

Old Settlers' Reunion Scheduled At Church In Baird Saturday

Callahan County Pioneer Association will sponsor the 41st Callahan County Old Settlers Reunion at Baird Saturday, July 3, at the First Presbyterian Church.

The gathering of county old-timers is normally held at Treadway Park (City Park) in Cross Plains during August, but this year has been transferred to coincide with the July Fourth celebration at Baird, which is planned for the afternoon and evening on the courthouse lawn and streets of Baird.

Activities for county pioneers will begin at 9:30 a.m. with registration at the church, which is located east of the courthouse, and during that time Dorothy Reynolds of Rowden will lead in singing.

At 10 o'clock Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen of Clyde will

pronounce the invocation, and Jud Gilliland of Baird will welcome the pioneers and other guests in his role as chairman of the Pioneer Association.

Jack Scott of Cross Plains will present history of Callahan County as learned as former longtime publisher of the Cross Plains Review, Knox Waggoner in his role as master of ceremonies will lead the silent tribute to deceased pioneers, and introduce guests. Susan McNeel of Cross Plains will preside at the business meeting which will be held shortly before 11 a.m.

Numerous ribbons will be presented to pioneers recognizing them for various achievements in several longevity divisions.

The Old Settlers Reunion will dismiss after a barbecue luncheon which will be served at 11 o'clock

on the church grounds. Cost of the barbecue dinner will be \$4.00.

Pioneers are being invited to move to the Callahan County Courthouse lawn in the afternoon where various organizations will have booths set up for food and games. That is in celebration of Independence Day at Baird under sponsorship of the Baird Chamber of Commerce. It was pointed out that the many fun and food booths planned will be complemented with various children's games and races during the afternoon.

Reunion members and guests are also reminded that special arrangements have been made for the Callahan County Museums to be open from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, and they are invited to visit the facility. It is located in the basement of the courthouse, and is not normally open on Saturdays.

Barbecue will again be available from 6 to 7:30 p.m. on the courthouse lawn for the public, reunion members and guests. The Baird Chamber of Commerce will hold a street dance in downtown Baird following the barbecue supper. Everyone is invited to the dance for which Sierra Light will provide the music.

Commission Okays Lower Gas Charge

City of Cross Plains has been advised by the Texas Railroad Commission that it has set the base rate that Flame Gas can charge for a thousand cubic feet of gas at \$5.50 for the first Mcf and \$5.00 for each additional Mcf.

Basic rate which has been charged by Flame since October 1981 (shown on November bills) is \$6.392 per Mcf. That was granted by the Railroad Commission as an interim rate.

An advisement by the commis-

sion to the gas company and to the city spelled out the rate establishing of the gas company and its recovery of some loss through the Purchased Gas Adjustment Clause.

The Commission also ordered Flame Gas to promptly bring up its distribution system to compliance with established safety rules.

Following is the directive received by the City of Cross Plains concerning the base rates of \$5.50 for first Mcf and \$5.00 for each additional Mcf and the Purchased Gas Adjustment Clause.

"The above monthly rate per unit sold is based upon a price of gas purchased for resale of \$2.00 per Mcf. To the extent that Flame's price of gas to be purchased for resale increases or decreases, said monthly rate shall be adjusted up or down to reflect changes in such cost of gas per unit sold.

"This provision is not intended

to allow flow-through of the increased cost of lost and unaccounted for gas in excess of the increased cost of five per cent of lost and unaccounted for gas.

"The current cost of gas, together with the computed amount of adjustment per Mcf, shall be reported in writing to the Railroad Commission at the time monthly bills are rendered.

"It is further ordered that Flame shall promptly bring its distribution system into compliance with established safety rules and regulations, with particular emphasis on the present excessive lost and unaccounted for gas rate. Any available funds shall be used to accomplish this purpose. As of the date of issuance of the Proposal for Decision, Flame shall not use any available funds to pay past debts to its affiliate, CPG, until the system is upgraded and the lost and unaccounted for gas rate is reduced to a reasonable level."

City Accepts \$106,484.30 Bid On 2 Street Projects

City of Cross Plains approved two contracts for street work in the city for a total of \$106,484.30 after publicly opening and reading sealed bids from six contractors about 1:30 p.m. Thursday.

The work is made possible through the Department of Housing and Urban Development Block Grant received by the City about two years ago.

Lipham Construction, Inc. of Aspermont was low bidder on both

the Street Improvement portion of the project and the Seal Coat part. Lipham's bid for Street Improvement was \$79,794.30 for paving some streets in the township which are not now hard surface. The contract calls for 20,742 square yards of paving. High bid on that was \$158,878.20.

