen of another class B fire, a burning gasoline rag.

The audience also witnessed the burning of steel (steel wool); the loud shotgun-like explosion of one drop of gasoline and they saw the wiring burn inside the wall and in

the attic of a model house. (Class C).

With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes both inside and outside the house and around the farm, Bullard gave applicable prevention and control suggestions.

For fire control, he pointed out that many fires in the home, vehicles, equipment and other buildings can be extinguished while in the incipient stage; provided you have a U/L approved smoke detector and fire extinguisher of the correct size and type. "Recharge each portable extinguisher after each use," he added.

Also, he said, National Safety Council has suggested that nearly half of the home-fire victims could escape death with 30 to 60 seconds additional warning. Therefore it was strongly urged at least one smoke detector be properly placed in each home. Multi-level homes should have a detector on each floor.

Fire exit drills in the home, as

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Texas finally has a redistricting plan under which it will hold the 1982 congressional elections, and may soon have new plans to apportion the state House and Senate seats.

The three-judge federal court panel hearing the legal challenges to the state redistricting plans has handed down a new congressional plan to replace the one rejected by the U. S. Department of Justice.

That panel also is scheduled to make rulings soon on the House and Senate plans.

In the new congressional reapportionment, the judges — U. S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Sam Johnson and U. S. District Judges William Wayne Justice of Tyler and Robert Parker of Beaumont — redrew only six of the 27 districts contained in the plan that failed to pass muster with the Justice Department.

These districts included two in South Texas — the basis of the Justice Department rejection — and four in Dallas, where Gov. Bill Clements had insisted that legislators create a majority black district.

The judges undid that district, thereby restoring the 5th Congressional District of U. S. Rep. Jim Mattox, D-Dallas, who had decided to run for attorney general after previously being drawn out of the district.

Mattox, however, says he won't change his mind about the office he's seeking, even though some supporters have urged him to seek his old post.

Ogg Criticism

Instead, he seems to have more fully thrown himself into the attorney general's race attacking Democratic foe Sen. Jack Ogg of Houston, who has been named in a \$50.2 million "racketeering" lawsuit.

Mattox has called on Ogg to drop out of the attorney general's race because of the suit, which contends Ogg used his influence as a state senator to defeat a landfill application before the Texas Department of Health.

However, Ogg appears to have no intention of letting the suit be used as a political weapon to force him out of the race.

Ogg has filed a countersuit seeking \$20 million in slander damages against the firm that filed the racketeering suit, Conservation Management Inc., and he has begun his own attack on Mattox.

In response to Mattox's statement, Ogg called the congressman a "congressional groat" who has set records for low attendance in Congress.

"He had one of the worst attendance records in Congress last year and it looks like he will break that attendance record this year," Ogg said.

Ogg has labeled the lawsuit against him a "political smear job."

War On Drugs

The Texas War on Drugs, headed by Dallas millionaire H. Ross Perot, has had great success pushing anti-drug legislation through the Texas legislature, but a national magazine has labeled the effort a "fiery propaganda campaign" that is out to destroy civil liberties.

In an article published in the April edition of Playboy magazine, writer Laurence Gonzales says that "shock-troop moms" from the War on Drugs "have done more to undermine basic civil liberties than any other movement since Joe McCarthy's anti-communist crusade."

The War on Drugs crusaders were instrumental in gaining passage of laws authorizing wiretaps and outlawing the sale of drug paraphernalia during the last legislative session.

"It is our fear that if you look at what happened in Texas in 1981, we very well could see this happening on the national level, under the banner of the War on Drugs," said John Duncan, director of the Texas Civil Liberties Union, who is quoted in the Playboy article.

Spokesman for the War on Drugs has denied that their efforts have harmed civil liberties or constitutional protections, but Duncan, who appeared at a Capitol press conference with a representative of Playboy, has charged that the Department of Public Safety has stripped away the protections contained in the new wiretap law by using "pen registers," devices which record telephone calls.

Fire Ants

Farmers and ranchers who were counting on the aid of the Texas Department of Agriculture in fighting the rapidly spreading fire ant problem may not be getting the assistance they hoped for.

The agriculture department had asked farmers to collect \$1 per acre to help finance aerial spraying of the chemical Amdro in 10,000-acre blocks of rural land.

However, Milam County farmer Fred Dehaut, who helped raise \$156,000 for Amdro spraying in his county, says the department now plans to give the county only one-sixth of the amount of the pesticide they had been promised.

Dehaut and State Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, who chairs a special committee studying fire ants, says the Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown misled farmers and ranchers about the availability of the chemical. Kubiak said far more farmers asked for the chemical than Brown had anticipated.

Under the plan, the agriculture department would pay \$3 for more \$1 contributed by farmers.

"They simply do not have the funds nor do they have the materials," Kubiak said. "I think they just underestimated the magnitude of it."

Kubiak called on Brown to fulfill early commitments to Milam and other counties that have raised funds before giving Amdro to other counties who came into the program later.

Texas Independence Day Texas celebrated the anniversary of its independence from Mexico with little fanfare March 2.

Most state employees took the day off and a musical program was held in the Capitol rotunda (after those who did work had gone home), but otherwise the day passed rather uneventfully.

It seems Independence Day should have rated at least a 21-gun salute.

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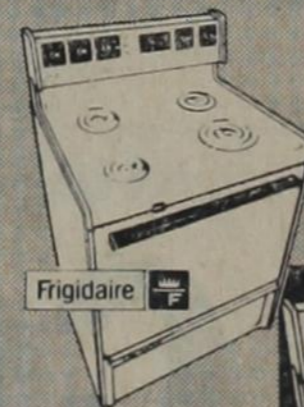
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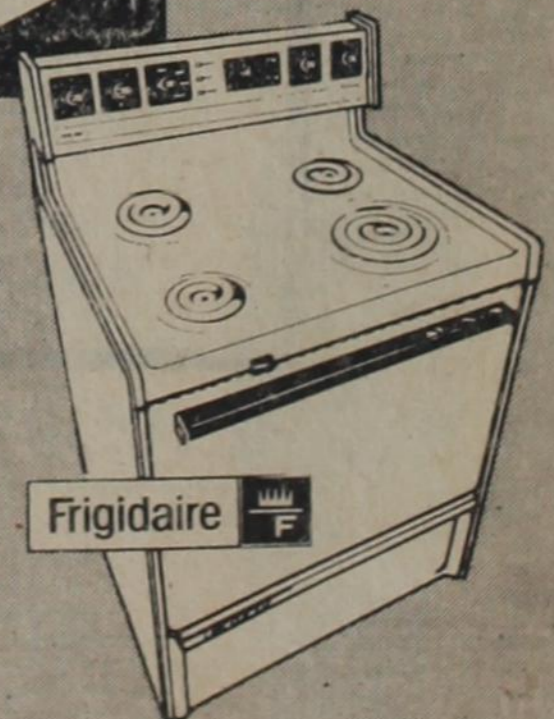
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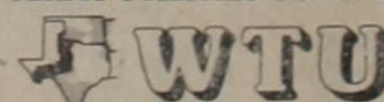
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
