

Local Stage Band Wins Second At CJC Festival

Stage Band at Cross Plains High School broke out of a 10 to 12-year dormancy and claimed second place in the Cisco Junior College Stage Band Festival last Friday.

According to the best information immediately available Cross Plains Schools has not had a stage band in competition in 10 to 12 years. The local aggregation won second in Class A competition at Cisco, according to Miss Charlotte Taylor, director of bands.

In addition to capturing second place, six of the 18 musicians in the Cross Plains stage band were selected to membership in the Class A All-Star Stage Band. Miss Taylor reported these as Vance Wilson and Terri Pringle on trumpet, Jimmy Davis and John Hanke on saxophone and Tony Apple and Randy Rucker on trombone.

"I am proud of the entire stage band," Miss Taylor stated this week, "and take extra pride in those singled out for individual honors."

It was also reported by the band director that the full Cross Plains High School Buffalo Band will be in Cisco at the junior college this coming Friday for concert and night reading contests. "This is a 'warm-up' for the upcoming University Interscholastic League contests to be held later this spring," Miss Taylor stated.

3-Day Spring Break Carded Next Week

Cross Plains Schools will observe a three-day Spring Break next week, Wednesday through Friday, March 10, 11 and 12, according to word from M. Lee Thompson, superintendent of schools.

It was also pointed out that classes at school will be dismissed early on Tuesday, March 9, prior to Spring Break, and parents and guardians are cautioned to make arrangements for the early dismissal. Buses will run at 2:45 p.m. that day.

Classes will resume after the break at 3:20 a.m. Monday, March 15.

Filing Deadline Is Today In City, School Elections

Aspirants for positions on the Cross Plains Schools Board of Trustees or the Cross Plains City Council are advised that the deadline for filing for any of the five posts is midnight today, Wednesday, March 3.

It was published last week that the filing deadline was March 4, but Texas Secretary of State informs that the deadline is Wednesday, March 3, 30 days before

the actual voting. That deadline is for names to be printed on the ballot which will be marked Saturday, April 3.

Only one other candidate had filed during the past week in either of the two elections. He is Ted McKeehan, local businessman who is asking a spot on the Cross Plains City Council. His announcement fills the ticket, but there is no opposition.

Incumbent Ray Purvis had filed for re-election as alderman earlier, and W. G. (Wimpy) McCoy has issued a statement that he would not run again. Mayor O. B. Edmondson also filed for re-election. All city office terms are for two years.

There were no new candidates in the school trustee balloting. Incumbents Joe Hanke, Jr. and Charles H. Payne have filed for re-election to the two terms expiring. Dr. Scot H. Edgington, former local superintendent, filed to make a three-man race for two places two weeks ago. Trustees are elected for three-year terms.

Local Nurse Is Named On Accreditation Panel

Donna Jean Burleson of Cross Plains, director of the Cisco Junior College Vocational Nursing Program in Abilene, has been selected as a member of the National League of Nursing Accreditation Site Committee for Practical Nursing.

As a member of the accreditation team, Burleson, a registered nurse, will be visiting the campuses of colleges which have licensed vocational nursing programs for evaluation purposes.

"I was pleased to be selected," Burleson said recently in Abilene. "I had sent off the application last summer and had almost forgotten about it when the letter came. It takes a while to hear. I was very pleased when the letter came."

Burleson, who is married and has three children, came to CJC in 1972 and, in fact, was instrumental in helping start the CJC LVN program in Abilene. (The local lady and her husband, John, and two sons, Bill and Matthew, make their home east of town. The couple's daughter, Ruth, and her husband, Ronnie Hutchins, live at Eldorado.)

The National League of Nursing (NLN) program calls for accreditation of schools which have nursing programs. Burleson will join a

team of individuals which will visit schools with new programs or schools which are seeking renewal of their accreditation.

