Stock will be furnished by the Mesquite Championship Rodeo Co. of Mesquite which is owned by Neal Gay, long one of the best known names in sport of rodeo, turning out some of the very best rodeo stock in the business.

Clowns for the 1981 rodeo are Quail Dobbs and Rick Chatman. For many years Quail has been referred to as the "funniest man ever to walk in a rodeo arena." He has thrilled the crowds at Coleman in past years. The Coahoma resident is also the feature specialty act, "Quail Dobbs and his Apollo 14 1/2." His "Apollo" is made from an original 1910 Model T. Chatman is said to be one of the best if not the best bull fighters in rodeo today. His talents brought him the honor of being selected to work the 1980 National Finals Rodeo.

Editor's Note: Following is an article received recently from the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association of Dallas concerning oil production in the state and giving county-by-county figures.

Despite a ninth consecutive year of maximum production schedules (the maximum efficient recovery rate) in nearly all of Texas' fields, the state's annual output of crude oil and condensate last year fell below the one billion barrel mark for the first time since 1965. Moreover, a downward production trend continued for the eighth consecutive year since Texas' output peaked in 1972.

# Holiday Week End Brings Welcome Local Showers

Week end showers which dampened some July Fourth holiday activities but were welcomed by most persons in agriculture fell in the Cross Plains area Friday through Monday.

Most of the showers were accompanied by some vivid lightning and loud thunder, but were not threatening type storm clouds. Late Monday afternoon, however, a hard shower hit Cross Plains and the area south and east of here causing some damage to

West Texas Utility Co. lines near here.

Rain totals varied widely over the area. Review's Cottonwood correspondent Bev Brown reported measurements from .90 of an inch to 1.50 inches, although J. P. Clark of that community said his gauge registered 2.60 inches. Rowden community which had totals ranging from 2.00 to 3.00 inches and Pioneer with gauges measuring 2.00 to 3.75 inches, according to correspondent Betty Beggs, were on the other end of the scale. Pioneer Farmers Co-Op reported 1.60 inches during the week end, and another inch which fell extremely hard Monday evening. Cross Cut also received a good rain with Mrs. Les Byrd reporting 2.50 inches with .50 of an inch of that falling Monday. She said that 1.50 inches fell at the O. B. Byrd place Monday.

Golden Lawson reported 1.10 inches at Sabanno over the week end, and Roy Tatom got 1.50 inches at Atwell during the same period. Neither reported any rain on Monday.

In Cross Plains gauges ranged from 1.30 to 1.65 inches. That included .45 of an inch on Friday and a total of .80 of an inch on Saturday evening and Sunday morning. Another .40 was recorded by one gauge here Monday afternoon when the hard shower hit. It was accompanied by some wind. Another local gauge caught .20 of an inch while still another held .75 of an inch after the downpour.

Oral Joy, who lives a mile south of town on the Brownwood high-

way measured 1.50 inches, and it fell in 20 minutes.

Lightning and wind accompanying the cloud Monday caused West Texas Utilities Co. personnel extra work. Lightning apparently struck an insulator on a feed line to Rising Star between Cross Plains and Pioneer. Local Manager Gene Rhodes said power was off to a section served by WTU about two hours. He said, "It took us about an hour to find it and about an hour to fix it."

Two electric poles were apparently snapped by the wind along Highway 279-206 between the Hub Freeman home and the Ralph Pancake home. Rhodes said that

apparently one of the poles was weak and when it broke it took another with it. A WTU crew from Abilene was called after the damage was learned of about 6 p.m.

The 1.65 inches of rain which fell here brings the year's aggregate to 17.37 inches, more than normal at this time of year.

The rain came at a good time for area farmers. Almost all of the small grain crop had been harvested, and most of the peanuts had been planted. Some had hay crops on the ground, however. Overall the moisture was considered to be a big boost to the agricultural picture as a whole.

**Medicare Premium Up But It's A Bargain**

The monthly premium for the medical insurance part of Medicare increases to 11 for the 12-month period starting this month (July), Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

In spite of this increase, people should know that they are paying less than a third of the cost of this insurance. More than two-thirds is paid by the U. S. Government from general revenues, not from social security taxes, Hammons said.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services, no matter where they are received in the United States, in an office, home, hospital, or elsewhere; for outpatient hospital services; for home health care in a person's home; and for other medical services and supplies not covered by Medicare hospital insurance.

For most covered services, medical insurance pays 80 percent of the approved charges after the patient has incurred \$60 in approved charges — the annual deductible — for the year. Because of the way approved charges are figured and because of the rates of inflation in medical care prices, however, approved charges are often less than doctors' or suppliers' actual charges.