Low bid was \$26,690.00 on the Seal Coating of existing paved city streets in the amount of 37,000 square yards. High bid on that part of the project was \$33,710.00.

Work is supposed to be done in 75 days.

Most To Take Monday As Independence Day

Most business houses in downtown Cross Plains will be closed Monday in observance of Independence Day which falls this year on Sunday, July 4.

Although most downtown sections of the city will be closed, most of the business community along highways leading into the city will follow regular schedule. Some full service gasoline outlets will be open both days, some closed Sunday and open on Monday. Eating establishments plan to follow regular schedule, being open both Sunday and Monday, or closed one day or the other.

Most discount gasoline outlets and convenience stores are planning to remain open both days as usual.

Open downtown on Monday will be Cross Plains Review and J&S Grocery. The Review will, however, be closed on Saturday.

Joe Hanke, Cross Plains postmaster, said the post office will be closed Monday without service of any kind. No mail will come

in nor will any leave. Neither will mail be boxed in the post office.

Some Cross Plains people will get three-day mini-vacations. Those include Citizens State Bank, Southern Savings and Loan Association, City of Cross Plains, West Texas Utilities Co., Flame Gas, Inc., Cross Plains School and School Tax Office and Cross Plains Frozen Food Locker.

Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Co. and Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply, Inc., will have grain buying facilities open if there is a need, otherwise they will be closed.

Other local concerns are normally closed on Monday, and a few had not yet decided when contacted.

Rains Continue; Storm Strikes Friday Morning

Rains continue to fall almost daily over the Cross Plains area.

The usually badly needed rain has halted grain harvest, peanut planting and hay baling. It has, however, made crops up grow, gardens bear bountifully and made grass and weeds in pastures and yards grow rapidly.

A summertime thunderstorm struck the Cross Plains sector about 3 a.m. Friday and dumped 1.40 inches of rain here, and more in surrounding areas. High winds accompanied the storm which struck suddenly with fury. Electric power was interrupted for about 40 minutes and many trees around town were damaged. A few were toppled, but mainly limbs of all sizes were broken out. A few windows were victims of the wind or wind-blown articles.

Trim around the roof of the Dillard Texaco Station on the west side fell victim to the wind. Other minor damage was widespread around the town.

Light showers early Wednesday and Thursday of last week netted .10 of an inch each day then Friday's storm brought 1.40 inches, adding to the total was another 1.00 inch of rain which fell Saturday night and Sunday morning. A trace of rain was recorded Monday.

Aggregate for June stood at 5.40

inches, and the year's total was 18.10 inches at noon Tuesday.

Medicare Premium Is Increased Again

Medicare Hospital (Part A) and Supplemental Medical Insurance (Part B) premium rates will be increased effective July 1, 1982.

The basic premium for medical insurance — the amount most people pay — will go up by \$1.20 a month for the 12 month period beginning July 1, 1982. The new rate will be \$12.20 per month, up from the current \$11. The new premium will be deducted from the Social Security check in July.

By law, the premium increase is limited to 11.2 per cent — the percentage by which social security benefits were increased in 1981. Without this limitation rising costs of the medical insurance program would have required a much higher premium than the \$12.20. The government pays more than two-thirds of the medical insurance premium cost from general revenues of the federal government.

Persons who have worked under covered employment and who are insured for social security benefits will automatically be entitled to premium-free Hospital Insurance (Part A). However, for those not eligible for premium-free Part A, the premium for Hospital Insurance will be increased from \$89 to \$113 effective July 1, 1982.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Last week at the State Capitol, the state of the economy was a theme woven into various political fabrics: some state agencies are asking for more money, a telephone company requested for a record rate hike, Texas wants more federal dollars for alien education costs.

And various candidates are gearing up to make the economy perhaps the most important issue in the November general election.

Whether right or wrong, the Democrats plan to hang the recession and high jobless rate around the necks of Reagan and other assorted Republicans. And right or wrong, the GOP is saying the recession was inherited and caused by Democrats.

Complicating matters for state government candidates is the fact that Congress is expected to approve a new budget containing over \$21 billion worth of new taxes and a \$100 billion-plus deficit. Federal lawmakers of both parties may have to violate party dogmas when they vote on the budget, which may lead to embarrassment of many folks down along the line.

State Agencies

Budget requests from state agencies are expected to be increased and highly competitive with some agencies asking for 100 per cent hikes.

