Cross Plains High School varsity boys and girls basketball teams entered the regular season finale at Rising Star Tuesday needing victories for the right to play in post season competition.

A win would find the Buffettes tied with Garman girls for second place, according to a statistician for the school. Apparently the two teams would meet for the right to represent the district in the runner-up place in state playoff competition.

A Buffalo victory would also leave the Herd in a second place deadlock with the winner of the Gorman-Carbon game, from which match will come the conference runner-up representative.

Tuesday of last week Gorman girls defeated host Cross Plains 31-20 to help force the possible playoff. A low scoring game, Gorman led 16-12 at intermission and while scoring just 3 points in the

third, Buffettes didn't tally.

Michelle Prater paced local scoring with 8 points on 4 field goals, hitting 4 points each for the Buffettes were Aliesia Thompson, Suzi McClure and Tammy Strickland. Miss Little was Gorman's top scorer with 12 points. Many good and great country doctors have left their imprint upon the hearts and minds of people of the Cross Plains area. By no means the least of these was Dr. Richard T. Sealy, who operated a hospital at Santa Anna for many years.

It would be difficult to find a family that has lived in this locality which did not at one time or another cross paths with this great man. Without exception they speak of him in terms of glowing endearment. There must be hundreds of men, most of whom are now grandfathers, who were named for Dr. Sealy. One of these is Noah Sealy Johnson, a local man who wears the name well.

Mrs. Claude Brown of McCombs, the former Christine McGowen of Cross Plains, recently sent me a poem written by Dr. Sealy on Christmas Night, December 1931.

HAPPINESS — MY CREED  
It is not wealth, nor fame nor power

That gives me happiness, this hour;  
But service rendered my fellow-man,

Without stint, the best I can;  
Without thought of reward or fee,

That brings happiness to me.

To heal the sick, relieve their pain,

Repair the crippled and the maimed;

Quell the anxious, comfort distressed,

Present the babe to mother's breast;

Restore reason, make blind see,

That brings happiness to me.

"This is futile", some will say,

"For there will come a rainy day,

You'll have no money or property,

Be deep in the vale of poverty".

Striking often where we least expect,

Regardless whom it may affect;

So I live for service, not for fee,

And shall have happiness to eternity.

## Judge Notes Feb. 13-17 As 'Farm Bureau Week'

County Judge Mack Kniffen has signed a proclamation designating February 13-17 as "Farm Bureau Week" in Callahan County.

The week is a part of a statewide observance during which county Farm Bureaus will make a special effort to enroll new members, according to Glenn Leech of Albany president of the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau.

Dale Wilson of Baird is chairman of the membership committee which is responsible for membership acquisition and maintenance. Other committee members are Miles Benda of Albany and Blanton Scott of Clyde.

"The Texas Farm Bureau, with more than 300,000 member families on its membership rolls, is

the largest state Farm Bureau in the nation," the proclamation reads.

"The Farm Bureau is a grassroots organization, and its foundation is the county Farm Bureau. There are 216 organized county Farm Bureaus in the state, including the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau," the proclamation states.

The local county Farm Bureau has 1,378 member families and is seeking to exceed that figure in 1984, according to Benda.

The Farm Bureau is a general farm organization that seeks to improve income and living conditions of farm and ranch families. It represents the farmer and rancher at the local courthouse, in Austin, and in the nation's capital Washington, D.C.

## State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Governor Mark White found himself on the political hot seat last week for what has been pictured lavish expenditures of both state and political campaign funds.

The criticism in the press followed on the heels of White's, and other public officials', quarterly finance reports required by law.

White came under fire for different reasons: —Republican Party chairman, George Strake, a natural foe, said White could have pared \$1 million in frills from the \$3.1 million cost of his new, foreign-made jet which will carry White on official state business. White recently replaced the 20-year-old twin engine plane used by previous governors.

Strake, in essence, accused White of spending too much money for "luxuries" at the same time that White is seeking a major tax increase to supplement teachers salaries.