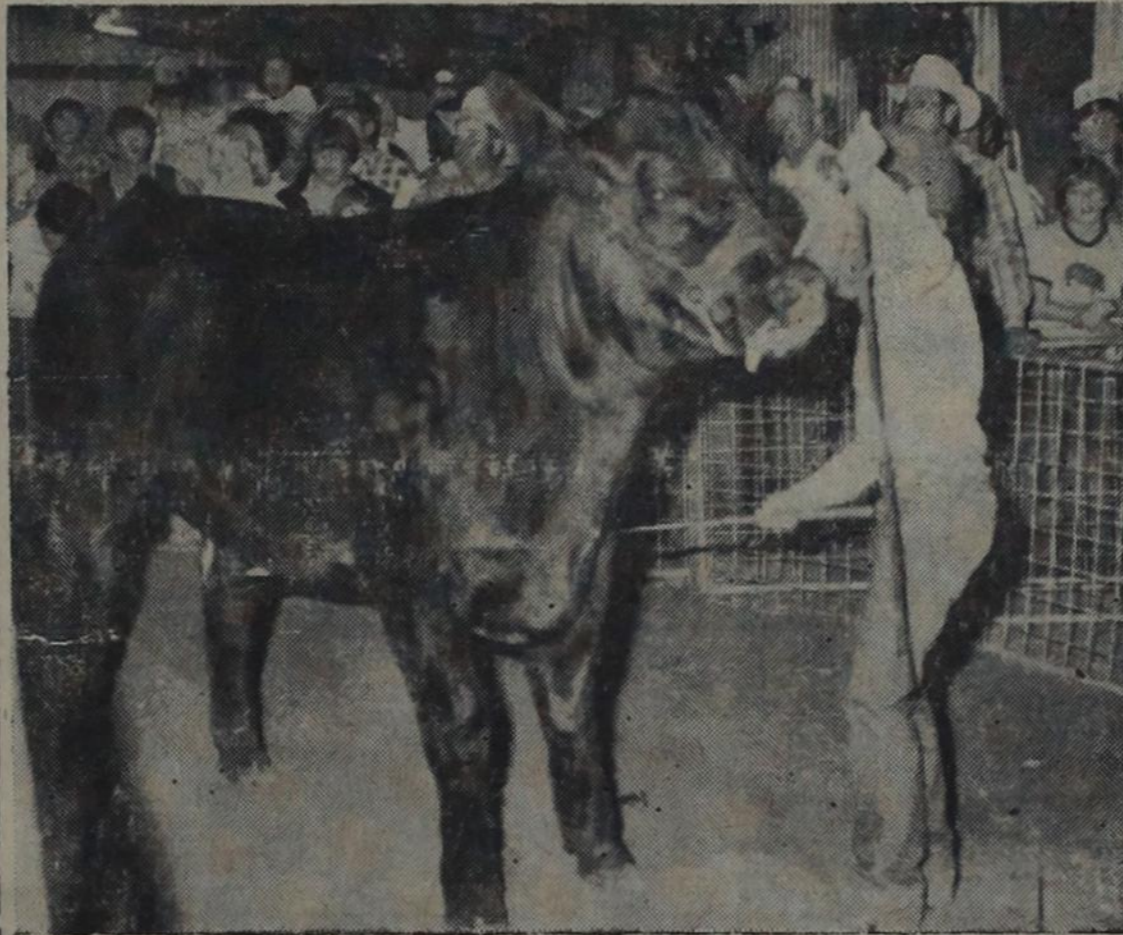
NLN accreditation is granted to all levels of LVN programs, vocational, diploma, associate degree, bachelor's and master's degrees. "Part of the process," Burleson says, "is to have the people on the site team go to site and validate what has been submitted in self-studies — all aspects of their programs, then to write a recommendation to the board."

The site visitors go in pairs for the accreditation or renewal. The time period varies from school to school.

CJC, which has an eight-year span for its accreditation, was the second school in the state to be granted accreditation. The program graduates between 45 and 50 students a year and there are six faculty members. Students from Baird, Clyde, Merkel, Abilene and the surrounding area attend classes.

Burleson began her nursing career with a graduate diploma degree in nursing in Iowa and she has a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree from Angelo State University.

She served as director of public health nursing in Jacksboro before coming to CJC in 1972.

ASCS Explains '82 Peanut Support Levels And Sales

Editor's Note: The following article concerning support prices and sales policies for the 1982 crop peanuts was contributed by Melanie Covington, executive director for the Callahan County ASCS office in Baird. It was released last week.

Peanut farmers will receive national average support levels of \$550 per short ton for 1982 crop quota peanuts and \$200 per short ton for 1982 crop additional peanuts, according to Everett Rank, executive vice president of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation.

Rank also said CCC's export sales policy for 1982 provides that additional peanuts placed under government loan will be sold by both O-328qSrEATOIETAOIN CCC for export edible use at no less than \$475 per ton.

Current legislation requires the U.S.D.A. to make price supports available on 1982 crop quota peanuts through loans, purchases, or other operations, Rank said. The national average quota support rate is required to be set at the national average of production—including the cost of land—but not less than 27.5 cents per pound, farmers stock basis.