Anticipated increases for some agencies are: Department of Human Resources, \$500 million increase; State Health Department, \$150 million; Texas Rehabilitation Commission, \$92.8 million; Texas Department of Corrections, \$638 million; Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, \$700 million; state colleges, junior colleges and universities, \$600 million; Department of Public Safety, \$8 million; Department of Highways and Public Transportation, perhaps over \$1 billion.

Agency officials are saying that cutbacks in federal funding are forcing them to ask the state for more money.

Whether the state takes up some of the financial burden and allows some increases will be seen in September when the budget board makes its recommendations.

Alien Education

Governor Bill Clements last week asked the federal government for impact aid to educate children of illegal aliens. Days earlier, the U. S. Supreme Court ruled Texas must pay to educate any of these children who are attending Texas public schools, and not charge tuition.

Speaking to a Mexican-American group in San Antonio, Clements said he has no problem with the court ruling. Clements, who has long gone out of his way to court the Hispanic bloc vote, said if his plan to document illegal aliens is approved, the "children issue" will fade away.

Phone Rate Hike

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. has filed a \$471.5 million rate hike the largest proposed increase in state history, with the Public Utilities Commission.

The increase would come mostly from residential rate increases, and also from local business service. Rates for service connections and directory assistance would also go up.

Insanity, DWI

Soon after the jury found John Hincley, Jr. innocent by reason of insanity in the attempt on Reagan's life, a Texas senator has announced he will introduce a law to amend the insanity plea in this state.

State Sen. Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, said he believes the insanity plea is used too often to undermine the criminal justice system, and its use needs to be modified.

He suggested several options are open to lawmakers, including adopting a verdict of "guilty but mentally ill," as used in four other states.

Another state senator is pushing for stiffer DWI penalties while the Department of Public Safety director is asking the Legislature to raise the legal drinking age back to 21.

The director, Col. Jim Adams, also wants to amend other DWI related laws, perhaps barring open alcoholic beverage containers from vehicles.

State Sen. Bill Sarpalius, who authored the bill raising the legal age from 18 to 19, is also pushing

for much stronger DWI penalties. The anti-DWI bandwagon is shaping a program which includes increased penalties and increased difficulty in avoiding penalties, and the movement appears to be gaining strength.

Democrats, Republicans

The Democrats last week nominated State Dist. Judge Bill Kilarlin of Houston for the Texas Supreme Court. He replaces Associate Justice James G. Denton, who died of a heart attack two weeks ago. There is no Republican candidate.

The Republican National Committee voted unanimously last week to select Dallas as the site of the 1984 GOP national convention. State party officials immediately promised the grandest convention ever.

Dallas, which gave the Reagan-Bush ticket its biggest majority of any major city in 1980, was also the first choice of the President.

Brucellosis Program In State To Continue

Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission have decided to appeal the recent ruling of Judge Harley Clark regarding the Texas brucellosis program.

"The present Texas brucellosis program will continue as it is presently being administered," John B. Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission, said.

He also said Commissioners will submit recommendations to the Texas legislature so that the Texas brucellosis program will conform to state statutes and be in accordance with federal regulations.

U. S. Department of Agriculture officials have indicated they will not enforce the quarantine on Texas already in effect as long as the present state program continues.

"We want to emphasize to cowmen throughout the state that our rules will continue in effect. Commissioners believe the vast majority of Texas livestock producers and the entire livestock industry support the present program," Armstrong said.