—The press scrutinized the legality of White's diverting state money appropriated for the Texas Film Commission to build a children's playroom at the Governor's Mansion. The cost was \$35,500, and the method was apparently legal.

"They were doing such a fine job at the film commission they didn't need that \$43,000, and my children were having to play in the terrible weather conditions," White explained.

—The press also lumped White with several other public officials in asking to what extent they should be allowed to defray private expenses from public officeholder accounts. Expenditures listed in '83 topped \$1.5 million for such items as Christmas cards, luxury hotel suites, food and liquor, etc., for a bevy of officials.

#### Political Money

The outcome may be a move to have the Legislature limit the manner in which money from political supporters may be spent.

The potential for abuse is certainly there, according to John Hildreth, state director for Common Cause, a citizens lobby.

"The way the (public officials) finance their lifestyles is by living

off people who have an interest in public matters," he said.

Other rough waters for White last week included release of a poll, taken by a national firm, showing 51 percent rate his job performance as favorable but 34 percent unfavorable.

White's biggest problem was assessed as credibility: 55 percent said White had not kept his campaign promises. Only 29 percent said he had.

#### Bid-Rigging?

Saying it was just the first of perhaps several cases to come, Texas Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox last week filed an anti-trust suit against a former prison construction estimator.

Mattox in the suit accuses the employee of helping to rig bids to help a firm in which he is listed as a partner.

The Attorney General contends that in some cases, fictitious companies bid against the partnership, while in other instances, the companies were real but the bids were fake.

The former employee was fired in December for violating Texas Department of Corrections rules. According to state officials, the man drew attention to himself in November trying to buy more than \$20,00 worth of construction materials without taking bids, at double the price.

#### Death Penalties

Mattox announced last week that, following a U. S. Supreme Court easing restraints on state use of the death penalty, two Texas inmates could be executed within the next three months.

The High Court ruling "upholds previous rulings that the way Texas handles death cases is constitutional," he said.

Among three Texas inmates who are close to execution are a drifter convicted of killing a clerk during a Post Arthur robbery, a man convicted of killing his son by giving him poisoned candy on Halloween, and a man sentenced for killing a Killeen policeman. accuseduo-aalaih vbgkq vbgkq

## SSI Program Marks 10th Year In Being

The federal supplemental security income (SSI) program marks its 10th birthday in January. About 3.9 million people in financial need who are 65 or older, disabled, or blind now receive these gold-colored checks.

The SSI program replaced the old grants-in-aid programs for these people. It established uniform national eligibility requirements and minimum income guarantees.

SSI checks make a difference to people like the elderly couple down the street whose only assets are a small home, a beat-up car, and a small pension. Or the 37-year-old man suffering from severe rheumatoid arthritis and diabetes. And the mentally retarded woman, 25, living with her sister's family.

With benefit increases last July and this January, the maximum federal SSI payment is

officials who campaigned with a promise to increase minority hiring revealed:

—Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower has hired 9 percent black, 70 percent white and 19 percent Hispanic.

—Attorney General Mattox has hired 9.5 percent black, 79.4 percent white and 10.6 percent Hispanic.

—Land Commissioner Garry Mauro's staff is 13.4 percent black, 65.3 percent white, and 18.5 percent Hispanic.

—Treasurer Ann Richards staff is 18 percent black, 69.4 percent white and 12.6 percent Hispanic.

The report from the Equal Employment Opportunity office showed Hightower's office with 24 percent women hired; Mattox, 32 percent; Mauro, 43 percent; and Richards, 59 percent.

#### Galveston Gambling

A non-binding vote in Galveston two weeks ago saw pro-casino gambling forces solidly trounced 63 percent to 37 percent.

Had the move to restore gambling to the Island scored high enough, Stae Sen. Chet Brooks promised to take a bill before the Legislature to legalize casinos there.

