

Trustees Begin Search For New School Superintendent

Board of Trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District has begun the search for the person which will serve as superintendent of local schools for the next school year.

Two candidates for that job were interviewed by board of education members Monday night. Additional interviews are scheduled for Friday night, according to Randy Foster, president of the school board.

Foster indicated that two prospects would be talked with each Monday and Friday until all the applicants, numbering "around 10" as of Tuesday

morning, are talked with. He also stated that he is still accepting applications for the position.

He said Tuesday morning that there is no target date, no deadline, to fill the office of superintendent. "We will interview until we get through the applications and then take it from there," Foster said Tuesday morning.

The head position at Cross Plains Schools became open last month when on a 5-2 count school trustees voted to re-new Dr. Scot H. Edington's contract. A 20-year veteran of ser-

vices to the local school system, Dr. Edington spent the past four years as superintendent.

In addition to the special sessions to interview superintendent candidates, a regular trustees meeting is also scheduled.

Trustees of Cross Plains Independent School District are scheduled to meet in regular session Thursday, Feb. 19, in the Home Economics Laboratory of the Elementary School Building. Starting time is 7 p.m.

Dr. Scot H. Edington released the following agenda for the session: prayer; minutes; bills; school annual problems and considerations; Jo Rhodes, Charlene Burkett; personnel (executive session) principals' contracts, Browning's resignation, Athletic Director's contract; textbook committee selections; furniture for new high school; board of equalization; driver education instructor; school bus prices for 981-82 school year; schedules for extracurricular activities, and proposed change order on high school.

State Ed. Board Okays Schools' Accreditation

Cross Plains Schools are again back at the top of the heap, according to accreditation standards in secondary schools in Texas.

Cross Plains schools have been recommended by the State Board of Education to be re-classified as accredited at its last meeting. Actually the local system never lost accreditation by the state, but had been placed in accredited advised category. That is a way of signalling chances are mandatory.

Cross Plains was placed on the advise status last year when the old high school building was inspected by state education officials and officers from the State Fire Marshall's office.

Since that time a new high school building has been begun, and other minor clerical and physical deficiencies have been corrected.

The letter notifying Superintendent Dr. Scot H. Edington of the reclassification was dated January 13, and released to local board members recently. It was signed by Robert A. Montgomery, Assistant Deputy Commissioner for Accreditation. It read, in part, as follows.

At its January 10, 1981, meeting the State Board of Education concurred with the recommendation made by the State Commission on School Accreditation that the Cross Plains Independent School District be re-classified from Accredited, Advised to Accredited.

We are confident that your district will continue to remain in substantial compliance with the Principles, Standards, and Procedures for the Accreditation of School Districts and will continue its work to reach the objectives stated in your district's plan.

Cisco College Will Host Farmer's Union Meeting

Family farmers and ranchers who want a direct input into the 1981 Farm Bill will have their chance Saturday, Feb. 21, when a Farmer's Town Hall meeting will be held with Congressman Charles Stenholm (D), Stamford, the representative of the 17th Congressional District. The open meeting will be held from 11 a.m. until 3 p.m. at the Fine Arts Building of the Cisco Junior College in Cisco and will include a question and answer session with the congressman.

The Farmer's Town Hall meeting is a result of a 14 county tour and grass roots meetings last month with farmers and ranchers sponsored by the Texas Farmers Union. Newly elected Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller said the culmination of the series of local meetings held the week of January 20th to 27th "will provide the opportunity to directly present

to Congressman Stenholm the views of those people whose livelihoods depends on agriculture."

Moeller urged those family farmers and ranchers who attended previous county meetings and those who were unable to make the previous sessions to attend the open meeting Saturday. "Instead of having the 1981 Farm Bill written by economists, staff members and lobbyists in Washington, we can have input into the process while the legislation is being formed," Moeller said. "This way, we can let our opinions be known before the law is adopted rather than having to wait and find out how it will affect family farmers and ranchers after the legislation is approved," the Texas Farmers Union president added.

The Farmer's Town Hall meeting will begin at 11 a.m. with an

SBA Extends Date For Disaster Loans

Filing deadline for obtaining disaster loan assistance from the U. S. Small Business Administration has been extended for 60 days. The filing deadline affects those who experienced drought damages to farms, ranches and related enterprises in Texas.

The new filing deadline is April 13, 1981, for physical drought losses — crop losses, pasture damages, loss of livestock, etc. For economic injury losses, the new deadline will be July 13, 1981. This extension will allow farmers more time to calculate losses due to a late harvest season.

Interest rates on SBA physical loss disaster loans are either 5% or 8 1/4%, depending upon the borrower's financial ability. The lower rate will apply to those who could not borrow from commercial, private or non-federal sources. The interest rate on Economic Injury loans is 8 1/4%. Loan maturities are established by SBA loan officers in accordance with the applicant's ability to repay the loan.