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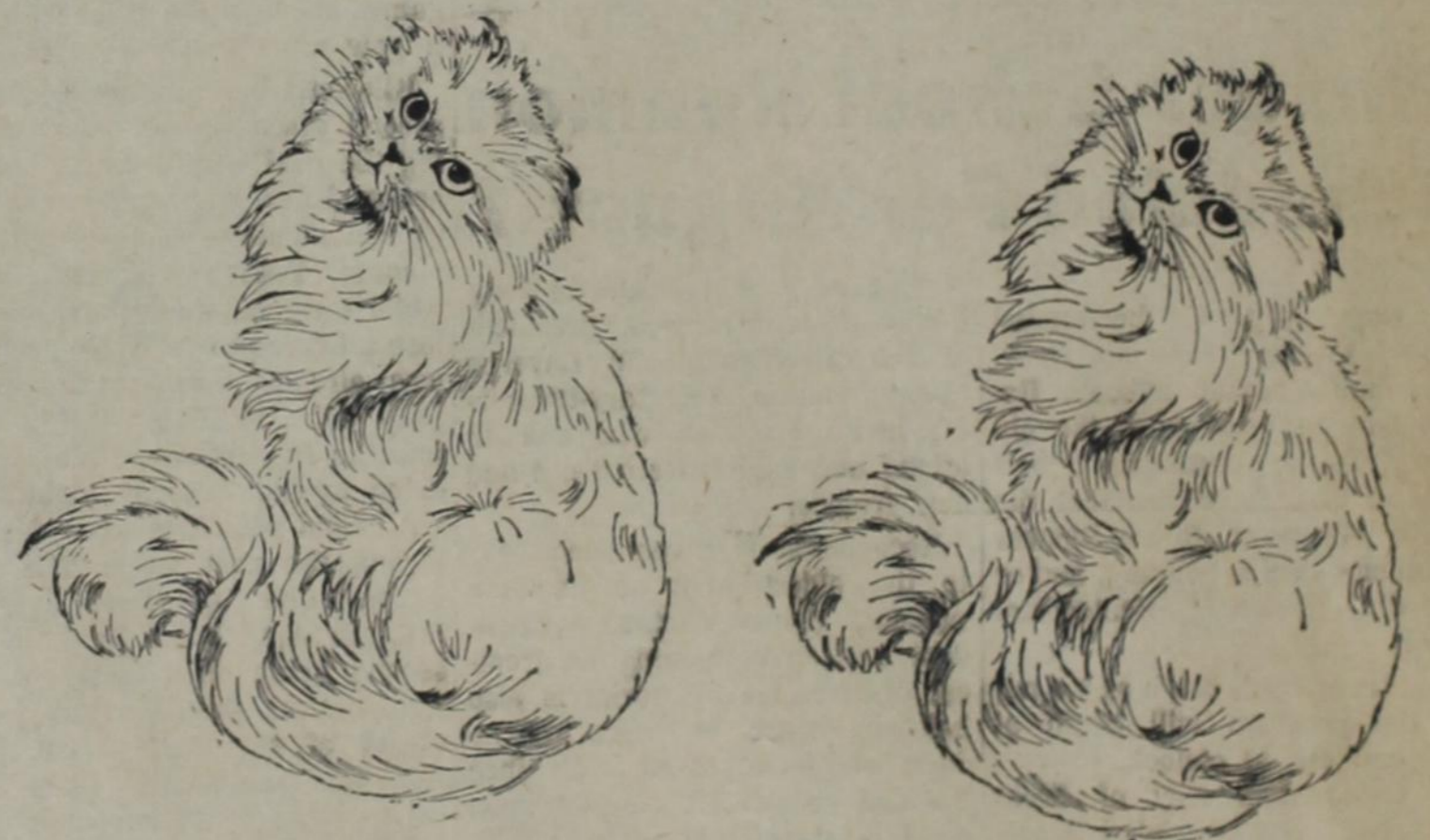

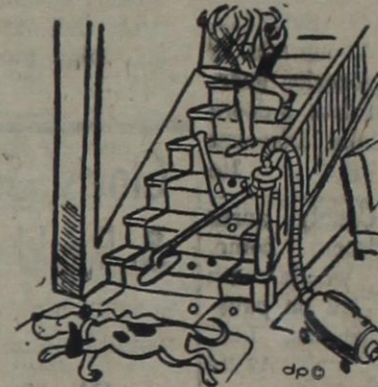

County Officers Cited For Good Jail Effort

Callahan County officials drew praise from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards for efforts to bring the 84-year-old county jail at Baird into compliance with state standards.

The following story, in part, appeared in the Abilene Reporter-News concerning the Callahan County Jail after county officials met with the commission in Austin last Wednesday.

Although acknowledging that the commission probably will never be able to certify a jail that old, County Judge Mack Kniffen of Baird said that with the changes being made, the jail should be allowed to remain in operation.

Concerning the Callahan County jail, Commission Executive Director Robert Viterna noted that "over the past five years the county has done a lot of work on their old jail and they've always been cooperative with us."

Several problems still remain, however, Viterna said.

Sheriff Bill Skinner said he is trying to solve the problem of having a jailer on duty 24 hours a day by hiring some additional dispatchers who also are qualified jailers.

"The hourly checks (of the cells) are not being made as required," Viterna said, adding records are not being kept in order by the jailer.

The sheriff said the regular jailer will make the hourly checks during the daytime and the dispatchers will do them at night.

Checks should take the dispatchers away from their radios for no more than 10 minutes at any time, Skinner said.

As for the requirement that the jail have an outdoor recreation area, Kniffen said he already has two bids and is awaiting a third before a contract is signed.

Hopefully, those items will be corrected by the next time the jail is inspected later this summer, he said.

