United Fund Nears Goal On \$3,721.33 Collected

Cross Plains Area United Fund had collected \$3,721.33 in its quest for a goal of \$4,000.00 just after noon Tuesday, according to a report from Citizens State Bank officials who tabulated receipts.

The collected total is only \$278.67 short of the budgeted goal adopted by directors of the area charitable campaign. It was also pointed out that not all volunteer workers had reported in with donations. Collections were 93 per cent of the goal.

Mrs. Raymond (Veda) DeBusk who was the chairperson of the campaign expressed her delight with the initial results of the door-to-door canvass by about 50 volunteer workers last Friday. "People

of Cross Plains and the surrounding communities have always responded in times of need, and they have done so again," Mrs. DeBusk said.

Dale Bishop, president of the United Fund, said that he joined Mrs. DeBusk in thanking local residents for their generosity in giving, and for the workers who gave so freely of their time and energy in making the campaign.

Mrs. DeBusk explained that if there are persons who were missed in the canvass of the area and who wish to have a part in the drive, please call her, Mrs. Hub (Helen) Freeman or Mrs. Frank (Vera) Ferrell, and the gift will be picked up. tute \$700, American Red Cross \$200, Salvation Army \$200, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$200, Christmas Cheer \$300, local and transient relief \$600 and unallocated \$400.00.

Firemen Reveal \$1,155 In Gifts For New Truck

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department has received \$1,155 in 19 contributions toward updating the local unit with a modern high-pressure fire-fighting apparatus.

"We regret having to ask the public for help again," said Alvin Hutchins, secretary-treasurer of the fire department, "but the addition of the high-pressure unit will make the local fire fighting department more efficient, especially in combating rural pasture fires."

Alton E. Hornsby, Chief of the Cross Plains Fire Department and Tim Bishop, Chief of the Rural Division, described the apparatus as a 1976, 4-wheel drive pickup on which a 315-gallon fiberglass tank is to be mounted. Pump will be equipped with a 7 h.p. Briggs and Stratton engine.

It was noted that two large donations were received when the unit was first begun. Bishop Chevrolet Co. discounted the truck \$500 from its \$2,500 price, and Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Co. handled the pump for the 1976 truck at dealer's cost, \$1,800.

Hutchins and Hornsby stated that the department was still more than \$3,500 short of the \$5,000 needed to complete the unit, and are asking for help to get the truck operative as soon as possible.

Stop Farm Machinery Tax Asks 3rd Proposed Change

Editor's Note: Following is the third of a six-part series concerning proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution, giving arguments for and against its adoption at the general election November 2. This information was provided through the courtesy of State Representative Joe C. Hanna of Breckenridge, who represents Callahan County. The study was done by the Texas Legislative Council.

Amendment No. 3. "The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

Arguments for: 1. The proposed amendment promises partial relief for economically hard-pressed farmers and ranchers without serious adverse effect on local governments' tax bases.

2. Taxing agricultural equipment and machinery often is barely cost-effective because of the disproportionately high expense of locating the property and assessing and collecting the tax.

Against: 1. The voters have amended the constitution twice since 1979 to give tax relief to farmers and ranchers — expanding eligibility for favorable methods of valuing agricultural land and totally exempting from taxation livestock and poultry in the hands of the producer. Additional tax relief for farmers and ranchers is not needed.

2. It is trite but true: a tax exemption merely shifts part of the tax burden from the beneficiaries — farmers and ranchers in this case — to all other taxpayers. Owners of homes and businesses, among others, will have to pay for the proposed exemption through higher property taxes.

Some foliage plants look more attractive when displayed as a single specimen, but many not only look best but grow better in groups. The placement of a bright-colored foliage plant within any group of house plants can be beautiful. Also, a flowering plant will often add a welcome extra dimension to a group of foliage plants.

The hanging basket is probably the most useful and most popular container. Many different plants are suitable for hanging baskets. They can be beautifully displayed in any room in your home.

