



People who get Social Security etirement or surviver checks an who earned more than the annual exemp' amount in wages from a rob or in self-employment in 1984 have until April 15, 1985, to file an annual report of their earnings, Glvn Hammons, Social Security

manager in Abilene, said recently. The 1984 exempt amounts were \$5,160 for people under 65 all of he year and \$6,960 for people 65 or over any part of 1984. In general, a person has \$1 in henefits withheld for each \$2 of an nual earnings over the exempt mount.