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**Insanity Defense Law
Change Is Sought**

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls announced today that he intends to introduce legislation to modify the insanity defense in the next session of the Texas legislature.

"The public reaction to the Hinckley case illustrates how the defense, as it is sometimes used, undermines public confidence in our criminal justice system," said Farabee.

"Another controversial example of the use of the insanity defense recently occurred here in Texas," Farabee related. "In February of 1980, a woman in Wichita Falls cut her 4-year-old child's heart out with a knife. The mother was found to be insane and committed to Rusk and Wichita Falls State hospitals.

Almost two years to the day after her child's death, the woman was released because the hospital felt she was no longer dangerous."

"The average citizen has difficulty believing that if such a person was really insane, that she could be 'cured' so quickly. Mental health care is not yet a precise science," Farabee said.

Farabee stated that "the details of the legislation have not been formulated, but that several options are available. Michigan adopted a verdict of guilty but mentally ill in 1976 as an alternative to a finding of insanity, and three other states have followed suit. Idaho recently abolished the defense altogether. The American Bar Association is also working on a report on this subject."

Texas currently has a Mental Health Code Task Force to recommend changes in Texas' mental health laws. "I have asked the chairman of the task force to include the insanity defense in the study," said Farabee.

Postal Service Attempting To Prevent Theft Of Mail

Theft of mail is a violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1708, which carries maximum penalty of five years imprisonment and/or a \$2,000 fine. Unfortunately, criminals pay little attention to the consequences of their immediate actions.

The Postal Inspection Service is attempting to prevent theft of mail from all sources by informing and educating as many elements of society as possible. The United States Postal Service is a principal victim but the ultimate victim is a business or individual who depends on mail for their livelihood and existence. The loss of a social security or retirement check addressed to an elderly or retired person can have devastating emotional and financial significance.

Mail is most vulnerable at the point of delivery. An extra effort should be made by mail recipients to know their carrier's schedule and make every effort to be at home to personally accept delivery of valuable mail. Retirement and social security checks are delivered on a fixed schedule which is known by the addressee and criminals as well. Have a neighbor retrieve your mail if you cannot be available and do the same for your neighbor. Also, deposit your mail for collection at a post office or collection box. If this is inconvenient, place letters in your rural mail boxes for collection shortly before your carrier arrives. Your personal mail can be used most effectively to defraud your bank, consequently creating a very inconvenient situation. Make every effort to protect your incoming as well as outgoing mail by using these common sense suggestions.

Crime prevention can be a community effort. Everyone receives mail almost on a daily basis. This provides common grounds for neighbors to become better acquainted and watch out for each others mail and mailbox. If a concentrated effort is made to protect your mail, potential mail thieves will not be given the opportunity to make you a victim. If you have information regarding theft of mail, contact your

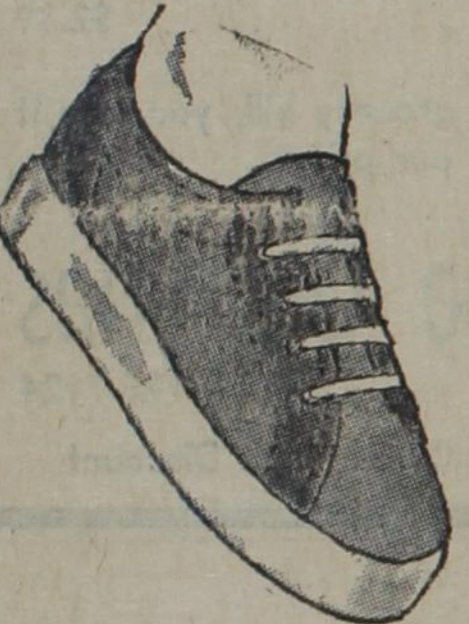

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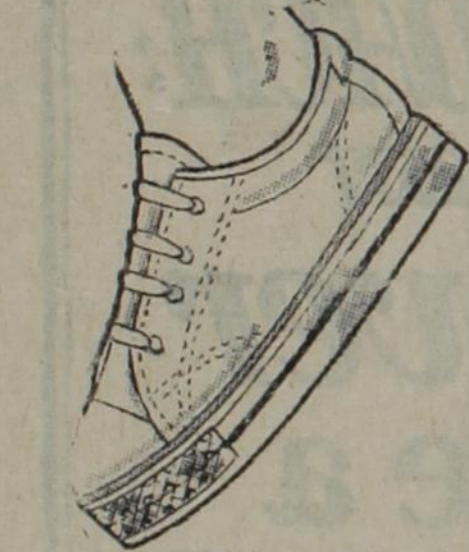