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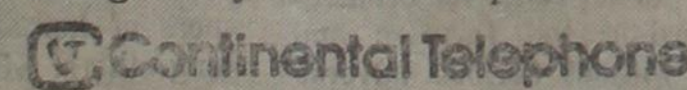
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Cross Cut Cemetery Gets 2 More Gifts

Hospital At Baird Gets Officials, Advisory Panel

The hospital at Baird, which is to change management firms Friday, has gained an administrator, director of nurses and four local advisory board members.

Russell Payne, former engineering supervisor for NL Treating Chemicals in Odessa will become administrator Friday. He was named by United Hospitals which assumes management of the Baird medical facility Friday.

The firm has named Betty Aldridge, nurse at the hospital for eight years, as director of nurses. James Reese, regional representative for United Hospitals, announced the appointments.

An advisory board composed of one member from each commissioner's precinct in the county, the hospital administrator and two members of the management firm's choice will supervise funds deposited in an escrow account.

Following are excerpts from a story about the hospital which appeared in Tuesday morning's Abilene Reporter-News written by Marilyn Hawk.

Reese said Rural Hospital Management, a subsidiary of Hendrick Medical Center, will begin moving its supplies and other items at noon Thursday as United Hospitals officials begin moving in. Reese, who also is administrator of United Hospital's Childress Memorial Hospital in Goldthwaite, said personnel from the Goldthwaite facility will help with the move.

To make bookkeeping easier, Reese said the Hendrick subsidiary will take its complete inventory of supplies while the management firm moves in its own stock.

The hospital also will be known as Callahan Memorial Hospital instead of Callahan General Hospital to keep accounts opened under KHM separate from those of United Hospitals.

Payne, who graduated from Texas Tech University with degrees in biology, chemistry and Latin, said he was hired because of his background in management. United Hospitals officials have stressed that operating small hospitals on small-business principles is the key to making financially troubled medical facilities viable.

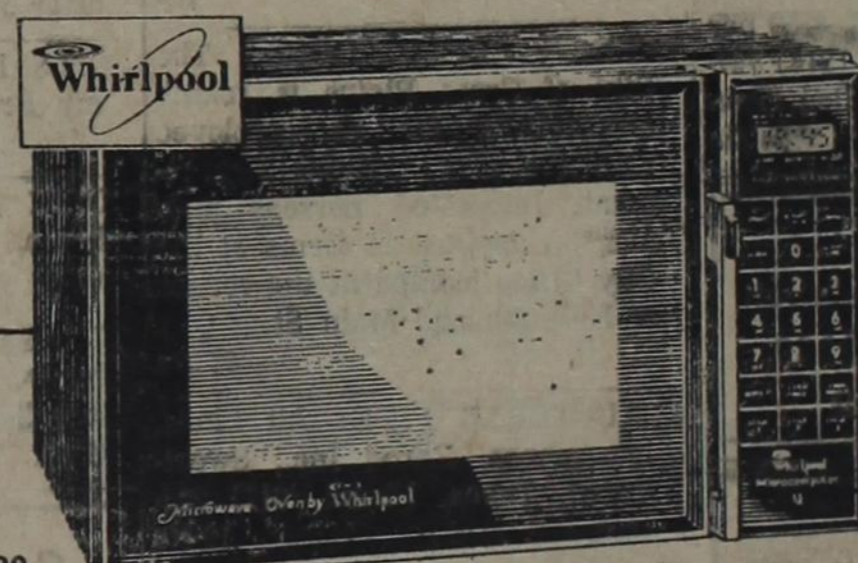

Plan Ahead For S.S. Retirement Check

People in the Abilene area who are planning to apply for Social Security retirement benefits soon can help speed the application process if they get some information together first, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

A person will need proof of his or her age. The best evidence is a public or church record of birth recorded before age 5. If this cannot be submitted, other evidence may be used. The best is often the oldest, Hammons said.