Medicare is available to nearly everyone 65 or older, people of any age with permanent kidney failure, and to people who have been getting social security disability checks for 24 months or longer.

People who are not otherwise eligible for hospital insurance at 65 can buy this protection. The premium is \$89 a month for the 12-month period starting this month. A person buying hospital insurance must also have medical insurance coverage.

More information about Medicare can be obtained at the Abilene social security office located 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360 in Abilene or 1-800-392-1603 if you live outside of Abilene. A free leaflet, "A brief explanation of Medicare," can be obtained which contains more information about Medicare protection.

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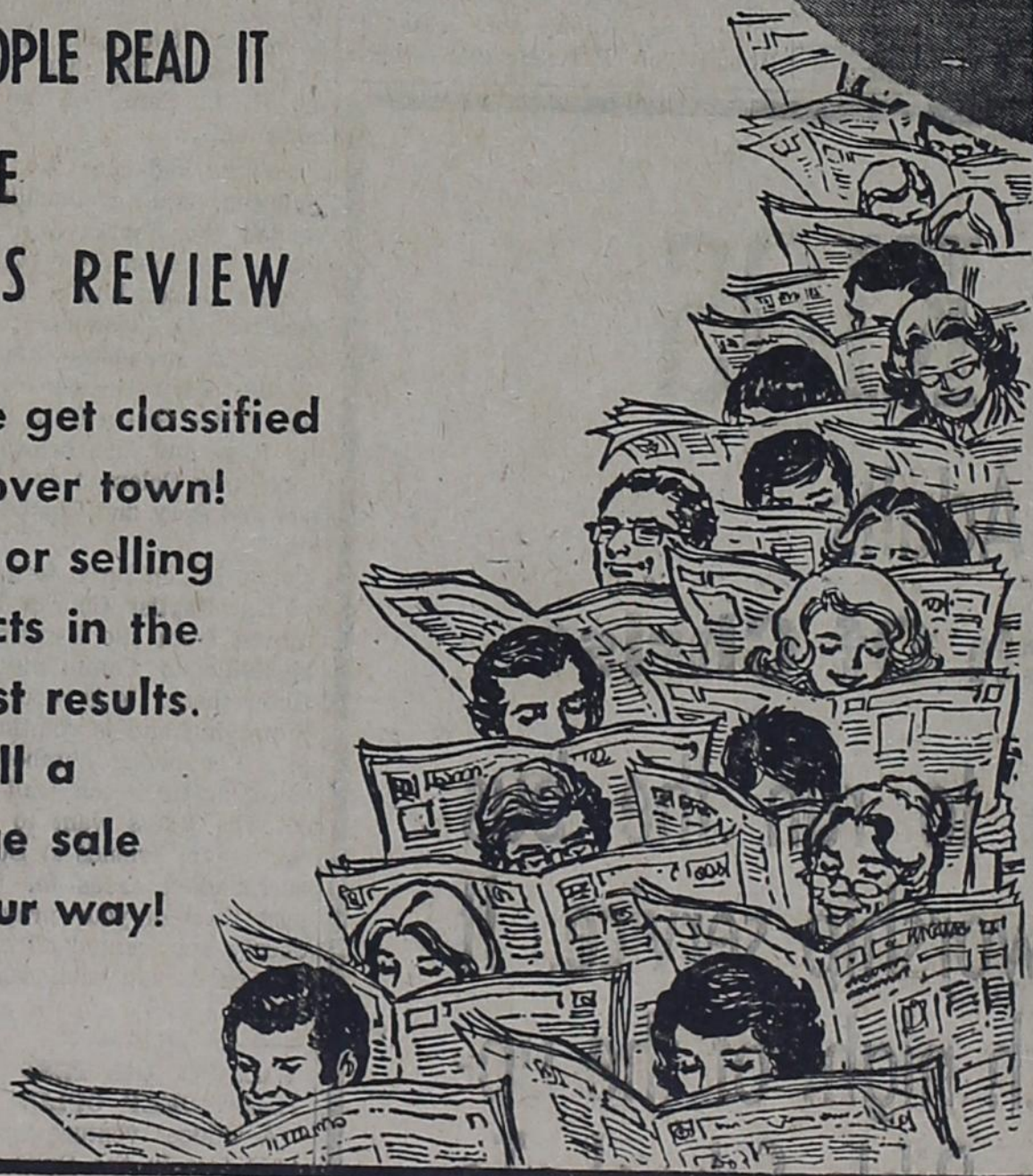
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**ABILENE RADIO OFFICIAL TO SPEAK HERE SATURDAY**
