

Slow, Soaking Rains Fall As Cold Moves In

An old-fashioned "winter rain" fell throughout the Cross Plains area during the Thanksgiving holiday week end, giving most farmers and ranchers more to be thankful for.

Light rains and temperatures which hovered near freezing portions of Wednesday through Friday left thin coatings of ice on man-made objects, those of metal and vehicles primarily, and formed icicles on the north side of houses in places throughout Cross Plains.

Temperatures did not get low enough to hinder transportation except possibly on bridges, but did collect on windshields and car windows.

As is the norm seemingly now, totals of the amount of rainfall varied widely over a short distance. In Cross Plains three gauges read 2.40, 2.90 and 3.15 inches. The Review accepted the middle amount to post on the calendar and later figure year's total.

Mrs. N. V. Gibbs, Rowden, said amounts of rainfall ranged between 2.50 and 3.00 inches, and in Cottonwood reports were given from 2.50 to 3.60 inches. Burkett

reported 2.50 inches and over. The Roger Watson lease four miles north of Burkett got 2.50 inches.

Other reports in the area included Pete Fore at Pioneer 2.50 inches, G. T. Dawkins at Sabanno 3.00 inches and Roy Tatom at Atwell 3.00 inches.

Last week end's rainfall increased the year's total in Cross Plains to 23.01.

The rain delayed what was left of the poor peanut crop harvest, but added greatly to the outlook of small grain. Little runoff water was realized by stockmen because the rain fell so slowly and the ground was so dry.

Statistics Show Buffaloes Strong 5-5 Record Team

Statistics compiled by members of the Cross Plains Buffalo staff during the 1982 season reveal that the Herd was a strong 5-5 season record team.

Compiling the best mark since days of Sam McBrierty here when Buffs owned a 7-2-1 mark, the five victories all came in District 8-A play, and they shared fourth place with Blanket whom they beat.

Buffaloes scored 175 points, an average of 17.5 points per contest for the 10 outings, while opponents counted 143 points, a mean of 14.3 per outing.

Although the 10 foes collected 133 first downs while the Herd made 117, Cross Plains made more total yardage, yards rushing and yards passing than the 10 schools did facing the Bisons. Statistics furnished reveal that Buffaloes were running for 1,745. Add 496 yards passing and the Bison total yardage grows to 2,242, and adding 380 yards passing for the opposition, that figure falls even farther behind at 2,125.

Cross Plains also claimed the dubious honor of having more penalty yardage stepped off, 41 infractions for 245 yards, than the 10 opponents, 184 yards on 40 errors. Bisons were also by far the worst fumbling team, losing 14 of 244 bobbles, and the Herd came up with only 6 of 9 miscues.

Bisons barely clipped the 10 foes in punting, surrendering the pigskin on a punt 31 times on an average of 30.6 yards, while the foes punted to the Thundering Herd 34 times for a 30.2 average, beat.

Cross Plains and Blanket shared fourth place on the season both with 5-5 records and fourth place in District 8-A with 5-3 records, although the Thundering Herd defeated Blanket 24-0.

Champion Goldthwaite finished the regular season with a 9-1 mark and was undefeated in eight league outings. Gorman was runner-up in both season standings, 7-3, and in 8-A play, 6-2.

By the same token Santa Anna was also third with a 5-4-1 season mark and 5-2-1 district mark.

Sixth place was claimed by Ewant with a 3-7 season mark and a 3-5 league record. Following that was Rising Star 2-8 and 2-6, season and loop respectively, and Lometa 1-8-1 and 1-6-1 and Rochelle 0-10-0 and 0-8-0.

Tommy Johnston was the lead-

ing rusher for the Bisons this season. He carried 100 times and ran for 728 yards, 7.2 average, eight touchdowns and four extra points. Dennis Koenig was the runner-up rusher. He carried the ball 103 times and ran for 613 yards, taking an average 6 steps per carry. He scored five six-pointers and kicked one extra point.

Tony Apple ran for 464 yards on 80 carries for a 5.8 average. He tallied four touchdowns.

