

11 School Staffers Say Goodbye As Term Ends

At least 11 school staffers who were involved in the operation of the Cross Plains Schools during the 1980-81 school year will be leaving with school closing.

Only a few of the posts have been filled, and at least two will not be filled due to absence of federal funds.

Last day of school for students is today, Wednesday. Elementary school was to operate on regular schedule, while high school and some junior high school classes were meeting a schedule dictated by semester final tests both Tuesday and Wednesday.

Teachers are to return to the school, starting at 8:30 a.m. Thursday for an in-service work day.

Persons who will not be coming back for another term for various reasons, retiring, resignations, not rehired or no funds available, include Jim Chesshir, handyman; Betty Browning, Federal Program Coordinator; Frances Tyson, kindergarten teacher; Jean Alexander, second grade teacher; Kathy Churchill, home economics instructor; Mickey

Huffman, Head Coach and Athletic Director; Becky Isabell, speech and drama teacher; Richard Fox, coach and science teacher; Dr. Scot H. Edington, superintendent; Charlene Burkett, Title I teacher, and Linda Payne, Title I aide.

It was noted that the board of trustees have hired or named presently employed persons to some of the positions being vacated. Lee Thompson was recently hired as Superintendent of Schools. He is from Whitney. His wife has been employed as a teacher as has Paula Winfrey.

Position of Title I Program Coordinator has been accepted by Margie Sowell, a veteran teacher in the system here.

Mack McConal, also a veteran coach and teacher in Cross Plains Schools, was named Athletic Director by trustees last week end. El Higgins, who is completing his first year here, was named Head Football Coach for the upcoming year. He was an assistant last year.

Other appointments or vacancy fillings are expected to be made in the next several days.

Work Starting On New Countywide Tax Office

Editor's Note: Following is an article, which include two press releases, compiled by John D. Montgomery of Cross Plains about the upcoming countywide tax appraisal office. He is a member of the board.

"These two new releases are pretty well self explanatory. I feel there will be a few change in regulations made during this session of the Legislature, but nothing major. This is something mandated by the 1979 Legislature, and whether we like it or not, it is probably here to stay.

"Associated Tax Services will collect data and look at property this year and soon after Jan. 1, 1982. They will put a value on it as of Jan. 1, 1982. Notices will be sent to taxpayers and you will have an opportunity to meet with Associated Tax Services representatives to discuss values, then later with the board of review members for the county.

"The Central Appraisal Office can also collect taxes if a taxing unit wants them to. At least the schools in the county are seriously considering this option.

"The appraisal district's board of directors contracted with the Commissioners Court for Albert Lovell to run the appraisal district's office. His title is "chief appraiser." I feel we were very fortunate to get his services since he is very knowledgeable about running a tax office.

"The Legislature of the State of Texas passed new legislation in 1979 that will provide sweeping changes in ad valorem (property) tax assessment and administration for the future. Among the significant changes that will affect taxpayers individually are the requirements that all tax agencies must establish a central appraisal office, to be in full operation by January, 1982. In addition, procedures must be begun to provide for this implementation beginning in 1980. The duties of this central appraisal agency will include the appraisal of all taxable property, providing one value to be used by all tax agencies with the exception of counties that are not presently required to participate. (Callahan Co. Commissioner voted to go with the appraisal district so values for all taxing units should be the same on the same property after Jan. 1, 1982.)

"Other changes that are of significance include the expansion of exemptions to include agricultural property, senior citizens as well as homeowners and the personal property of individuals not held for the production of income.

"In addition to the exemptions made available, however tax offices are required to keep their property values up to date having to re-inspect each property at least once each five years.

"Taxpayers will be given a notice of any increase in the property value exceeding one hundred dollars and an opportunity to appeal the proposed value if desired. Also included in this legislation are provisions that mandate that each city, school and county wishing to raise the total tax levy (the amount of taxes actually raised) over the previous year by more than three per cent must hold special hearings just for that purpose.

"Associated Tax Services, Inc., the professional appraisal firm employed by the Callahan County Appraisal District has been working in the Baird area for the last several weeks. R. O. Biering III, project manager, states that the preliminary work has been progressing smoothly with few problems. The work has begun with the initiation of a contract for equalization services between the company and the Callahan County Appraisal Board. The project is expected to be complete by May 1, 1982.

"The work has begun with staff appraisers for the company gathering sales and market data from local sources. Biering states that is done in order to insure that values placed on property are based on local conditions and value factors. Once having established a data file on the market values of property in the Callahan County area, field personnel will be sent into the field to measure property and collect additional data on each individual property. Once this work is completed, professional appraisers will assign a value classification to each parcel of property depending on its condition, architectural style, and quality as well as location in the area. At the completion of this work, the value of each parcel will be calculated using

In Accident Sunday W. R. Thompsons

Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Thompson of Cross Plains were injured in a traffic accident three miles north of Cross Plains on Farm Road 880 Sunday about 3 p.m.

