Local Resident's Son Receives Heart Transplant

Word has been received here that Tom Thrasher, son of local residents Dick and Blanche Thrasher, received a heart transplant June 7 at Tampa General Hospital, Tampa, Fla. Tom, who is 42 years old, began experiencing heart failure six months ago after suffering from the flu. Doctors had predicted that he couldn't survive another two months without the transplant.

The donor was a 19-year-old Tampa area man. Tom was the first of approximate-

ly 18 individuals who will benefit from the generous donations of the organs by his family. Besides the heart, the young man's kidneys, corneas, pancreas, two of his temporal bones and numerous long bones were saved for other patients.

The transplant was performed by two University of South Florida professors who serve as surgeons at Tampa General Hospital. Dr. R. Vijay and Dr. Michael Sweeney. It was the first

heart transplant for Tampa General Hospital.

Dick and Blanche Thrasher who are retired Air Force, live on a farm approximately five miles west of Cross Plains near East Caddo Peak. They have been in Florida with their son several weeks, and report that Tom is doing well after the surgery. Doctors say that if everything goes well, he should be released from the hospital in three to four weeks.

AARP Chapter Helping Explain MEDPARD

Last fall Congress took a major step toward curbing skyrocketing health costs, a representative of the nation's largest organization of older Americans has said. But the new law will not be effective she said, unless health consumers know how to take advantage of it.

That's why vera Pearl Bunnell, president of the Cross Plains chapter, and other members of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) are now publicizing the availability of the MEDPARD Director.

The MEDPARD Directory, now available for use at all Social Security offices, Agency on Aging offices, and from all AARP and RTA units, is a listing of all Physicians and suppliers in this area who signed up for the "Participating Physician Program".

The directory is now available at the Multi-Purpose Center in Cross

Plains, according to Mrs. Bunnell.

Congress is encouraging participation by physicians through financial incentives it has added to the Medicare reimbursement system. For example, "allowable" or "reasonable" charges will be higher for participating physicians than for non-participating physicians. "Patients can offer additional incentives," Mrs. Bunnell said, "by supporting those doctors who participate."

"Congress, in passing this law, said that 'Much of the success of the new Participating Physician Program will depend on the involvement of the Medicare beneficiaries nationwide'."

Burkett Lake Project Being Discussed Again

Editor's Note: Following is a story concerning the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' plan to build a large lake on the upper Pecan Bayou near Burkett. It has been proposed for many years, but has never been approved or funded. Interest has been revived in the project by an Abilene water group and a meeting was called for Tuesday, June 18, the night this publication was printed. A pre-meet story penned by Robert Tindol, Brownwood Bulletin staff writer, follows.

A request by the Abilene Water Study Committee to assume from the Brown County Water Improvement District the prime sponsorship of a proposed dam at Burkett will be opposed by the water district at a June 18 meeting.

The district has been the prime sponsor for a number of years of the project, which calls for a dam to be built by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on the Upper Pecan Bayou at Burkett in Coleman County. The waters drain into Lake Brownwood and provide one of the areas primary watersheds.

The June 18 meeting, requested by the Corps of Engineers, will include in the study group of cities of Baird, Clyde, Cross Plains, Buffalo Gap, as well as Callahan, Eula, Hamby, Steam Boat Mountain, Sun and View Caps water supply corporations, and Tuscola Fresh Water District.

"We know that the desire of this board is to continue as the sponsor of this project," said general manager Harry Miller. "We would be happy to meet with these people and let them know that we intend to continue, and we have every intention of encouraging the Corps to move forward with the project."

Miller said after the meeting that the dam could easily cost \$50 million.

Board President W.H. "Skinny" Pruitt told the board that the project had been in the works for many years, and that the sponsorship of the project would not be profitable to any of the entities named in the study group.

"There's not enough watershed, there's not enough available run-off to do them any good," Pruitt said. "But it could hurt us tremendously because it would take a lot of our watershed off the bayou."

Miller added that the Corps had requested in November to delete from its project schedule the building of the dam, and that the water district at that time had "vehemently opposed" the deletion.

Miller later said he felt that the Fort Worth office of the Corps was anxious to keep the project on its schedule.

"But the Washington office probably is pressured in budget considerations to delete old projects," Miller said.

Carolyn's Corner

It seems that this time each year the community begins to have salesman knocking at their doors. For the most part they are polite and not too "pushy". Generally they are students out of college for the summer and are working their way through school.

On some occasions one will really push you to buy their product or book or whatever they are selling. Once you tell them you are not interested or cannot afford what they have to offer, that should be the end of the conversation. However some will say "Let me show it to you any way!" By this time some folks are so frustrated they will buy just to get rid of the salesman.

Honestly, I don't like to be pressured in stores by a salesperson, much less in my own home.

