# Former Minister At Burkett Pens Recollections Of Area







Nematodes are microscopic, worm-like animals that feed on roots. Damaged plants have deeayed spots and stubby roots or enlarged root tips.

While several types of nematodes can infest a garden, the root knot nematode is the most damaging. Plants infested with root knot nematode will have galls or swellings on their roots, are usually stunted and yellow in color, and may die premature-

Gardeners can use several methods of control to get rid of or at least lessen the number of nematodes, says Gerngross. Using nematode-resistant varieties of plants helps as does rotating erops of corn, onions and gar-

Also, using a cover crop such as cereal rye, not common ryegrass, during the winter months, helps trap nematodes.