Mrs. Thompson, age 90, was the most seriously hurt. She suffered a deep scalp wound, a broken right arm and a broken right leg along with other bruises and scrapes. She was transported to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene by Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service, and was placed in the intensive care unit. She was still there Tuesday morning listed in stable condition.

Mr. Thompson, 91, was not so seriously injured, and did not require hospitalization. He did, however, suffer severe bruises and some smaller cuts.

The mishap occurred at the Alvin Hargrove place. An oilfield truck, driven by David Conter of Ranger and owned by Bob Carroll Construction of Eastland, reportedly attempted to make a turn into the Hargrove drive, just as Mr. Thompson attempted to pass the vehicle. Investigating officer, DPS Patrolman Dan Gosnell of this city, noted that both vehicles were traveling south, and the Thompson auto struck the truck on the left rear side.

Conner and a passenger in the truck were not hurt.

Mr. and Mrs. Thompson were returning home from Cottonwood where they had attended services observing the 100th anniversary of the Cottonwood Baptist Church.

City Urges Participation In Clean-Up Campaign

It was offered by city officers that their workmen will haul off nearly anything if it is placed in an accessible location or if the owner will notify the city in person or by phone or letter if too large or heavy to move without help. Members of the

city council were hoping that residents who have old vehicles not licensed would voluntarily have them moved. "We'll haul them off without charge," the mayor stated, adding, "please, just let us know."

Mayor Edmondson, councilmen and city employees have been urging participation in next week's clean-up and beautification week. In announcing the drive the mayor stated, "It is hoped that everyone will participate in this campaign. We have a beautiful city, and let's all help to keep it that way."

In the Pee Wee division of the program the Braves tightened slightly their hold on the top spot by posting two victories while second place Giants settled for one triumph and a tie.

With only three games left, heading into this week's action, the Braves could do no worse than second place. Two wins in the last three outings will insure the title.

Tuesday of last week the Braves cooled the Angels challenge with an 8-5 win while the Giants and Cubs battled to a 4-4 draw.

On Thursday the Braves nipped the Cubs 7-6 in an extended contest, and Giants blanked the Angels 4-0 in the nightcap, securing second place in the standings.

Spray Now For Pecan Casebearer

The time of the year for spraying for pecan nut casebearer is rapidly approaching, according to Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent.

Optimum spray date in this area will be around May 25-29.

The pecan nut casebearer must be killed before they enter the nutlets. Eggs are laid on the nutlet and hatch in four to five days depending upon temperature and humidity. When eggs are found these clusters should be tagged and inspected daily until they hatch. Eggs are just visible to the naked eye and are greenish white when first deposited. They then become reddish before hatching, according to Gerngross.

"When one per cent of the nut clusters are entered by casebearer larvae, it is time to spray on that day," the agent said.

A second insecticide application may be required when eggs are found and nutlet damage continues 7-10 days after the first application.

Insecticides recommended for control include Malathion, Guthion, Sevin, Polone and Torak, it was stated.

MIXED DRINK TAX ADDS FUNDS TO CITY, COUNTY

Bob Bullock, state comptroller, recently reported that Cross Plains and Callahan County shared in the state's 10 per cent tax on mixed drinks in this city.

Texas and cities and counties received a 15 per cent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state.

Cross Plains netted \$307.22 from total tax revenue of \$2,048.11 for first quarter of 1981, and Callahan County received \$330.71 from a reported tax revenue of \$2,204.73.

