Rust, greenbugs and winter grain mites are being found in most areas of the county the last few days.

At the present point in the plants growth cycle, the only thing that is hurt by rust is leaf and tiller production so forage yield will be decreased somewhat says. The best thing to do with rust infected fields is to turn cat-

Some fields are being infested with greenbugs and winter grain mites. Greenbugs usually cause small areas of fields to turn yeldefense, as a running back and December, and only .70 of an inch low. These spots gradually get

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

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.



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

Wheat, Barley Crops FOR SALE: Matthew Henry Bible KEROSENE HEATERS AND Available between December 25 For '81 Due Payment

Eligible wheat farmers will soon receive an estimated \$420 million THREE FAMILY GARAGE in deficiency payments on their 1981 crop, while barley farmers will get about \$50 million, according to Everett Rank, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service.

Deficiency payments are required under the 1981 wheat and barley programs because average FOR SALE: Two bedroom brick market prices received by farmers during the first five months (June through October) of the marketing year were below established target price levels of \$3.81 for barley.

National weighted average market prices were \$3.66 per bushel for wheat and \$2.49 per bushel for barley. Thus, eligible producers will be paid 15 cents per bushel for their 1981-crop wheat and 11 cents per bushel for this year's barley.

Callahan County wheat and barley producers will receive deficiency payments if they reported their 1981-crop acreage and filed an application for payment, said Melanie Covington, ASCS county executive director. She continued, "Each producer with an interest in a wheat and/or barley crop should insure that the application for payment has been signed. Please check with us here at the ASCS office in Baird to insure signatuures have been acquired. We will be issuing the paymeent checks as soon as possible after December 10, 1981, and before December 20, 1981."

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