Some businesses resort to high pressure sales tactics to entice their customers into purchasing goods or services. Their salespersons are highly trained in various techniques, which they use to manipulate the "potential buyer" into being an actual purchaser. Surprisingly enough, many consumers may not realize that high pressure sales tactics are being used until it is too late.

The Consumer Protection Act provides relief for those persons who have been victims of high pressure sales tactics. If you've been ripped off, contact your nearest Attorney General Consumer Protection Office or your local Better Business Bureau. However, the best medicine is preventative medicine. Here are some commonly used tactics to watch for the next time you are approached by a salesperson:

1. The Guilt Trip - The idea is to make you feel guilty if you don't buy.

Example: "You wouldn't want to deprive your children of the education and knowledge these encyclopedias could give them."

2. Statistics - In many in-

stances these salespersons will bombard you with statistics that in some cases are not accurate or are given too quickly for you to comprehend.

Example: "The government surveyed thousands of people during their productive years and came up with some very accurate figures. Out of 100 people who reach retirement, ONLY ONE will be 'well to do.' This deal will make you that one."

3. Your Last Chance - A salesperson may convince you to make a hasty decision by saying to you that "this is the last time it will be offered at this price."

Example: "You'll get a \$500 discount tonight only. If you don't purchase this vacation plan tonight, the discount will never be offered again."

4. Jump on the Band Wagon - Many times a salesperson will encourage you to buy because everyone else is.

Example: "Your neighbor just bought one" or "everybody who is anybody is buying this product."

5. Assumptive Close - You may notice during a sales presentation that the salesperson talks as if you have already agreed to buy. Example: "Do you want to sign this spa agreement with my pen or your pen?" By relating to you in such a positive manner, the salesperson may manipulate you into signing a contract.

These are just a few of the high pressure sales techniques used by some businesses.

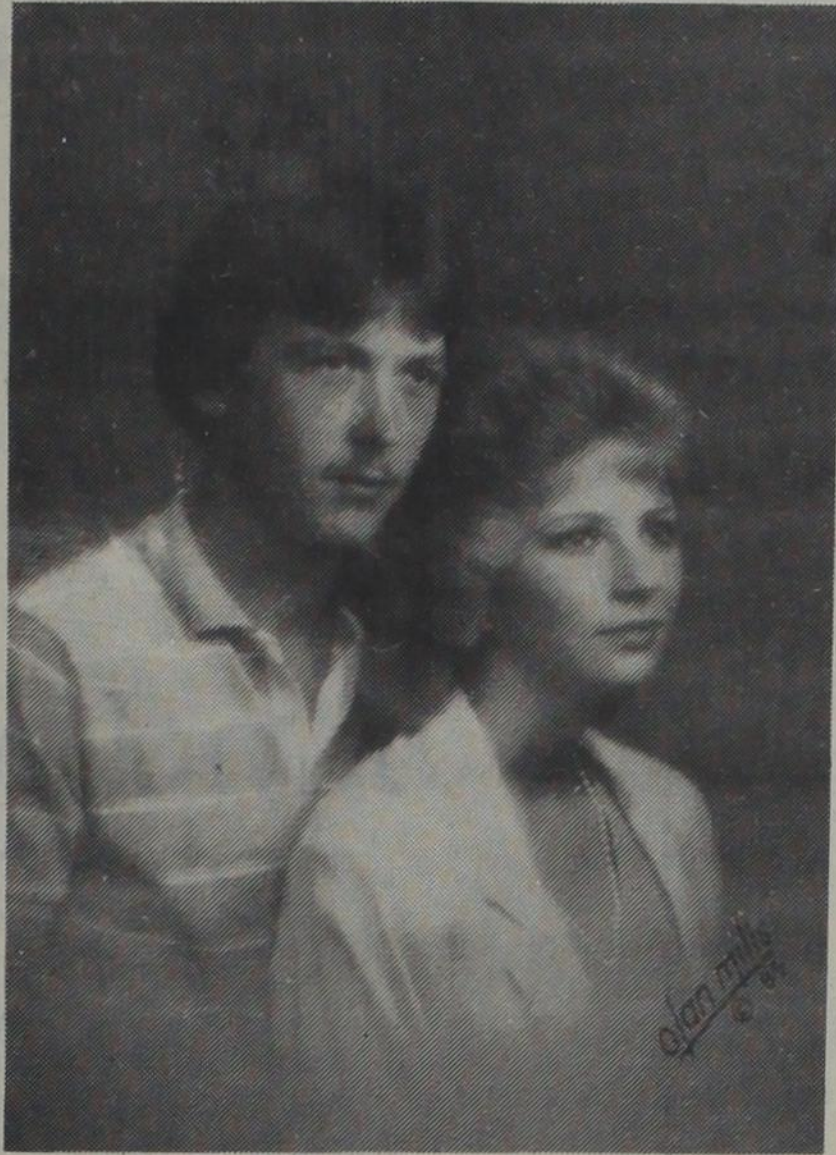
