ABUSE PREVENTION TIPS

For Parents:

Show your children attention and affection. Be involved in their lives. Talk to your children about the privacy of their genitals. Be explicit. Make certain your child's day-care facility allows unannounced visits. Question any money or gifts your child brings home.

Be suspicious of any strong bond that develops between your child and an

adult. Do not put your child's name on things like T-shirts. A child is more likely to respond to a stranger if he or she know the child's name.

Believe your children if they say they have been sexually abused. Studies indicate that children rarely lie about such attacks.

If your children are victims, be sympathetic. Remember, child sexual abuse is never the victim's fault.

If an adult tries to touch you, scream, yell, get away however you can, and tell somebody. Keep telling people until someone listens.

Tell if someone asks you to take your clothes off.

Tell if someone you do not know asks to take your picture.

Tell if someone you do not know offers you money or gifts.

Do not kiss anyone, including relatives, if it makes you feel uncomfortable.

If someone has touched your body, it is not your fault. Do not ever blame yourself. You will not get in trouble.

Remember your area code, not just your telephone number.

It is okay to use the telephone without permission if someone has been touching your body or making you scared or uncomfortable.

Never go into anyone's house without your parents' permission.

Living In Country Style, "An updated 1840's farmhouse in Georgia" was also featured a few years ago in another national publication. In this month's Redbook, it is given six pages of full color photographs and comments.

A portion of the article appearing in the magazine, starting on page 94, reads, "A home with the country coziness of an eighteenth-century farmhouse was a dream of Bettye Wagner, an avid antiques collector and dealer, and her husband,

John, a history buff. They loved the idea of living with the past, but not the thought of an old house's drafty windows or leaking roof. So instead of buying an old house, they built one, following an 1840's floor plan, in the modern-day suburbs of Atlanta."

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County Agent Urges Control Of White Grubs In Lawns

White grub control in lawns is important during the summer season.

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm in late evenings. Females are laying eggs and white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken, says Greg Gerngross, Callahan County agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early June in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Callahan County will need to treat between mid-July to mid-August. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns, notes Gerngross. Check for white

grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon, Dursban or Dylox provide adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock them down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying also helps. Always keep children and

pets off the treated lawn before spraying also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treat lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding, emphasizes Gerngross.

Further information is provided in the publication, "White Grubs in Texas Turfgrass," available at the County Extension Office at Baird.

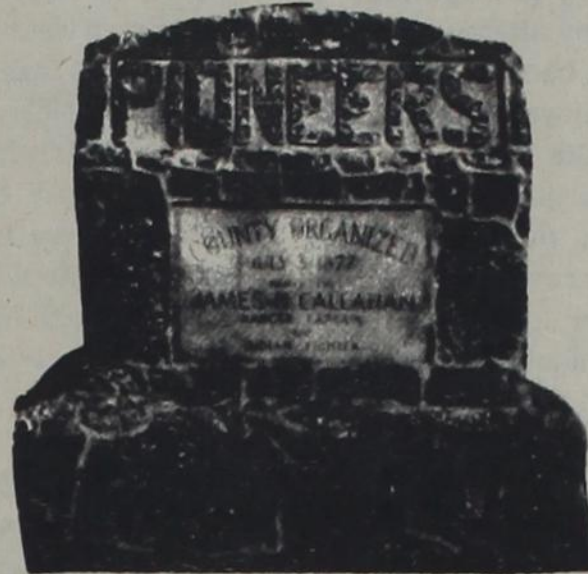