Rank said USDA calculated the 1982 cost of production using three methods, and because all three resulted in a figure less than the required minimum of 27.5

cents per pound (550 per ton), the support level for 1982 crop peanuts was set at the minimum.

Additional peanuts are: (1) those marketed from a farm for which a farm poundage quota has been established and which are in excess of the poundage quota, and (2) those marketed from a farm for which no farm poundage quota has been established.

In determining price support level for additional peanuts, USDA takes into consideration demand for peanut oil and meal, expected prices of other vegetable oils and protein meals and demand for peanuts in foreign markets.

Rank said the law also requires the support rate to be established at a level estimated to ensure no loss to CCC from the sale or disposal of additional peanuts placed under government loan.

He said the \$200-per-ton support level for additional peanuts is projected to meet both the above criteria.

Cross Plains boys triumphed 20-11 over Gordon on Thursday, and in the second round Friday thumped Carbon 35-2. Albany shaded the local quintet 14-10 in

the finals on Saturday.

Scoring for local girls against Gordon were Paige Clawson, Michelle Melder, Bethany Meador and Sadarine Aiken 2 points each and Shelly Key 1. Counting in the Carbon contest were Miss Key 5, Miss Clawson 4 and Sheila Sibley 2. Scoring in the final game were Miss Sibley 3, Stephanie Taylor, Miss Clawson and Miss Key 2 points each.

Gardener Gives Tips On Strawberry Production

Editor's Note: The following article is a timely note on gardening from the Cross Plains Garden Club and is intended as an educational note for the public. It follows.

For the most and biggest strawberries — replace plants yearly.

Taking a hint from commercial producers, home strawberry growers may soon be changing their ways. It will be a radical departure. It will mean handling strawberries as if they were annuals, and replanting each year.

Instead of reworking the patch each year to renew it, they will destroy the entire planting as soon as it has yielded a good crop, and will start over for the next year with fresh plants, perhaps in a fresh location.

Several factors have influenced evolution of these methods. In the first place, it has been found that a strawberry plant, either ever-bearing or spring-bearing type,

will produce its most abundant and largest fruits for only one producing season. In the second place, it has been found that the yield of a young plant is much higher if runners are kept removed. The plant cannot produce lots of fruit and runners effectively at the same time.

Finally, disease is a big factor. Plants that stay in the ground more than a year become worn and have picked up diseases, and even though they might produce berries for another two or three years, it is not economical to keep them.

If you want the luxury of tasting the sweetest strawberries, you must grow them yourself and let them ripen on the vine. The riper and sweeter the berries are, the softer and less able to withstand the long journey to market. For sweetness, no commercial strawberry can surpass those that ripen in the sunshine of your own backyard.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — David L. Young, the Richardson appliance salesman who quit his job this year to seek the Democratic nomination for governor, may not be the best known candidate in the race, but he may well be the most unique.

Most political observers aren't taking Young's candidacy too seriously since he says he won't spend more than \$10,000 to make the race (the other candidates are expected to spend millions), but Young apparently does and he has proposed a "new era of equality" for Texas.

Young, who claims to have been a theologian, writer and

teacher during his career, says he wants to see a "unified approach to Texas government based on equality of representation, equality of taxation and equality of opportunity."

Young, 38, says the rich are under-taxed and over represented, while poor and middle class Texans are over-taxed and under-represented.

The former Montgomery Ward employee and Austin native says Texas has an "elitist" government full of tycoons and lawyers that cater to large corporations while those with the least income bear the heaviest tax burden.

"I will work to reverse the reprehensible regressivity in Texas taxes," Young says.

White Criticism

While Young was pledging to fight elitism, one of the major contenders for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination was being blasted for his civil rights record.

Ruben Sandoval of San Antonio, national civil rights director for the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), says Attorney General Mark White's record on civil rights issues is so poor that Hispanics should "go out to lunch" or vote for Republican Gov. Bill Clements in November if White gets the Democratic nomination.

Sandoval charged that White "has the sentiments of a Klansman" and has opposed such issues as extension of the U. S. Voting Rights Act, expansion of bi-lingual education and free education to children of illegal aliens.

White denied that he opposes bilingual education and the Voting Rights Act, and said he favors free schooling for the children of undocumented workers as long as the federal government picks up the tab.