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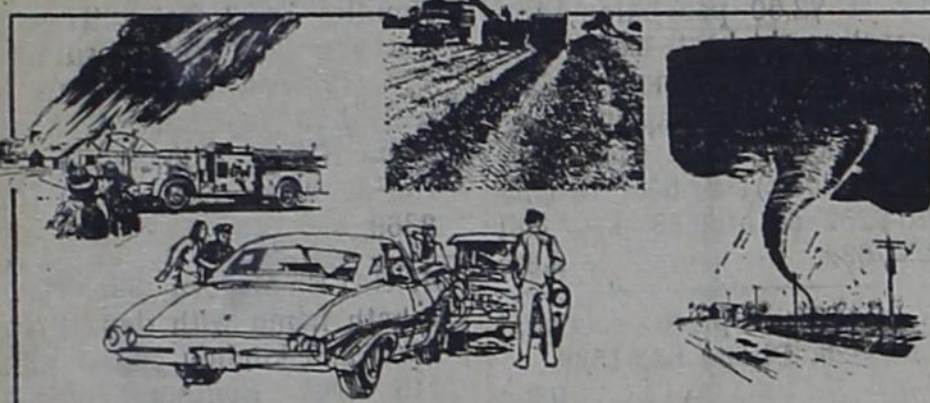
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
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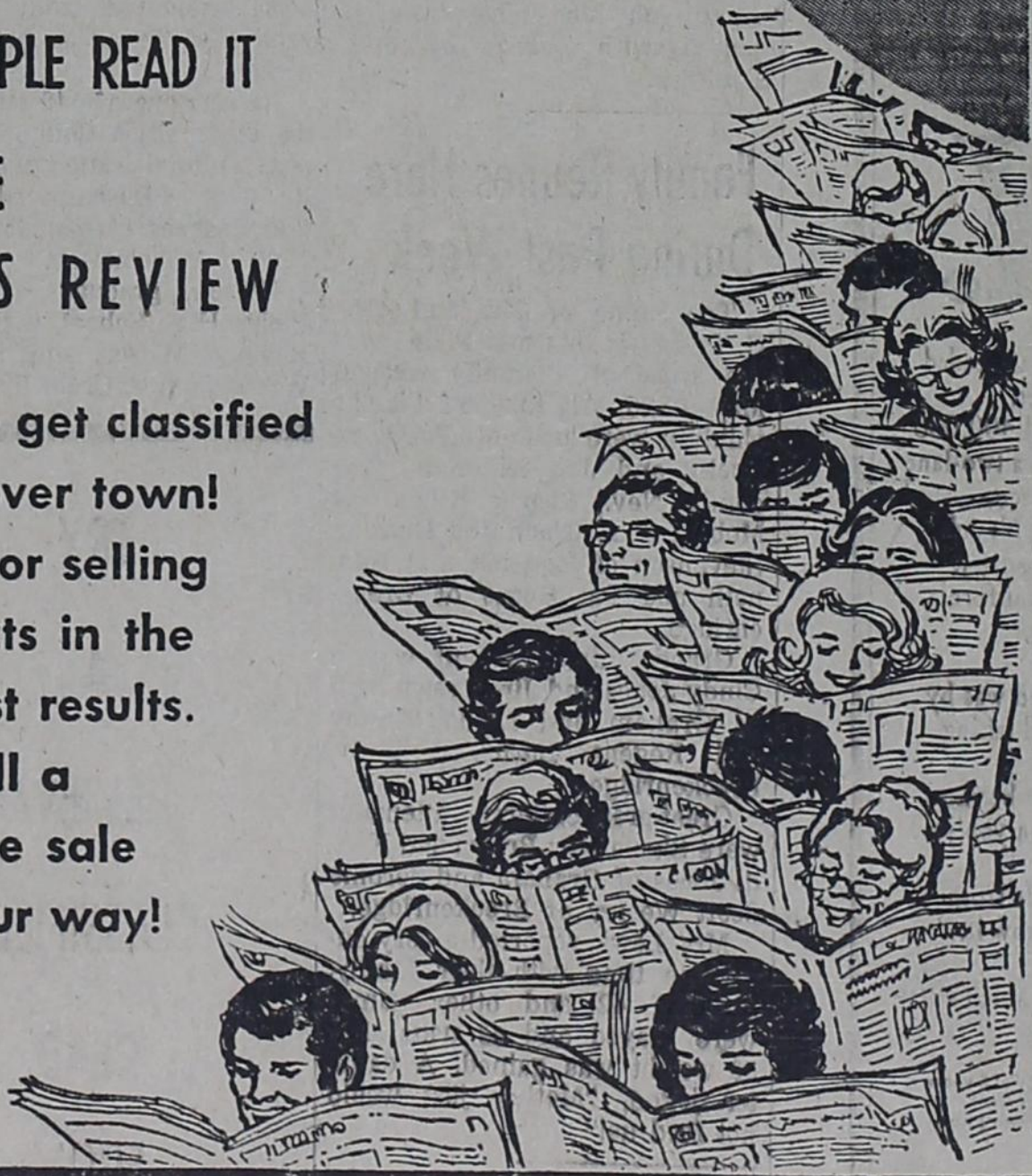

this information BIERING says that a comparison of the final value of each property will be made using known sales data. Should their research find that an inaccuracy exists, adjustment will then be made. The proposed values will then be turned over to the Callahan County Appraisal District for review. Once approved, a notice will be mailed to each taxpayer for their final review. He states that it is very important that each owner compare the proposed value with what he feels the actual market value to be. If the owner should feel that the proposed value is too high or incorrect, he should check actual sales of similar property to establish this fact. If the owners research supports this opinion, he should then contact the tax office to schedule an appointment to discuss this problem with the appraisers. Normally any needed correction can be made at this time.

"BIERING states that it is the intention of his company to treat each taxpayer as fairly as possible, giving consideration to all facts that may have been overlooked. He points out, however, that any adjustment must be made on facts and not just a complaint that values are too high."