Other records that might be used include school, church, state or federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passports, employment, military service, children's birth certificate, union, immigration and naturalization. There are other records as well that may prove acceptable.

A person needs his or her Social Security card or a record of the number.

Also requested are W-2 forms for the past two years, or, if self-employed, copies of self-employment tax returns and proof of filing for the past two years.

If the worker's wife or husband is also going to apply, she or he will need the same documents. In addition, it would be a good idea to have the marriage certificate available because they are sometimes required. Birth certificates should be available for any eligible, unmarried children as well as their Social Security numbers. Other documents may be needed in some situations, but these will be enough in most cases, Hammons said. Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies are not acceptable.

Green Thumb Plan Revived By Bill

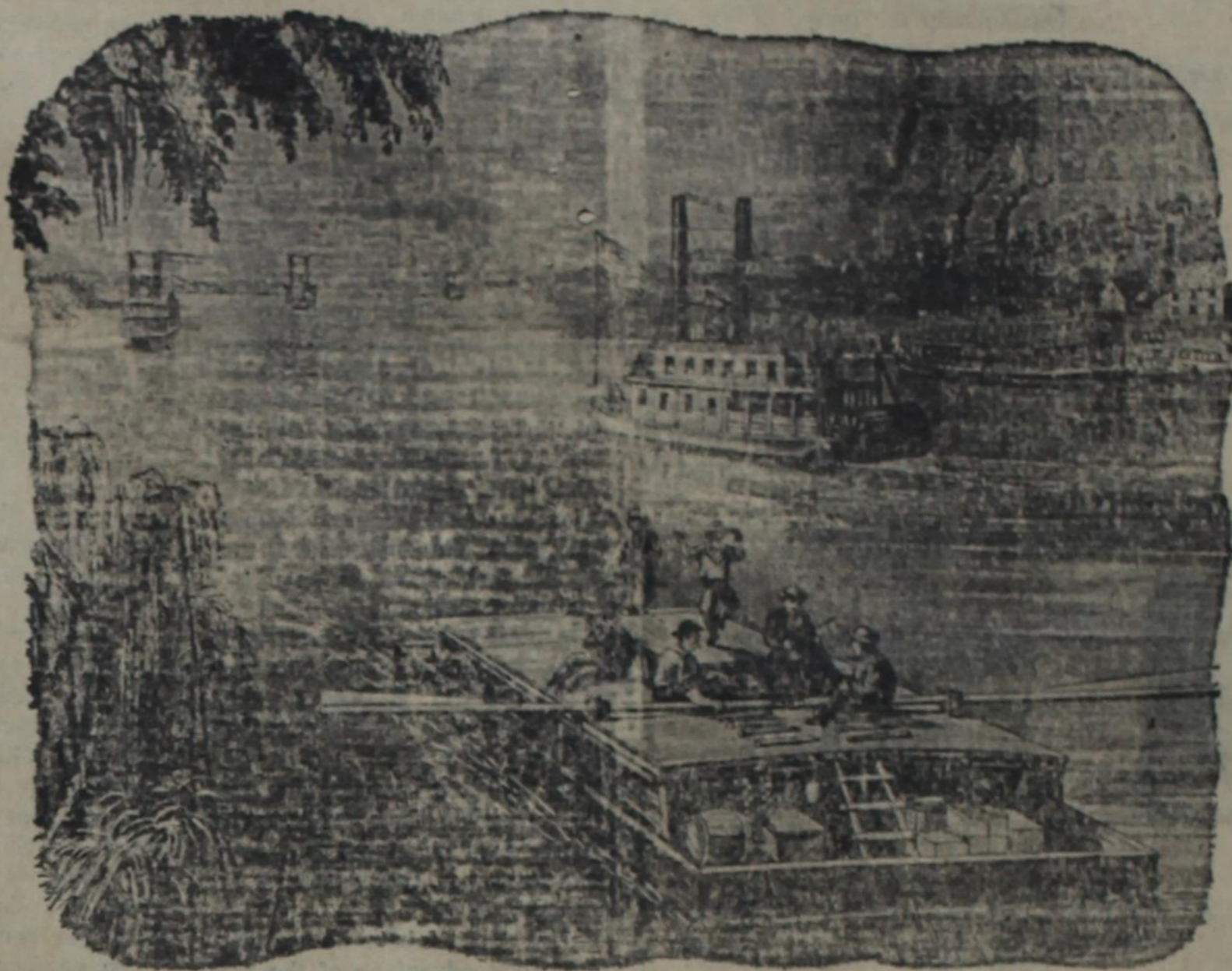

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Most political observers do not place much stock in "published" poll results, figuring the results have most likely been doctored a bit to help the image of one candidate or another.

But a poll quietly released last week by the Texas League of Women Voters has set off a significant buzz about the gubernatorial election.

The statewide poll showed Gov. Bill Clements trailing his Democratic challenger, Atty. Gen. Mark White, by about three percentage points.

The Clements campaign has been claiming a lead of between five and 13 percentage points, and it quickly disputed the League of Women Voters polls.

The women's group took the survey to see if there was sufficient support for two minor party candidates to participate in league sponsored debates.

The poll showed insufficient support for the Libertarian Party and Citizens Party candidates, leaving only Clements and White to square off before the television cameras.

Poll Specifics

The League's poll was firm. Shipley & Associates of Austin, which surveyed 325 voters statewide over last week end.

Registered voters indicated 41.6 per cent favored White, 38.4 per cent favored Clements, and 17.9 per cent answered undecided. The minor party candidates each drew less than one per cent support, well below the required 15 per cent support needed to get in on the debate action.

The first debate was held Sept. 24 in Amarillo, the second will be on Oct. 11 in Austin, while the third is set for Oct. 16 in Dallas.

