

of 50 acres). The land taken from production and devoted to conservation uses must be eligible cropland, must be protected from wind and water erosion and may not be mechanically harvested. However, farmers will be permitted to graze this acreage except during six principal growing months.

Farmers participating in the reduced acreage program on one farm must assure USDA that they are not exceeding the 1981 wheat base on any other farms they own or operate.

Farmers are not required to participate in the wheat program to qualify for program benefits on other crops grown on the farm, Block said.

Before the exhibits were entered into evidence, Lane questioned Nichols, his attorney and McCool about the defendant's mental status. All testified that Nichols was sane at the time of the murder and during Wednesday's hearing.

"I have reason to believe there was insanity involved," Shanks said of his client.

No relatives of Mrs. Green were present for the hearing. Lt. Robert Babcock, commander of the Naval Reserve Center in Abilene, was in the courtroom and had visited Nichols in jail after the hearing. Nichols has been absent without leave from the reserve center since July 23.

Following the hearing, Nichols was taken back to Callahan County Jail and was expected to be transported to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville about noon Wednesday.

Nichols still faces attempted murder charges in Placerville, Calif. Sheriff Skinner said Wednesday he has not talked with authorities there about those charges.

"We're not real sure yet what they're going to do," he said.

Less Wheat Acreage For '82 Crop Told

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced his intention to implement a 15 per cent "reduced acreage" program for the 1982 wheat crop to offset the effects of record supplies and depressed wheat prices. Program operating procedures will be issued after pending farm legislation is enacted into law.

"Wheat supplies in the United States are 14 per cent above last year," Block said. "The carryover next June is expected to exceed 1 billion bushels, the highest level since 1977-78. The reduced acreage program will strengthen prices by reducing the 1982-83 marketing year supplies." Block said the increase in supplies and decrease in prices is the result of two successive record U. S. wheat crops and a record-setting

1981 world harvest. The program will be voluntary so producers can decide for themselves, based on market conditions, whether they want to participate. Program benefits, however will be tied to participation. "Soil conservation will be strongly stressed in this program," Block said. "The reduced acreage will have to be devoted to conservation uses."

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
