Change Name On SS Card Is Harder

"Changing your name on your Social Security card is a little more complicated than it used to be," stated Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. Although the service is still free, evidence substantiatinng the change of name is now required he explained.

This means that when a woman marries and changes her name, she must submit a copy of her marriage certififate to Social Security with her application for a new card. "Although the original or a certified copy of the marriage certificate is required, it will be returned," stated Hamcial Security cards are now issued from Baltimore, Md., and are received two to four weeks after the application is filed," he said. Hammons urged all newlyweds whose names have been changed to get their new Social Security cards as soon as possible. since using the old card could cause loss of Social Security credit or a delay in receiving income tax




