

## Bufs Test Huckaby In Bi-District Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will take on Huckaby, District 30 runner-up, in a bi-district confrontation at Comanche Friday starting at 7:30 p.m.

Buffaloes won the right to go into the state playoffs by capturing the District 29-A crown with a perfect 10-0 record. The Herd has not been beaten since two early-season losses while logging 26 victories. Two of those came against two other teams headed to state playoffs. Cross Plains nipped Gustine 53-47 in triple overtime in Buffalo Gym last Thursday, and Monday night the Buffaloes bruised Throckmorton 68-46 in another warm-up game.

Victory number 25 was a hard-fought triple overtime affair. Visiting Gustine owned a 12-8 edge after first quarter, but by intermission the Herd had gained a 20-16 advantage. Gustine reduced that margin to 32-39 after three periods, and knotted the score at 40-40 at the end of regulation play. First overtime ended in a 42-42 standoff, and the second three minutes just moved the score to 45-45. In the third

overtime Herdsmen counted 8 points to just two for the visitors and the 53-47 final.

Tony Evans was the Bufs' leading scorer with 18 points on seven field goals and four free shots. John Hanke bucketed 15 points, and John Fred McWilliams netted 14. Other Bisons counting were Lance Clawson 4 and Troy Harris 2.

In Abilene on the Cooper High School Hardwood, Cross Plains had a somewhat easier time with Throckmorton, registering the 38-46 victory.

Little doubt of the outcome was established in the first quarter, when the Herd gained a 17-11 lead, and that was stretched to 11 points, 34-23, in the second stanza. After three quarters the Buffaloes owned a 46-31 advantage and bolted to a 68-46 final score in the last eight minutes.

McWilliams was the Herd's top scorer with 22 points on nine field goals and four foul shots. Evans and Hanke shared runner-up spot, hitting 20 points each. Also tallying were Paul Davis and Clay Richardson 2 points each and Harris and Clawson 1 each.

### Higher Rabies Threat Expected For 1985

Region 4 of The Texas Department of Health recently published an article concerning diseases that are transmittable from animals to humans. "Rabies was the topic of major concern in the article.

According to the update, the laboratory confirmed rabies cases in Region 4 totaled 119 during 1984, which was a 26 per cent decrease from the 1983 total. The 1984 statewide total of 719 cases was only five cases less than the 1983 total. Although the four Callahan County total, four, was the same in 1981, as in 1983, much of this can be attributed to the drought conditions and decreased wildlife population of last summer, says Lyn Walker of Callahan Co. Veterinary Clinic of Clyde.

Due to the increase of the human population of Callahan County and the encroachment of this population on the wildlife habitat and the relief of the drought condition we will expect to see increased numbers of rabid animals in 1985, the spokesman continued.

If public awareness and vaccination schedules are kept current, we will help keep our confirmed cases of rabies to a minimum.

Cross Plains Buffettes suffered only their third loss of the season last Friday, but it was to bi-district foe Lipan in state playoffs at Ranger Junior College.

Buffettes watched a three-point advantage melt away into a four-point deficit as the Lipan girls tallied 20 points, half that at the charity line, and 44-40 loss. The defeat lowered the Buffettes season record to 25-3, the best mark posted by a local feminine unit in many years.

Lipan gained a 10-9 advantage in the first canto, but Cross Plains girls knotted the score at 16-16 at intermission. Buffettes had gained a slim 27-24 edge after three quarters, but accurate foul shooting by Lipan, district 30-A runner-up, eclipsed the Buffettes 44-40, eliminating them from the state playoffs.

Dawn Strength was the top local scorer with 16 points on seven field goals and two free tosses. Alesia Thompson tallied 8, Michelle Prater 7, Sheila Payne 5 and Paige Clawson 4.

A 40-point total was sufficient to get the Buffettes into the state playoffs as the District 29-A champions as Cross Plains beat May 40-35 in a playoff game to determine league winners and runner-up. During the regular season Buffettes lost to May in first round, then rebounded for a victory in the second half of the conference race.