The issue, however, is now regarded as dead in most circles.

\$314 for an individual and \$472 a month for a couple. In addition, people getting SSI generally are eligible for state Medicaid, Social services, and food stamps.

A person is "disabled" for SSI purposes if he or she has a severe impairment expected to prevent all substantial gainful work for at least a year or to result in death. "Blindness" is defined as central visual activity of 20/200 or less in the better eye after correction or visual field restriction of 20 degrees or less.

An individual's assets are limited to \$1,500 (\$2,250 for a couple). Items generally not counted as assets are a person's home, a car worth up to \$4,500, personal effects or household goods with total equity value not over \$2,000, life insurance policies with a face value up to \$1,500, burial plots, and assets needed for achieving self-support.

Also, a person can get SSI only if his or her countable income is less than the maximum SSI payment.

Certain income is not counted such as the first \$65 of monthly wages from a job or the first \$23 from another benefit. You can find out more about these and other exclusions from any Social Security office.

Many people not now getting SSI checks may be eligible, including some who receive low Social Security checks. If you think you may qualify or know someone who might, contact the nearest Social Security office. The Abilene office is located at 142 E. Pioneer. The telephone number is (915) 698-1360.

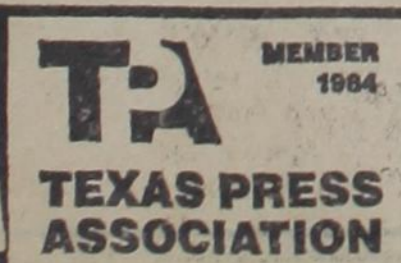

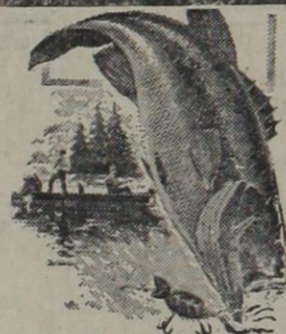

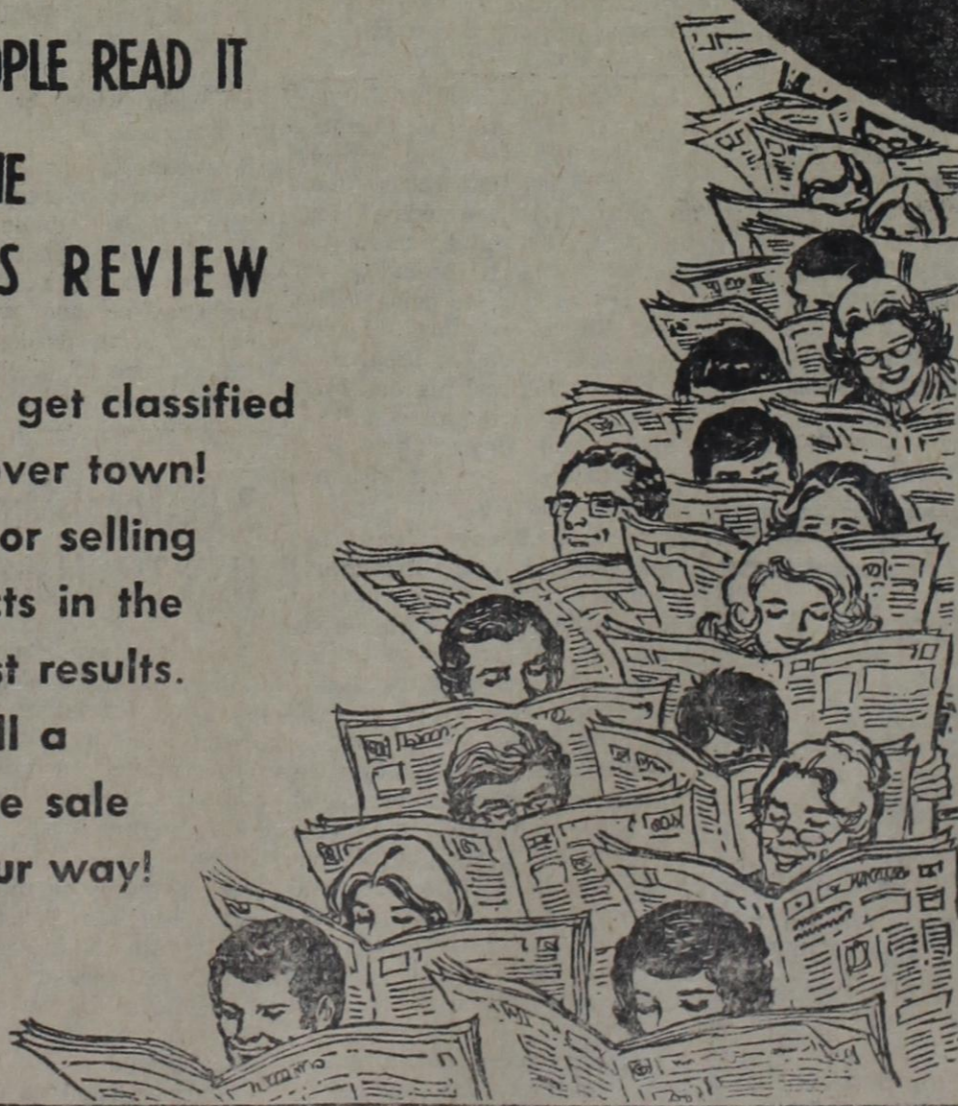

**PAIR WILDCAT PROSPECTS SET IN CALAHAN COUNTY**

Two wildcat oil tests have been announced for Callahan County. Mercury Exploration Co. of Fort Worth No. 1 Eulys is a planned 4,900-foot test for the Turnaround (Gray Sand) Field.

Location is on a 119-acre lease one mile west of Oplin, spotting 330 feet from the north and west lines of T. E. Johnson Pre-emption Survey.

Other test is No. 3-7 Whitehead, located in the Whitehead, South (Ellenburger) Field three miles northeast of Denton Valley.

The planned 4,600-foot test is located on an 800-acre lease.

