

Rains Continue; Storm Strikes Friday Morning


Rains continue to fall almost inches, and the year's total was daily over the Cross Plains area. 18.10 inches at noon Tuesday.

Insanity Defense Law Change Is Sought

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls announced today that he intends to introduce legislation to modify the insanity defense in the next session of the Texas legislature.

"The public reaction to the Hinckley case illustrates how the defense, as it is sometimes used, undermines public confidence in our criminal justice system," said Farabee.

"Another controversial example of the use of the insanity defense recently occurred here in Texas," Farabee related. "In February of 1980, a woman in Wichita Falls cut her 4-year-old child's heart out with a knife. The mother was found to be insane and committed to Rusk and Wichita Falls State hospitals.

Almost two years to the day after her child's death, the women was released because the hospital felt she was no longer dangerous."