Buffettes owned small leads at the end of each quarter in the

## Local Garden Club Gives Sweet Corn Growing Tips

By Mrs. Raymond McCowen Sweetcorn is a common item in most American gardens. Since the days of the Pilgrims "corn on the cob" has been a popular American food. The first reference to sweet corn dates from 1779. An eight row red cob type was introduced that year near Plymouth, Massachusetts, as reported in Thomas Jefferson's garden book of 1810.

In 1828, sugar corn seed was listed in New England seed catalogues. Corn was also grown by the American Indians of the upper Missouri by 1833. Today there are well over 200 varieties and hybrids available to sweet corn growers.

Corn is a member of the grass family, which includes either crops such as wheat, oats, barley, sorghum and rice. Corn is divided into six types. These are dent corn, sweet corn, flint corn, flour corn and pod corn. Sweet corn is

a warm weather crop. It is best grown in a deep, loamy rich soil and should be planted in hills approximately 18" apart. Commercial fertilizers are recommended for just about all types of soil. Sweet corn needs lots of water. After your corn comes up, leave at least four plants in each hill.

When the corn gets approximately waist high, you should break all the suckers off. That will allow your corn ears to grow larger. Water your corn at least once a week. Remember, it takes lots of water for corn. Do not sprinkle water in the rows but let the water soak out to the plants. When the tassels begin to show, dust well with garden dust once a week while the tassels and silks are young to prevent worms. If you see the worms, you have waited too long.

Keep your corn watered and dusted all along and sit back and watch your delicious sweet corn grow. Delicious on-the-cob or cream style — it's delicious.



Each session the Senate chooses a member to serve as Senate President Pro Tempore. That member is third in line to govern the state, following the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. The President Pro Tempore traditionally serves one day as Governor while the Governor and Lieutenant Governor leave the state. Farabee was elected to the Pro Tempore position January 8, 1985, at the beginning of the 69th Legislative session.

"More specific plans will be announced in about a month. In the meantime, I hope that everyone in the 30th District will keep May 4th open on their calendar's," Farabee concluded.

Dear Editor,

May I offer my note to you expressing my position as American Association of Retired Persons chapter leader, to preserve the Homestead Act and as being in opposition to HB 30? Our Homestead Act, see Article XVI, Section 50, Constitution of the State of Texas, has endured 145 years. However, it is now being challenged by HB 30, sponsored by Bill Hammond, D-Dallas, and referred to the Committee on Financial Institutions of which Bruce Gibson, D-Cleburne, is chairman. Bill Hammond is vice-chairman.

Preserving the Homestead Act is a priority which requires the united action on Texans who realize the importance of owning their homes unencumbered by debts as proposed by H.B. 30.

Letters could be written to one's representative in the House — Honorable — House of Representatives, P. O. Box 2910, Austin, Texas 78769 or to Representative Bruce Gibson, Chairman of the Committee on Financial Institutions, same address, the Governor, or to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The first Farm-to-Market Road was added to Texas' growing highway system in 1936 and was built between Mount Enterprise and SElloh in Rusk County.

