Be suspicious of any strong bond that develops between your child and an adult. Do not put your child's name on things like T-shirts. A child is more likely to respond to a stranger if he or she know the child's name.

Believe your children if they say they have been sexually abused. Studies indicate that children rarely lie about such attacks.

If your children are victims, be sympathetic. Remember, child sexual abuse is never the victim's

If an adult tries to touch you, scream, yell, get away however you can, and tell somebody. Keep telling people until someone listens.

Tell if someone asks you to take your clothes off.

Tell if someone you do not know asks to take your pic-

Tell if someone you do not know offers you money or

Do not kiss anyone, including relatives, if it makes you feel uncomfortable.

If someone has touched your body, it is not your fault. Do not ever blame yourself. You will not get in trouble.

Remember your area code, not just your telephone

It is okay to use the telephone without permission if someone has been touching your body or making your scared or uncomfortable.

#### County Agent Urges Control Of White Grubs In Lawns

White grub control in lawns is important during the summer season.

May or June bettles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm in late evenings. Females are laying eggs and white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken, says Greg Gerngross, Callahan County agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early June in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhan-Homeowners in Callahan County will need to treat between mid-July to mid-August. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns, notes Ger-

grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of

Diazinon, Dursban or Dylox provide adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock them down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying also helps. ngross. Check for white Always keep children and

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding, emphasizes Gerngross.




