## Carolyn's Corner

The following article was taken from Freedoms Foundations and is entitled HEROES REMEMBERED: MEMORIAL DAY.

The idea of a memorial day is not new. It can be traced back thousands of years to the ancient Greeks who lauded the dead who had given their lives in defense of their country.

More than a hundred years ago, President Lincoln paid this nation's most perfect tribute to America's war dead when he said at Gettysburg... "in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add or to detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we do here; but it can never forget what they did here."

These were but an echo of the words of Pericles, the Athenian statesman who said of the Athenian dead in 400 B.C.: "So they gave their bodies to the commonwealth and received each for his own memory, praise that will never die and with it the greatest of all sepulchres, not that in which their mortal bones are laid, but a home in the minds of men..."

Our American National Cemetery sites, both foreign and domestic, have been chosen because of their historical locations. For example, the Normandy American Cemetery is located on top of a cliff overlooking famous Omaha Beach, which was the scene of the greatest amphibious troop landing in history. The official name, "Normandy," is derived from the name of the province in which the cemetery is located.

The American Battle Monuments Commission is responsible to the people of the United States for the construction and permanent maintenance of military cemeteries on foreign soil. World War I cemeteries are in England, France (which has six) and Belgium. World War II cemeteries are in England, Luxembourg, France, Belgium, Italy, Holland, Tunisia, Manila and Honolulu.

Each of these hallowed places are beautifully land-

scaped with gardens and well kept lawns. Every grave has either a cross or Star of David, according to the hero's religious persuasion. These dead, who gave their lives in our country's service, came from every state in the Union and the District of Columbia. A few of them came from England, Scotland and Canada.

Many Medal of Honor recipients rest in foreign cemeteries. However, we must come to our own Arlington National Cemetery for the greatest number in any one place. Since the inception of Arlington, much water has flowed down the Potomac to the sea; many have died in defense of our commitments and ideals.

There are those who say there must be a "few new world," in which there is no room for love of country, love of family or love of God. Yet Arlington Cemetery stands as a symbol of these very same values. Beneath the rows of white headstones rest men who went out boldly and died bravely for their country - heroes all, from Civil War to Vietnam. There is no gloom at Arlington; sadness yes, but no gloom. The warriors rest at last in a quiet place of green trees, winding paths, shady lawns and gently sloping hillsides. Arlington is a peaceful place to visit. It is solemn but not somber. Its graves tell the story of our nation.

Today, 275 individuals who performed actions above and beyond the call of duty, rest in peace along the Potomac.