LEG CRAMPS

"A simple stretching exercise has worked 100% in curing habitual leg cramps and preventing their recurrence," states Dr. Harry Daniell of Redding, Calif. 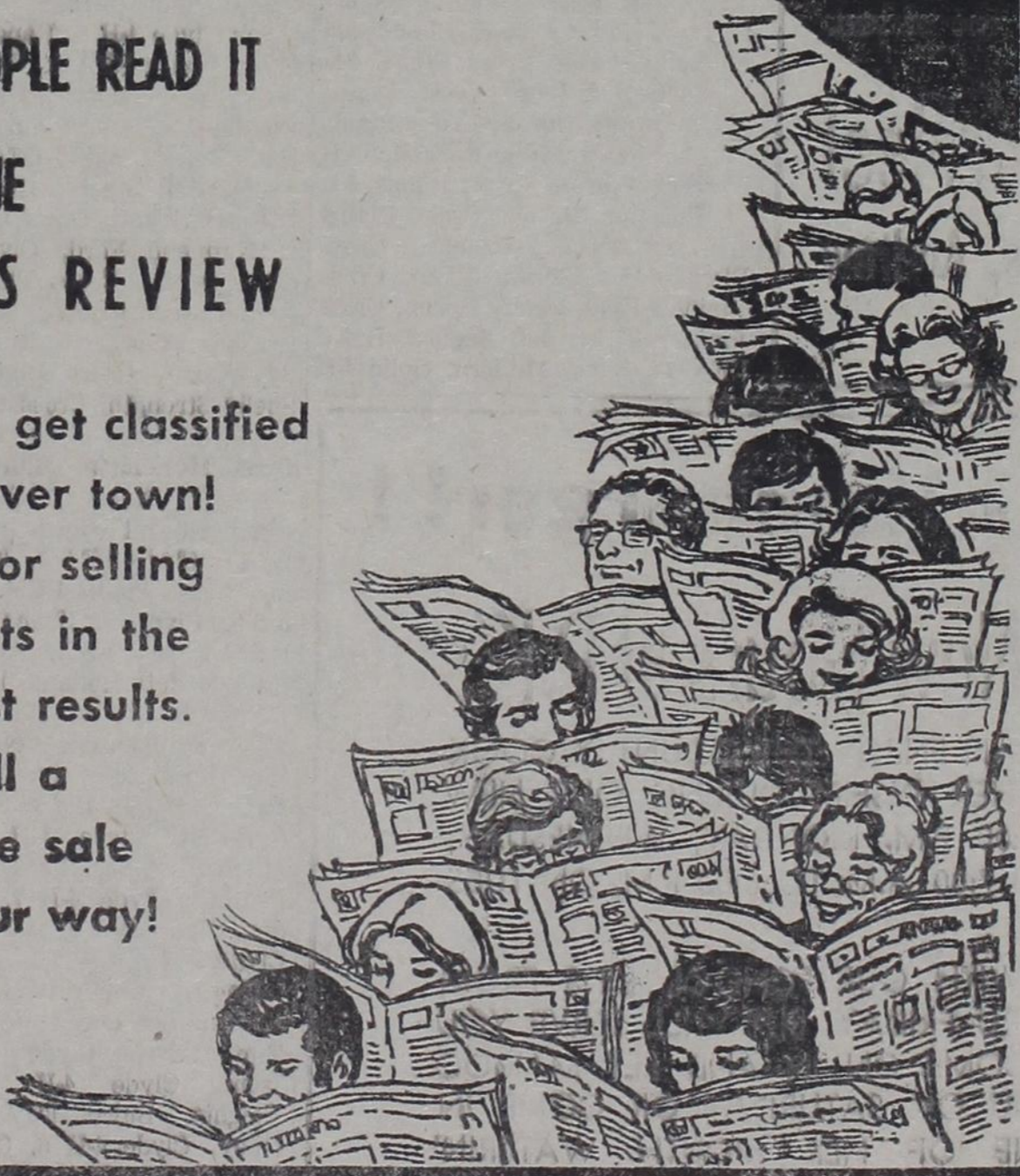

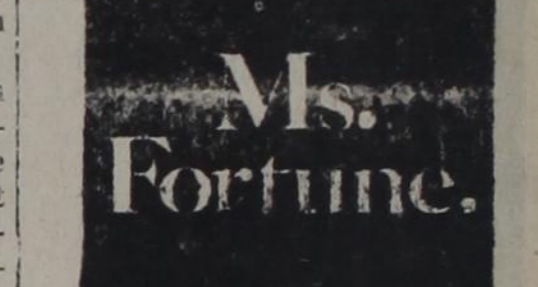