With the race a virtual neck-and-neck struggle going down to the wire, a good bit of the still undecided vote may be swayed by the televised debates.

In the first debate in Amarillo, White took advantage of the wide coverage to discredit what he called a Republican smear tabloid put out by the Clements campaign.

Two False Steps

The tabloid, titled the Texas Spectator, called attention to a 1963 intoxication incident when White was a college student.

The publication, released by his staff with Clements permission, probably was an attempt to put White on "the wrong side" and Clements on "the right side" of what is the new fad issue for the coming Legislature: drunk driving reform.

If so, it may have been a false step for the Republicans, because the Democrats immediately jumped the tabloid for being what Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle called "the foulest piece of political propaganda I've seen," referring to other articles in the tabloid.

The tabloid probably hurt Clements instead, because the established press disapproved of the tactic, and no significant gain in support was evident. But it did stir up Democrats across the state who vowed to work harder to defeat Clements.

A second false step for the GOP was remedied somewhat when Republican Secretary of State David Dean recalled his so-called felons voter list. Dean, who had wanted to purge felons from the voting lists, mistakenly included the names of innocent people, including a Democratic candidate for the Legislature.

The recall was prompted by a lawsuit move on the part of the aggrieved candidate.

Dean also has been sued by Brownsville Rep. Rene Oliviera who contends the incident may wrongfully deprive some people of their right to vote.

Ballot Spot

Meanwhile, the Democrats have lost their battle to substitute the name of Victoria Rep. John Sharp on the ballot for the state Senate seat vacated by the death of La Grange Sen. John Wilson.

Wilson, who had been nominated for re-election, died a few hours after the deadline for making ballot changes.

The Texas Supreme Court refused to consider a suit filed by the Democratic Party to force Secretary of State Dean to allow them to nominate a replacement for Wilson.

The decision means Wilson's name will stay on the ballot, along with that of Republican nominee Dr. James Everett Ware.

USDA Announces Farm Program Payment Slate

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced a 10 per cent acreage reduction and a 10 per cent paid land diversion for the 1983 feed grain program. Block also announced an additional \$60 million allocated to the fiscal 1983 farm storage facility loan program beyond the \$40 million originally allocated.