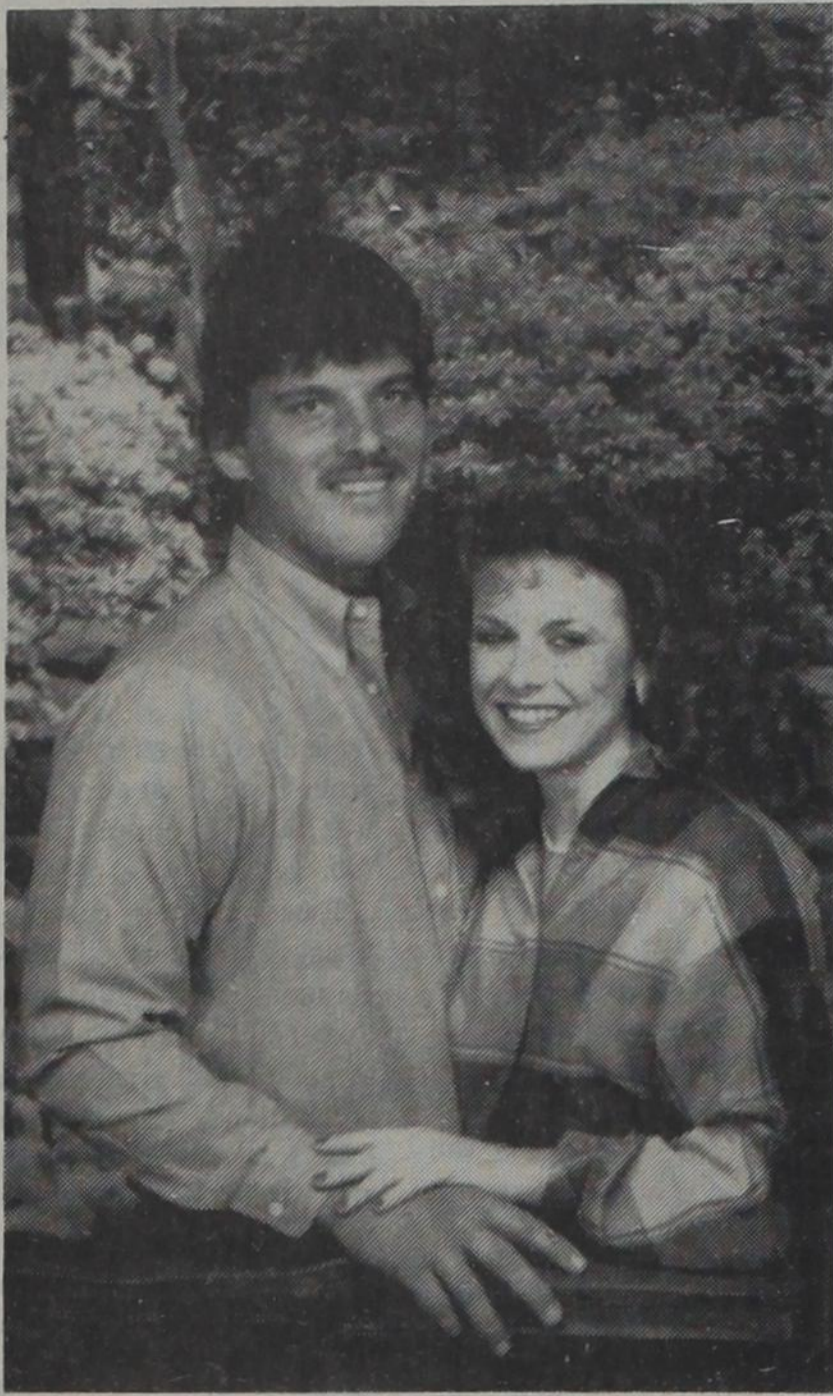

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**Sales Tax Rebate Jesus Talk Meeting Plunges Held Friday**

Sales tax rebate to the City of Cross Plains for May and received here first of the week totaled \$6,144.97, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

That lacked just a few cents being \$1,300 less that the payment received last year for a comparable period when the city's share of the one per cent local sales tax was \$7,444.73. Funds returned to the city thus far this year have amounted to \$24,580.87, as compared to \$26,672.44 in 1984, about 7.84 per cent less.

Bullock pointed out that May checks represent taxes collected on sales made in March and the first quarter and reported to the Comptroller by April 20.

Baird got \$4,331.54 and total of \$14,084.72 in May and this year, as compared to \$5,956.80 and \$15,908.69, respectively. Total rebate is there down 11.47 per cent.

Clyde, leading the county in taxable sales, received \$11,090.60, up from \$10,376.48 in 1984, and an aggregate of \$36,922.34, a growth of over \$6,000 from \$30,882.66, or an increase of 19.56 per cent.

Putnam grew from \$824.84 to \$1,080.20 and \$4,758.54 to \$5,503.01, and increase of 15.64 per cent.

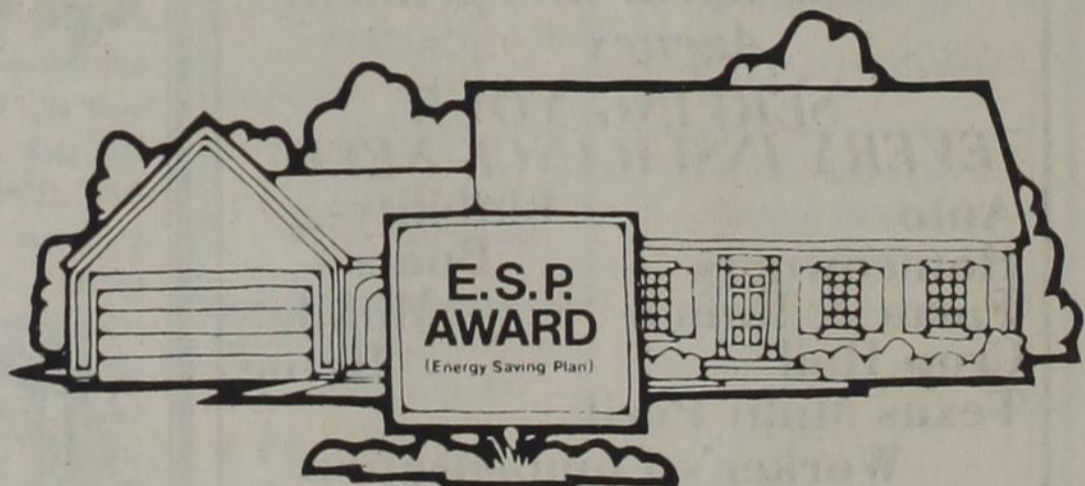
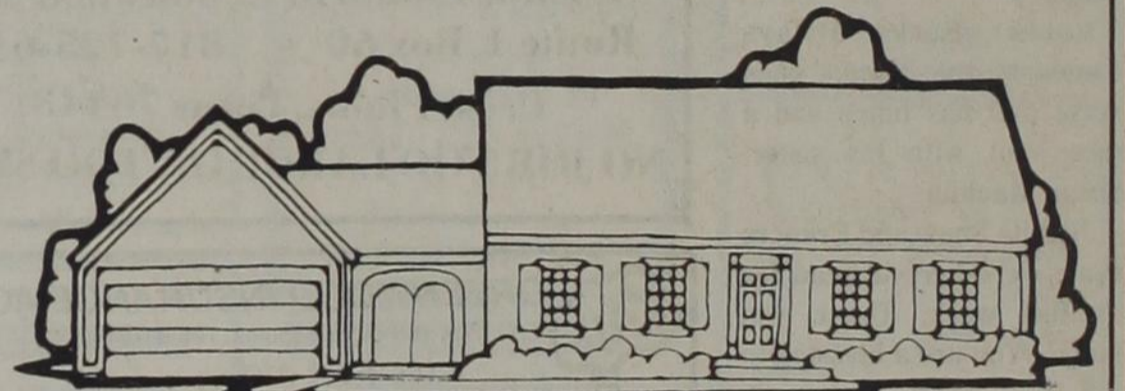
