## Carolyn's Corner

Thursday is July 4 and I take this opportunity to wish all of you nice one in whatever you choose to do on that day.

Some of you may be traveling and I wish for you safety while on the highways; some will be having picnics and family gettogethers and I wish for you a nice time of fellowship together. Be sure and exercise firework safety. 

Following is an overview, in part, of Children's Protective Services provided by Barbara Evans, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Human Resources.

The Texas Department of Human Resources is mandated by law to investigate reports of suspected child abuse and neglect and to provide services to protect children from abuse. neglect, and exploitation. Services are provided to any child in need of protection without regard to family income or citizenship. During 1984, the number of investigations rose 6.7% to 61.576. Over the last two calendar years, the number of child abuse cases has increased 50.4%.

The department maintains a toll-free 24 hour hotline(1-800-252-5400) to receive reports of suspected child abuse and neglect. The identification of callers is confidential. Reports are investigated on a priority basis, depending upon the extent of apparent danger the child faces. Services are designed to remedy the situation. Services to the child and the family include counseling and referral to community agencies. Court action is initiated if necessary. A court may

order removal of children from their homes, assignment of managing conservatorship, and placement with relatives or in foster care. When rehabilitative services fail, attempts may be made to legally free children for adoption. The department develops and certifies foster and adoptive homes for children removed from their homes.

Approximately 18,000-26,000 children in Region 04 will be at risk of abuse and neglect in 1985. In fiscal year 1984, 4,222 abused or neglected children were identified in Region 04. In fiscal year 1984, protective service workers investigated 2,547 reports of suspected child abuse and neglect in Region 04 with the number of confirmed instances of abuse or neglect being 2,247. As of February 1985, Region 04 had 55 children's protective services workers. An average of 311 children a month received foster care under the state-federal Aid to Families with Dependent Children program, while an additional 96 children received foster care paid entirely with state funds.

The department provided adoption subsidies to 61 children in Region 04 with special problems or handicaps enabling them to have permanent homes with families who otherwise could not afford their special

Additional information about protective services for abused and neglected children may be obtained from a local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources. Reports of suspected abuse or neglect may be made by calling 1-800-252-5400.

## City Will Take Fourth of July As Full Holiday

The major portion of downtown Cross Plains will observe Thursday, July 4, as a full holiday.

At least one establishment, Sav-On Food, will however, be open as usual in the downtown section. Most of the others will follow usual custom and close their doors for the nationally observed Independence Day. Other than the vast majority of retail and other business offices in Cross Plains to be closed the one day will be Citizens State Bank and United States Post Office. Olney Savings on Highway 36 will also be closed Thursday only. Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply will be closed three days, July 4, 5 and 6.

Joe E. Hanke, local postmaster, explained that as usual, July 4th will be a full holiday for the postal service. Locally that means there will be no mial service in or out of the city, no rural routes, no window service and no mail will be boxed. Service will resume as usual Friday.

Although most of the downtown part of Cross Plains will be closed July Fourth, the majority of business institutions located along highways leading into the city will be open for business as usual. Exceptions to that are Johnston Truck & Supply and Skeet Walker Truck and Trailer Sales, both of which will be

closed all day.

There will be no shortage of gasoline outlets open no places to here on the holiday.

Four of the full service stations in Cross Plains will be open on regular schedule. They are J.W. Fore Mobil, Grider Gulf Station, Cliff's Exxon Station and Dillard Texaco Station. Self-service gasoline outlets will also be open at three convenience stores here, Bi-Rite Superette on North Main, Town & Country Food Store on East Highway 36 and Lakeway Store on Highway

Eating establishments along the highway will also be open all day. Included are Odom's Steakhouse, Dairy Queen and Dairy Bar.

Cross Plains has no special activity planned for the Fourth of July, but it is expected that many local residents will attend festivities planned for surrounding cities and towns.

As usual, state and other peace officers throughout this section of Texas will be working longer than normal hours in an effort to prevent motor vehicle accidents. The number of fatal mishaps across the state has been lowered this year, according to information in news release from the Texas Department of Public Safety which is printed elsewhere in today's Review.



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