Block said current law requires him to announce only a 10 per cent acreage reduction and 5 per cent paid land diversion program for feed grains. But, with such large supplies, he said an additional 5 per cent paid diversion would help bring supply more in balance with demand. We must do everything possible to reduce carryover supplies and increase commodity prices, Block said.

Block said the per bushel target prices for 1983-crop feed grains will be: corn, \$2.86; sorghum, \$2.72; barley, \$2.60; and oats, \$1.60. Regular Commodity Credit Corporation price support loan rates, per bushel, will be: corn, \$2.65; sorghum, \$2.52; barley, \$2.37; oats, \$1.36; and rye, \$2.25.

The sign-up for the 1983 feed grain program will be October 1 through March 31. Producers may request 50 per cent of their projected 1983 deficiency payments and 50 per cent of their 1983 diversion payments when they sign up.

USDA estimates per-bushel deficiency payment rates will be: corn, 21 cents; sorghum, 20 cents; and barley, 15 cents. Advance deficiency payments to all eligible farmers will be half these rates. Advance deficiency payments are not authorized for oats.

Land diversion payments have been established at \$1.50 per bushel for corn and sorghum, \$1 for barley and 75 cents for oats. The land diversion payment is based on the per bushel payment rate times the farm yield times the acres diverted.

Farmers who request advance diversion payments at the time they sign up for the 1983 program will receive a payment equal to half the established payment rates.

A producer who accepts an advance payment, but who later does not comply with program provisions, must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest. Interest charged will be the rate in effect for commodity loans on the date of the advance

payment, plus 5 percentage points. To be eligible for these benefits as well as for price support loans, a producer must agree to limit corn, sorghum, oats and barley acreage planted for harvest to not more than 80 per cent of the farm's feed grain base.

As under the 1982 program, two bases will be established: one for corn and sorghum, the other for barley and oats.

Producers also must devote to conservation uses an acreage equal to both the acreage reduction and land diversion requirements.

Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm, for which the cropping requirement is for only one of the previous two years. Mechanical harvesting is not authorized and grazing will not be permitted during the six principal growing months on the acreage taken from production, Block said.

The 1983 feed grain bases will remain the same as the 1982 feed grain bases with adjustment for crop rotation. Neither cross compliance nor offsetting compliance will apply to the 1983 feed grain program.

Block said USDA is delaying decisions on the 1983 feed grain reserve program until the domestic and world supply and demand situation is studied.

He said the additional \$60 million for the farm storage facility loan program is necessary because record corn, wheat and soybean crops have created widespread tightness in storage availability.

'83 Feed Grain Program Told; More For Storage

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced a payment schedule under which eligible farmers will receive deficiency payments on 1982 crops and advance deficiency and diversion payments on 1983 crops.

Block said as soon as possible after December 1, eligible wheat and barley producers will receive all their deficiency payments due under the 1982-crop programs, and eligible corn, upland cotton and grain sorghum farmers will receive 70 per cent of the 1982-crop deficiency payments due them.

The remainder of the 1982-crop deficiency payments will be paid in early February to cotton producers, while the final corn and grain sorghum payments will be made after April 1, Block said.

Producers of wheat and feed grains may request 50 per cent of the projected 1983 deficiency payments and 50 per cent of the 1983 diversion payments at the time

they sign up, Block said. Sign up will be held Oct. 1, 1982, through March 31, 1983.

The deficiency payment rate equals the difference between the target price and the higher of the national average loan rate or the five-month weighted average market price received by farmers.

Block said advance diversion payment for wheat will be \$1.35 per bushel times the farm yield times five per cent of the farm base.

The advance deficiency payment will be 32.5 cents per bushel times the farm yield times the acres intended to be planted.

Advance payments also will be offered to farmers when they sign up in the 1983 feed grain and cot-