At least one Hispanic leader, former LULAC president Ruben Bonilla of Corpus Christi, already has endorsed Railroad Commissioner Buddy Temple of Diboll for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Filing Deadline

The State Democratic Party has set back the filing deadline in the land commissioner's race because of the recent death of Jerry Sadler.

Sadler, who served as land commissioner in the 1960's, was seeking re-election to that post prior to his death from natural causes Feb. 25.

The 74-year-old Sadler was a long time veteran in Texas politics and had held a number of posts in state government.

In 1976, he was able to get into the runoff for railroad commissioner even though he got into the race late and spent very little money in his campaign.

The deadline in the race has been set back until March 12. The deadline for the GOP side will not be extended.

Sadler was opposing Midland Sen. Pete Snelson, Rockdale Rep. Dan Kubiak and former Democratic Party executive director Garry Mauro for the Democratic nomination.

Sadler's opponents described him as one of the most "distinctive and colorful" politicians Texas has known, and incumbent Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, who is running for governor, called Sadler a dedicated Texan who had served his state well.

Gasohol Standstill

Farmers, energy officials and others who staunchly supported the exemption of gasohol from the five-cent state gasoline tax were counting on the fuel not only as an alternate energy source but as a potential major market for agricultural products.

However, lower gasoline prices and high interest rates have apparently cooled interest in alcohol fuel.

Officials of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council say the low gasoline prices have negated incentives to get into the marketing of gasohol, while high interest rates have held up financing for construction of the plants needed to produce the ethanol that is mixed with unleaded gasoline.

Rep. Dan Kubiak, who sponsored the gasohol tax exemption, said the exemption should have been approved two years ago when money was available and long lines at service stations made the public more aware of

SS Student Benefits Being Phased Out

As a result of legislation enacted in mid-1981, Social Security student benefits will be phased out for those attending post-secondary schools.

When student benefits were first provided in 1965, the rationale was that young people, 18 to 22 years of age, who were full-time students were as much dependent on their parents for their support as were children under 18 years of age or disabled. It was assumed that students lost a source of support when a parent retired, became disabled, or died. However, the benefits were not related to any educational expenses incurred, to school performance, or to financial need.

The situation today is markedly different from what it was 15 years ago. Since that time, a number of programs have been established to provide assistance to college students based on their own and their families' financial condition. Among the federally funded educational programs now available are the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, National Direct Student Loan Program, and Guaranteed Student Loan Program.

The change in the law will affect about 600,000 post-secondary school student beneficiaries, 65 per cent in four-year colleges and 23 per cent in two-year colleges. The remainder attend technical, graduate, and business or secretarial schools.

The new law refines an educational institution as an elementary or secondary school. Benefits will not be paid to students who begin attending a post-secondary school after April 1982.

Benefits to students who were entitled as of August 1981 and were attending a post-secondary school before May 1982 will be phased out in order to minimize the financial impact on those whose plans for pursuing their education were based on receipt of Social Security benefits.

of electing board members. In the 1976 biennial election, three board members were elected for six-year terms. Those whose terms expire April 30, 1982 are: J. O. Jackson, Jr. — District No. 2; Bill Huff — District No. 3, and Billie Wayne Heiser — District No. 4 (B. W. Heiser resigned July, 1980 and J. M. Lindsey, III, was appointed to fill the unexpired term.)

District No. 2 includes the northwestern counties of the State. The southernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Loving, Wheeler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wise, Denton, Grayson, Fannin and Lamar. All peanut producers north of this line are in District No. 2.

District No. 3 — The westernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Red River, Delta, Hunt, Collie, Dallas, Tarrant, Hood, Erath, Bosque, McLennan, Bell, Milam, Lee, Bastrop, Fayette, Colorado, Wharton, and Matagorda. Producers east of this line are in District No. 3.

District No. 4 — The northernmost counties of this district includes the following counties: Maverick, Zavalla, Medina, Bexar, Guadalupe, Gonzales, Lavaca and Jackson. Producers south of this line are in District No. 4.

Referendum State At Large — The Texas Peanut Producers Board proposes to increase the current assessment rate from \$1 to \$2 per ton to be collected at the point of first sale to finance programs of advertising, promotion, market and product development, education and research designed to increase the profitability of peanut production. All peanut producers within the state are included in the referendum.

The referendum and election of board members must be completed and tabulated by May 6, 1982. All producers of peanuts within the area defined, including owners of farms on which peanuts are produced, are eligible to vote in the election if such producer would be required under H. B. 525 to pay the assessment.

