Filing Deadline

The State Democratic Party has set back the filing deadline in the land commissioner's race becarse of the recent death of Jerry

Sadler, who served as land commissioner in the 1960's, was seeking re-election to that post prior to his death from natuural causes Feb. 25.

The 74-year-old Sadler was a long time veteran in Texas politics and had held a number of posts in state government.

In 1976, he was able to get into the runoff for railroad commissioner even though he got into the race late and spent very little money in his campaign.

The deadline in the race has been set back until March 12. The deadline for the GOP side will not be extended.

Sadler was opposing Midland Sen. Pete Snelson, Rockdale Rep. Dan Kubiak and former Democratic Party executive director Garry Mauro for the Democratic nomination.

Sadler's opponents described him as one of the most "distinctive and colorful" politicians Texas has known, and incumbent Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, who is running for governor, called Sadler a dedicated Texan who had served his state
