



Deficiency payments are requir ed under the 1981 upland cotton program because the average market price received by farm ers during the 1981 calendar year was below the established targe price of 70.87 cents per pound. The 1981 national weighted average market price for upland cotton was 63.2 cents per pound, therefore, eligible producers will be paid 7.67 cents per pound for their 1981 crop. Deficiency payments will be based on 1981 cotton planted acreage times the payment yield for each farm as determined by ASCS.

The 1981 upland cotton crcp tocelebration for Mr. and Mrs. taled about 15.6 million bales or 7,509 million pounds. Deficiency during the week were Mrs. Bobby payments will be made to upland cotton farmers who reported their 1981-crop acreage and filed an ap plication for payment with their local ASCS office.