Any producer of peanuts who is qualified to vote in the election and desires to be a candidate for membership on the Texas Producers Board shall file with the principal office, P. O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454, an application to have his name placed on the ballot. The application must be signed by the candidate and by at least ten peanut producers who are qualified to vote in the election and must be filed at least thirty (30) days prior to the election (April 6).

No candidate, unless so nominated, shall have his name placed on the official ballot. However, this does not prevent the writing of the name of any candidate on the ballot by any qualified voter at the election. Spaces shall be provided on the ballot for such write-in candidates.

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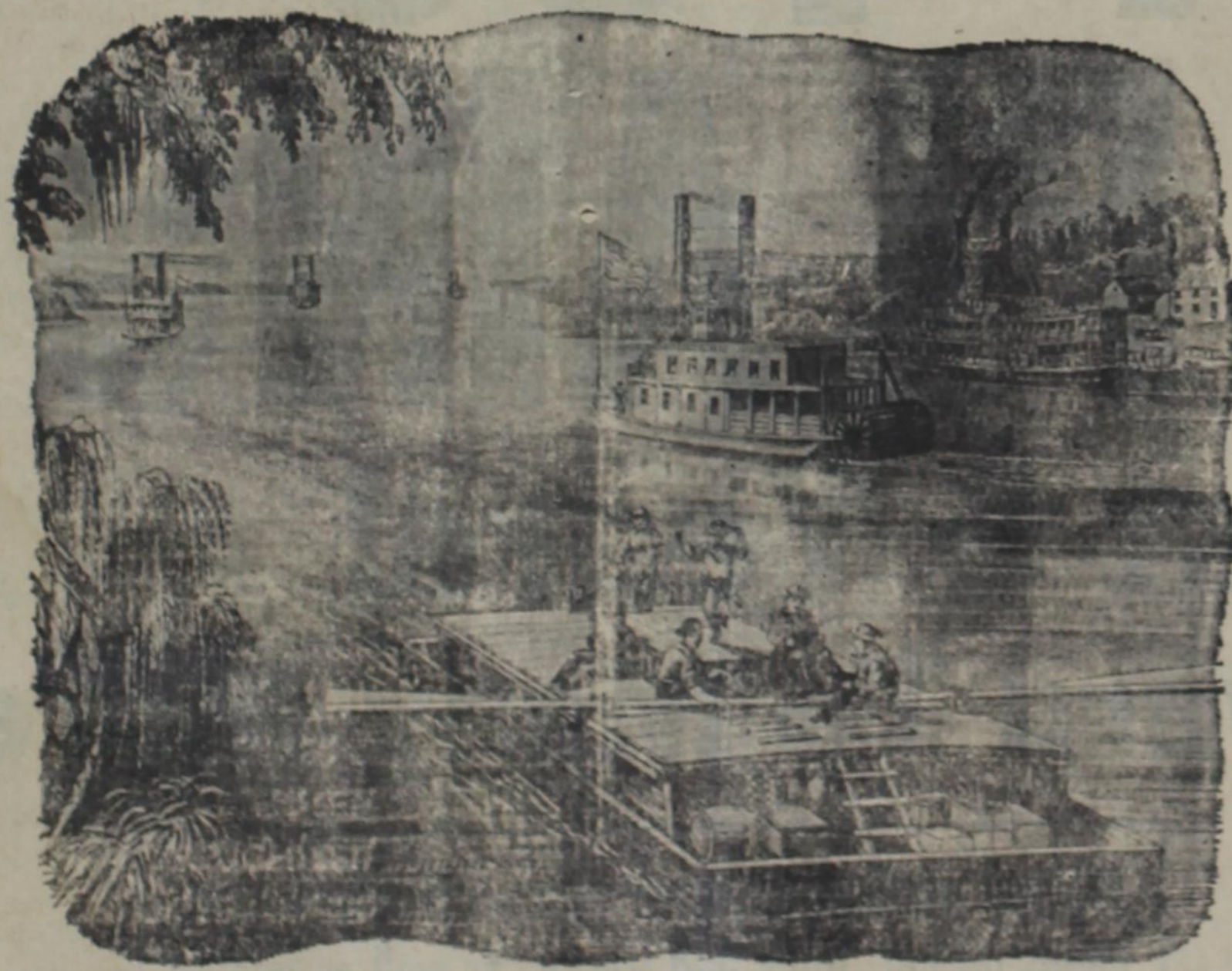

