You have heard and read about teenagers leaving home, but never think it would ever be in your own hometown or home.

They left home for two reasons.

We were too strict on them, they thought, and the other reason was that the kids at school made fun of them. Children don't know how they can hurt other people by calling them names.

We didn't even know if they were lying on the side of the road dead or not when we first realized they were not coming home. And we still don't know if they are dead or not.

You probably know who we are talking about by now. They are Peggy Lee and the only friend she has got, Mary Wilson.

August Is Driest Month; Rain Is Needed Badly

Citizens of Cross Plains have just completed the driest month thus far of 1982. Only .05 of an inch of rain fell within the city bounds along with a couple of traces.

It is dry within the city and in the surrounding countryside. Rain is needed by all, especially the dryland peanut crop.

Only one shower of sufficient amount to be measured fell in Cross Plains during August. That was on Sunday, Aug. 8. It brought the total rainfall gauged in Cross Plains to 18.90 inches to noon Tuesday.

Gas System Sale Delayed Awaiting Contract Draft

The gas distribution system in Cross Plains has not yet been sold.

It was believed that the sale of the system serving the City of Cross Plains was to have been sold in contract signing meeting at the City Hall in Cross Plains at 11 a.m. Tuesday.

A two hour session was held at that time, but no contract was signed. Lawyers of the two principals met and were working on a sale contract draft. Dick Harris of Abilene represented Cross Plains, and James Bowen of Brownwood

represented Dal-Mar Energies, company which will reportedly run the system, and D & P Pipeline Construction, Inc. of Comanche.

A sales contract is supposed to be ready for signing by Friday. Harris is reported to be readying the document acceptable by all parties involved.

Others attending the Tuesday morning session at the City Hall included Dale Spivey and Jim Martin of D & D Pipeline, and Mayor O. B. Edmondson, Councilman Ted McKeenan, Ray Purvis and Dwayne Wilson, representing the city.

City of Cross Plains has taken over operation of the gas distribution system since Flame Gas, Inc. filed bankruptcy documents about two months ago. Since that time the city administration has been in a quandary whether to continue operation of the system or attempt to sell it again.

Several firms have inquired about the system, but none have carried negotiations as far as D&D Pipeline.

In a meeting here Tuesday of last week, Aug. 31, among representatives of the potential buyers, city officials and representatives of the Texas Railroad Commission the meeting held yesterday was set up.

The Railroad Commission discouraged the city from going into the gas business explaining that D&D Pipeline Construction, Inc. has the equipment and personnel to replace the gas system and do it cheaper by not having to contract the job. They also point

ed out that Dal-Mar Energies has a better opportunity to secure and maintain an adequate gas supply than the city would have. Current supplier, Cross Plains Gas Company will not guarantee it can furnish all gas needed in peak demands.

The commission personnel also suggested if the city were to continue operation of the system that it would be necessary to levy a city tax, possibly higher than desired, and it is not likely bonds could be sold with payback from

gas revenue only, calling for all city utilities to be included. The extended 30-year payback would be a long time to obligate the city, and noted that the commission has filed some 30 violations in the system which would need to be corrected immediately.

Should the sale be made to the Comanche firm, and Dal-Mar operated the local gas system, it is believed that rates will be \$10 for first thousand cubic feet with each thousand cubic feet thereafter costing \$8.50.

Odoms, Mrs. Windham Are County Round-Up Heads

Mr. and Mrs. Morris Odom of Cross Plains and Mrs. Tom Windham, Jr., of Oplin, have been appointed Callahan County chairmen for the Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children, according to Jim Alexander, a general Round-Up chairman. The Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center with campuses in Abilene, San Angelo, and Snyder, executive Shelley V. Smith, WTRC's executive director.

"Livestock donated by ranchmen are collected at a designated point in each community and transported free to the auction site," Alexander explained. "The county chairman's role is to make a personal pledge, then ask friends and neighbors to join them in the annual CRCC drive."

Sales of livestock are converted to dollars and the amount provides care for about 10,000 handicapped persons throughout the Southwest at rehab campuses. Scheduled sales include Abilene

Auction, Sept. 27; Abilene horse sale, October 2; Junction sheep and goat sale, October 4; Coleman sale, October 6, and Brownwood sale, November 3.

Jim Franklin of San Angelo is CRCC co-chairman in the Southwest region. Midway Feedyards in San Angelo serves as the regional collection point.

CRCC is now 22 years old. The idea began in Bronte on the late Conda Wylie's Chadbourne Ranch. He came to Smith with the suggestion that 20 top steers be culled from his herd and sold to help defray operational expenses of WTRC.