Mike Martin amassed 304 yards on 56 lugs for a 5.4 average. He also scored four touchdowns.

Ricky Brown, hurt during the season, carried 25 times for 113 yards, an average of two yards per lug, and scored six extra points.

Other backs carried the ball 20 times for the other 40 yards. On the 384 carries Cross Plains backs averaged 5.7 yards per rush and counted 21 touchdowns.

Koenig attempted 90 passes as quarterback, and he completed 36 of them. Yardage was revealed as 490 with each aerial averaging 13.7 yards. He passed for three touchdowns.

Mike Newman was the leading Buff receiver, nabbing 15 passes for 194 yards, average of 12.9 yards, for two touchdowns.

Ronald Hilburn was runner-up, snaring six passes for 17.1 yard average, for one touchdown and four extra points.

Johnston was the leading distance receiver, having nabbed four for 80 yards total, an average of 20 yards.

John Fred McWilliams latched on to three passes for 51 yards, a 17-yard average, one for a touchdown and one for a two-point conversion.

Other receivers were Martin, two catches for 32 yards, 16 yard average; Lance Clawson, 1 catch for 23 yards; Apple one catch for three yards, and Brown, one catch for two yards.

Scott Taylor was the Bisons' leading defender, making 75 tackles and lending 34 assists.

Runner-up was Mike Newman getting 43 tackles and 35 assists.

Close behind was Dennis Koenig who made 38 tackles and aided 27 times. Two other extra Buffs on defense were Andy Meiron who made 31 tackles and lent a hand 23 times, and Richard Creamer who got 22 tackles and helped 21

Brazos New Hybrid That Tops Coastal

Brazos, a new bermuda grass hybrid that tops Coastal in performance, will be released through the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's Foundation Seed Service at Texas A&M University in early 1983.

"Brazos bermuda grass has a higher level of digestibility and has produced better weight gains in cattle than Coastal bermuda," said Dr. Ethan Holt, professor of forage with the Experiment Station and Texas A&M's Department of Soil and Crop Sciences.

"In grazing trials Brazos has produced 20 to 25 per cent higher animal performance than Coastal," Holt noted. "Brazos also has superior nutritional quality (dry matter digestibility) and is adapted to all areas of Texas except the High Plains."

Sprigs of Brazos Bermuda grass will be available in limited amounts to qualified growers early next year, Holt said. To be qualified individuals must have passed inspection by Texas Department of Agriculture officials. Production plots must be certified by the TDA to protect the new Brazos variety from contamination, the forage scientist said.

Brazos bermuda grass was bred at the Oklahoma Agriculture Experiment Station and developed cooperatively by Agricultural Experiment Station and developed cooperatively by Agricultural Experiment Stations in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma. The release is a joint effort of these stations along with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Research Service and Soil Conservation Service.

Individuals interested in obtaining foundation sprigs of the new bermuda grass should contact the Foundation Seed Service, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843 and the Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. Foundation Seed will provide qualified individuals with planting material information while TDA will furnish information on land inspection requirements for certification, Holt said.

Disability Benefits Are Checked By SS

Disability benefits are intended to be paid only as long as a person's condition prevents substantial gainful work.

Social Security's strict definition of disability is one only the severely disabled can meet. Partial disability is not sufficient for a person to qualify for, or to remain entitled to, Social Security disability benefits.

In 1980, the Social Security Act was amended to require periodic review of all disability claims. Each claim must be reviewed at least once every three years unless it is determined a shorter or longer review period is justified.

The new law recognizes that many advances in medical science and rehabilitation techniques enable an increasing number of people to return to work after serious accidents and illnesses. For example:

Surgery and new mechanical aids and devices improve mobility and enhance opportunities for many individuals with orthopedic and neurological impairments.

Coronary bypass surgery, pacemakers, and new medications enable some people with cardiovascular impairments to lead more active lives.

Kidney dialysis enables many people to hold productive jobs.

Microsurgery, prosthetic surgery, organ transplants, new drugs, and new methods of treatment enable additional people to overcome their handicap.