Drill site is 1.133 feet from the south and 710 feet from the east lines of Section 7, BBE&C Survey.



**Disadvantaged Of Society Must Have Legal Representation**

Federal and state laws have been enacted for years to protect the rights of vulnerable groups in our society — the elderly, children, the mentally and physically disabled. These laws — which sought to combat decades of apathy and neglect by society — promised that every individual would enjoy fair access to a full cross-section of the opportunities available in an affluent society, to achieve a level of success equal with their capabilities, all without reference to age, mental or physical status.

But there remain huge gaps between the legal promises and their fulfillment. Statutory legal pledges to our citizens have too often been weakened in enforcement by government bureaucracies and our legal system. There is a clear and present need for additional statutory reform to aid those who fall through the seams of a fair measure of justice.

It is the duty of the trial lawyer to assist the disabled in reclaiming their right to work — and to live — to their

fullest potential, not as an act of charity but as a vested right of American citizenship. Children are the most vulnerable of the disadvantaged groups. They have been physically and mentally abused, sexually assaulted and exploited, or traumatized as victims of child snatching.

Lawyers must work with professionals in medicine, psychiatry, and social work to ensure that these young people are better insulated from abusive situations and, with competent legal representation, are assisted through the maze of juvenile laws and resettled in healthy environments.

The fastest growing of the disadvantaged groups is the elderly. Although many laws for senior citizens have been enacted, the thrust and effect of them are often over-protection, deprivation of personal rights and civil liberties, and a loss of independence. Dignity, a sense of pride are the special needs and entitlements of senior citizens.

Trial lawyers who invoke the humanity of the common law in support of the injured victims of society have a special responsibility to provide a fair measure of their time and skill in support of the weak and disadvantaged of society.