The results speak for themselves. Today WTRC reaches out to all handicapped in the Southwest. With a goal for treating the whole patient rather than just the handicap, services offered include physical therapy, social services, psychology, orthotics, diagnostic services, educational, adaptive equipment shops, audiology, medical clinics, genetic counseling and transportation.

An instructor's seminar for emergency medical personnel was held in Abilene at the West Central Texas Council of Governments Building on August 20 and 21. Paula Kelley, Carolyn Wilson and Billie Norton of Cross Plains attended, which was by invitation only.

The seminar was offered in order to be kept up to date on changes and additions in skills, techniques, teaching methods and necessary paper work involved with the Emergency Training Schools in Texas.

Mrs. Wilson, a Certified Paramedic, is qualified as a course co-ordinator, skills instructor and examiner for E. M. T. and E. C. A. courses. She has been active member as well as co-ordinator of the Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service in recent months.

She is now on a temporary leave of absence. Mrs. Wilson also taught an E.C.A. class in Cross Plains last year.

Mrs. Norton, a certified E.M.T., has also served as coordinator of the local E.M.S. in the past, and is an active member of the local group. Mrs. Norton just finished helping teach an E.M.T. class here in Cross Plains. She is qualified as a lecturer and skills instructor and examiner.

Mrs. Kelley is also a Certified Paramedic. She is currently serving as one of the co-ordinators of the E.M.S. She will be qualified as a lecturer and skills instructor also.

It is hoped there will be more E.M.T. classes and E.C.A. classes held in the future in Cross Plains to keep the local ladies busy as well as out of town classes held.

Bisons Lose To Bears; Home Opener Is Friday

Baird Bears delighted homecomers but offended county neighbors to the southeast in defeating Cross Plains Buffaloes 29-0 in opening grid action for both of the Callahan County football squads.

It was the 11th consecutive triumph for the Bears over the Herd in the 50 meetings of the two schools.

Baird claimed an early 6-0 lead. Bisons fumbled the opening kickoff and on fourth and goal the hosts scored on a play-action pass from the nine. Halfback Billy Deel passed to Chris Graham for the tally. Bison Dennis Koenig blocked Baird's kick from placement, and the score remained 6-0 through the first half.

One of the better thrusts made by the Herd in the first half died on the Bear 30 when a screen pass failed by about one yard to gain the necessary yardage on a fourth and three situation.

In the second half Baird added 23 points on runs of 16 and 11 yards by Quarterback Ronnie Casey and a 12-yard pass to Gra-

ham. Points after were added on a kick by Ben Mendez, and Casey passed to Alan Tatum and Graham for two-point conversion.

Cross Plains contributed to its own downfall on a short punt in the fourth quarter from which point Baird scored.

Admission to Friday's home opener for the Thundering Herd will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students. Game time is 8 p.m.

Ranger will furnish the opposition for the Bisons. The Bulldogs defeated Blanket 19-6 last week. Ranger is a member of District 12-AA, but was for many years a member of Class A conferences under old alignments with Cross Plains.

Head Coach and Athletic Director Mitchell Atchley said that Ranger will be rough. When they are AA all will be tough," the coach pointed out.

According to preseason polls Ranger is rated fourth behind perennial powers De Leon, Dublin and Hamilton in 12-AA. Ranger posted a 3-7 record last season, and has 10 players with starting experience back from that squad.

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

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

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

The special session called to patch up the Texas unemployment tax fund problem will most likely settle for a "quick fix" now and leave the mess for the regular session in January.

Meanwhile, a report from the Farmers Home Administration states almost half of their Texas farmer loan accounts are delinquent, a rate higher than FmHA officials can remember and the fourth highest in the nation.

The report is chock full of facts indicating the state's agriculture economy is in severe financial condition.

Going Insolvent

This week's special session, meeting to keep the unemployment fund solvent, was preceded by more deceptive publicity than usual on the part of the leaders involved, perhaps because Gov. Bill Clements felt compelled to recall the Legislature at a time when political campaigns are in high gear.

The "quick fix" solution, as House Speaker Bill Clayton dubbed the Clements plan, calls in part for Texas to borrow federal dollars to keep the fund solvent (and the employer tax rate down) until January, when the regular session meets and will have to increase the tax. Clayton was originally opposed to borrowing from the feds.

The deception could be found in the reluctance of Clayton, Clements and others to call the fed money "a loan" in front of the press. Let a loan it is, and the Legislature was considering where to come up with the money to pay the interest on the so-called non-loan. It would be repaid with a delayed tax hike.

Also, Texas Employment Commission officials reasserted their claim that they had warned Clements a year ago of the impending unemployment crisis. Clements denied getting a warning and asked them "to produce the letter." They then produced a letter which back-

ed up their claims, but Clements said he found no such letter in his files. Someone is fibbing, but who? Caught Borrowing

No public official wants to be caught borrowing money two months before Election Day to fix an economy which is supposed to be among the strongest in the nation.