When an individual applies for disability benefits, he agrees to report promptly if he goes to work or if his medical condition improves.

The Social Security administration has an obligation to terminate disability benefits when an individual is not disabled. The primary purpose of a continuing disability investigation is to obtain complete, current information about the disabled individual's medical condition and work activity. This information is used to determine if an individual continues to meet the definition of disability as prescribed by law.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Even the Democrats agreed that Republican Gov. Bill Clements' nominee for Supreme Court Chief Justice is a good one.

Last week the governor named Associate Justice Jack Pope to replace Chief Justice Joe Greenhill who retired last month.

Pope, 69, a long-time Democrat who did not seek re-election this time, will fill an unexpired term for two more years.

Clements' camp hoped the nomination of Pope would defuse a potential political powder keg. Three weeks ago some 15 Senators wrote Clements they would block this and other appointments unless he left the naming of the new chief justice to Gov.-elect Mark White.

Pope's nomination drew praise from many Democrats, even among the senators, and also from White. White also left it up to the Senate whether to act to block Pope's confirmation.

If it is unclear whether there will be a Senate confirmation battle, it is also unclear just why the Democratic senators are spoiling for a fight.

Former Atty. Gen. John Hill wants the nomination and that's no secret. He said again last week that he will run for it in 1984, and many of his supporters would like White to appoint him, if Pope is blocked.

Clements, Hill

Then again, Clements as governor has named hundreds of conservatives, including a good many from the oil industry, to boards and commissions in his four year tenure.

Before he leaves office on Jan. 18, he will be able to name a couple of hundred more, a fact which rankles Democrats who oppose him.

The letter may have been a tool to back off, to warn Clements to be careful of his next selections.

Forcing Clements to back away is an almost futile gesture, but it may have worked this time. Democrats will be hard put to

block someone of Pope's philosophy and caliber, but the Senators have steered Clements away from naming a hard-right winger, or even an up-and-coming Texas Republican.

Finally, although Pope has no visible enemies in the Senate and is a respected jurist, he must fight for confirmation against the forces of John Hill. Clements has left himself in good position on this one: if Pope loses, it's not Clements' fault. And since Pope is hot a threat to run two years from now, Clements may hope to deter Hill from reaching for the seat right now.

Railroad Commission

The Texas Railroad Commission, due to face legislative scrutiny under Sunset provisions this session, will get a whole new face if a bill by a Dallas senator is approved.

A bill by Sen. Oscar Mauzy would expand the agency from three members to nine, changing them from statewide elected officials to single-member districts.

Mauzy also has filed similar bills to restructure the Public Utility Commission and Texas Highways and Public Transportation Commission in much the same way.

Whether any of the bills pass, they are still in means of applying pressure to the commissions getting them to go along with other proposed reforms this year.

The commissions are subject to lobbying from large private companies, and Mauzy's bills are viewed as a means for the Legislature to equalize its grip.

Clayton To Stay

Outgoing House Speaker Bill Clayton, who understands the lobbying process as well as anyone could well find himself facing Mauzy and the more moderate Democrats on issues affecting these commissions.

Clayton said last week he will stay in Austin to do "legislative work, political work, business consulting work — we want to be able to do the whole gamut."

Clayton said it was possible he would be lobbying his former colleagues in the Legislature.

He also indicated he will save the \$300,000 already collected in his officeholder account for a possible future political race.

Million Dollar Fees

Out of the landmark prison rights lawsuit two years ago was a federal judge's order to the state to pay \$1,663,000 in legal fees to the lawyers representing the prisoners.

Last week Gov.-elect White, still acting as attorney general, said he will appeal the state's paying the fees as "excessive," and implied they were undeserved.

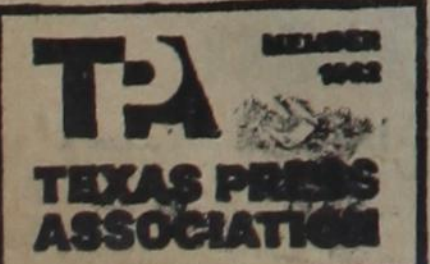