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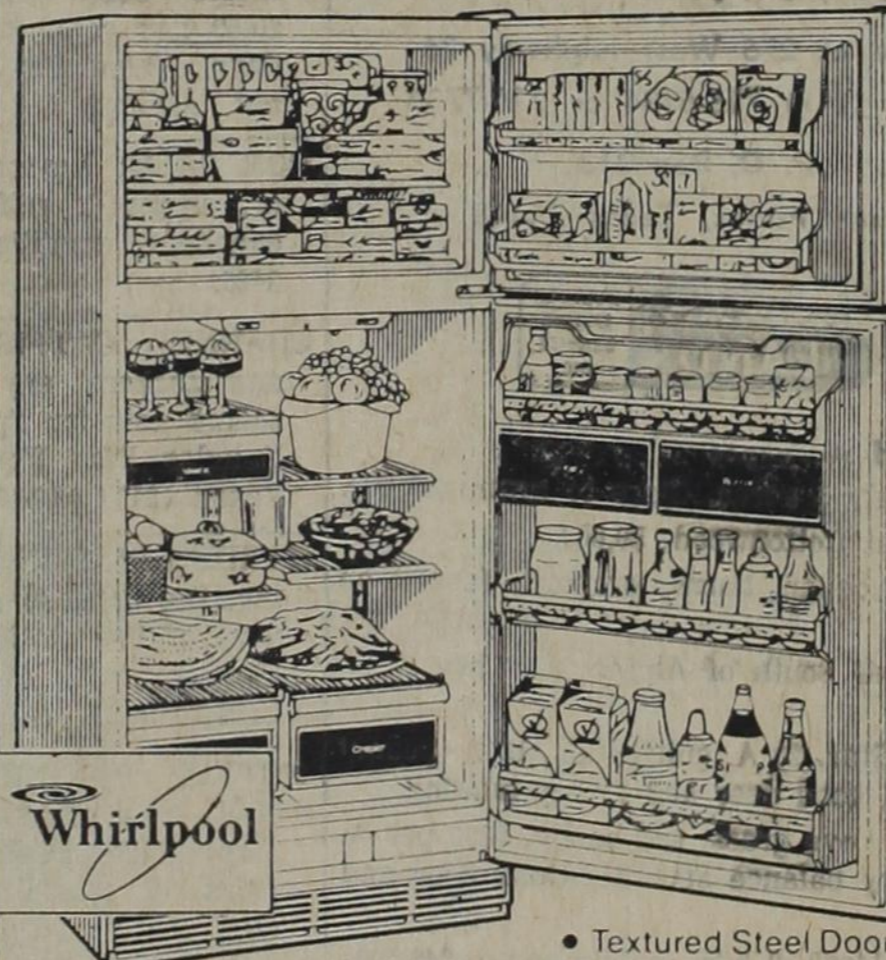

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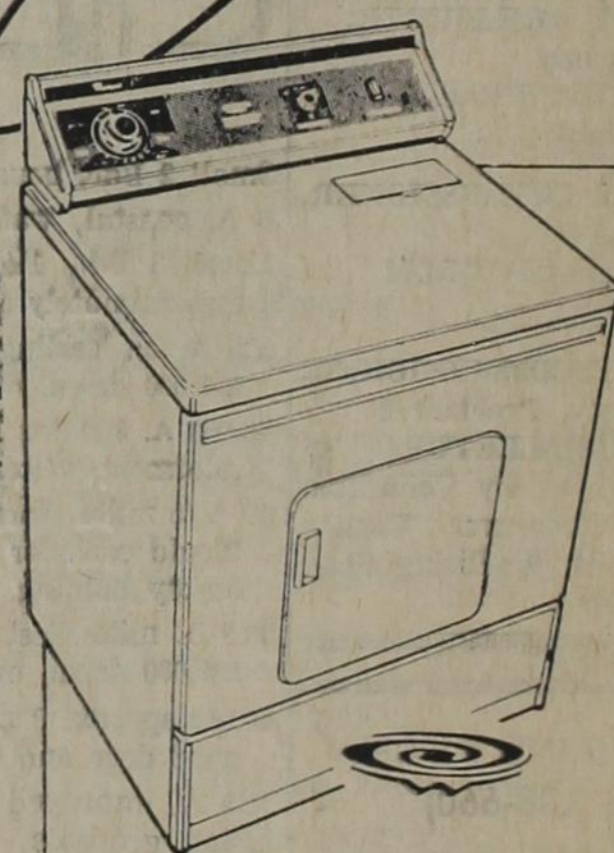