Clements, in fact, did not want to call a special session now, but wanted to wait until after the election, if even then. At first he discredited the issue as a scare tactic dreamed up by his political foes, but soon with surprising haste announced he was summoning the Legislature back to Austin.

Clements and other public officials running for re-election have no desire to let tales of the predicted 2,700 per cent tax increase loose around the state prior to Election Day.

White, Temple, Armstrong

The Democrats, meanwhile, were displaying an unusual capacity for unity for once as they seek to elevate Atty. Gen. Mark White to the Governor's Mansion.

White was accompanied by his primary foes Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong and Railroad Commissioner Buddy Temple on a campaign jaunt across East Texas and the Rio Grande Valley last week. The trio flew together to demonstrate party cohesiveness, an element they claim was missing when Clements won four years ago.

The Democrats are proud of this beginning, but Republicans dismiss it as a campaign gimmick and expect Armstrong and Temple to lose interest sometime before November.

Farm Loans

The delinquency rate on farm rates is alarming because it indicates the poor state of the agricultural economy, not faulty farmers. In fact, it should probably be said many a good farmer has already been forced out of his profession in the last few years, and the few farmers remaining are of high quality. But they may bust many a more family farmer before it's through.

As of June, 48 per cent or 12,000 Texas farmers were delinquent on their loans. Texas has almost twice the national delinquency rate of 28 per cent. The FmHA doesn't like to foreclose, but in 1975 it acquired property from farmers to pay off 118 loans. This year, by June, already 822 borrowers had either voluntarily or involuntarily surrendered property to pay off FmHA debts.

The FmHA loans are given to farmers who cannot get financial backing elsewhere. Once snubbed in times of prosperity, these loans became more popular with the tight credit crunch.

In 1948, a bushel of wheat sold for \$3.50. In August, 1982, that same bushel sold for \$3.35.

Abuse of Office

Senator Mike Richards, R-Sugarland, is being aided in his effort to unseat longtime Democrat incumbent Comptroller Bob Bullock by a group of former Bullock employees who want to expose alleged abuses of that office.

Bullock dismissed them as "Mickey Mouse and the Sewer Rats," and said they were a bunch of malcontents and rejects and couldn't make the grade in his office.

Richards said the group was not recruited to attack Bullock, but that they volunteered.

Texas Oil Hearing

For years the Legislature has debated whether to increase the severance tax on oil and gas, supposedly forcing out-of-state consumers to pay the tax, and both pro and con forces have argued that Texas oil won't always be rosy.

No one will be able to oppose that point in next spring's Legislature.

Last week a Houston oil drilling firm, Hughes Tool Co., gave lay-off notices to 540 hourly employees, bringing that company's layoffs to 1,540 in the past three months.

Company officials blamed the lay-off on the oil drilling decline which has troubled the industry state-wide.

Survivors include his wife, Athalee, of Fort Worth; two sons, Randall D. Clark of Dallas and Russell A. Clark of Fort Worth, and five grandchildren.

PROPERTY TAXES

GOOD INTENTIONS AREN'T ENOUGH

I want to talk this week about taxes and good intentions.

As I travel around Texas, I notice that what's known as the Peveto Bill is the subject of much talk and controversy. This bill named after state representative Wayne Peveto, is a tax reform law: legislation of the best intention.

The law was designed to end confusion and unfairness in the way property taxes were assessed. Property was often on different tax rolls at different values. Older properties went years, sometimes decades, without being revalued or updated. New construction and newly sold property was on the rolls at more correct values and so people who owned it paid a higher share of taxes. Some property was simply left off the rolls entirely. The system was confusing and inequitable.

In an attempt to correct these problems, the Peveto Bill created property tax appraisal boards for each Texas county. These boards were charged with the responsibility of setting all property at its full value — as residential or commercial property or as land used for agricultural purposes. Taxes could then be levied on this accurately assessed property according to the needs of the taxing entities.

It sounded good, but it hasn't worked. The biggest problem is that the people on the appraisal boards are appointed, not elected. They are not accountable to the taxpayers. So now we have a new, faceless bureaucracy to deal with. It amounts to taxation without representation.

My opponent has been on both sides of this issue, first supporting the bill in the legislature — then doing an about-face and calling it bad legislation after it was passed.

The Peveto Bill, though well-intentioned, has created problems which must be dealt with in the next legislature and as your next Lt. Governor, I will do just that. If you have any thoughts on this subject, please write me at 1213 W. 34th, Austin, 78705.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."
